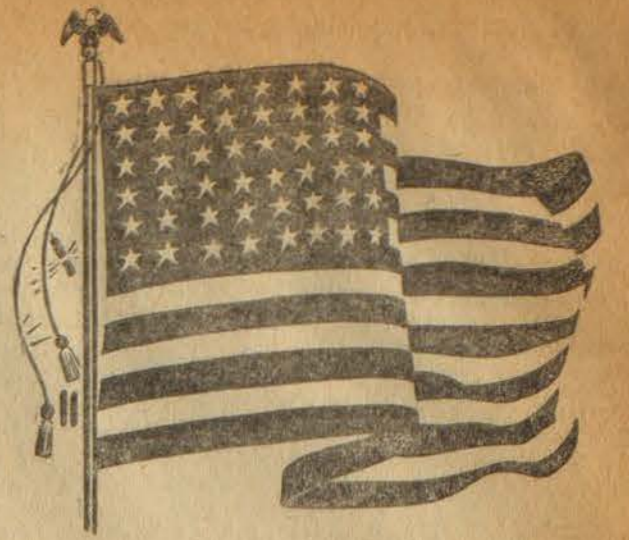

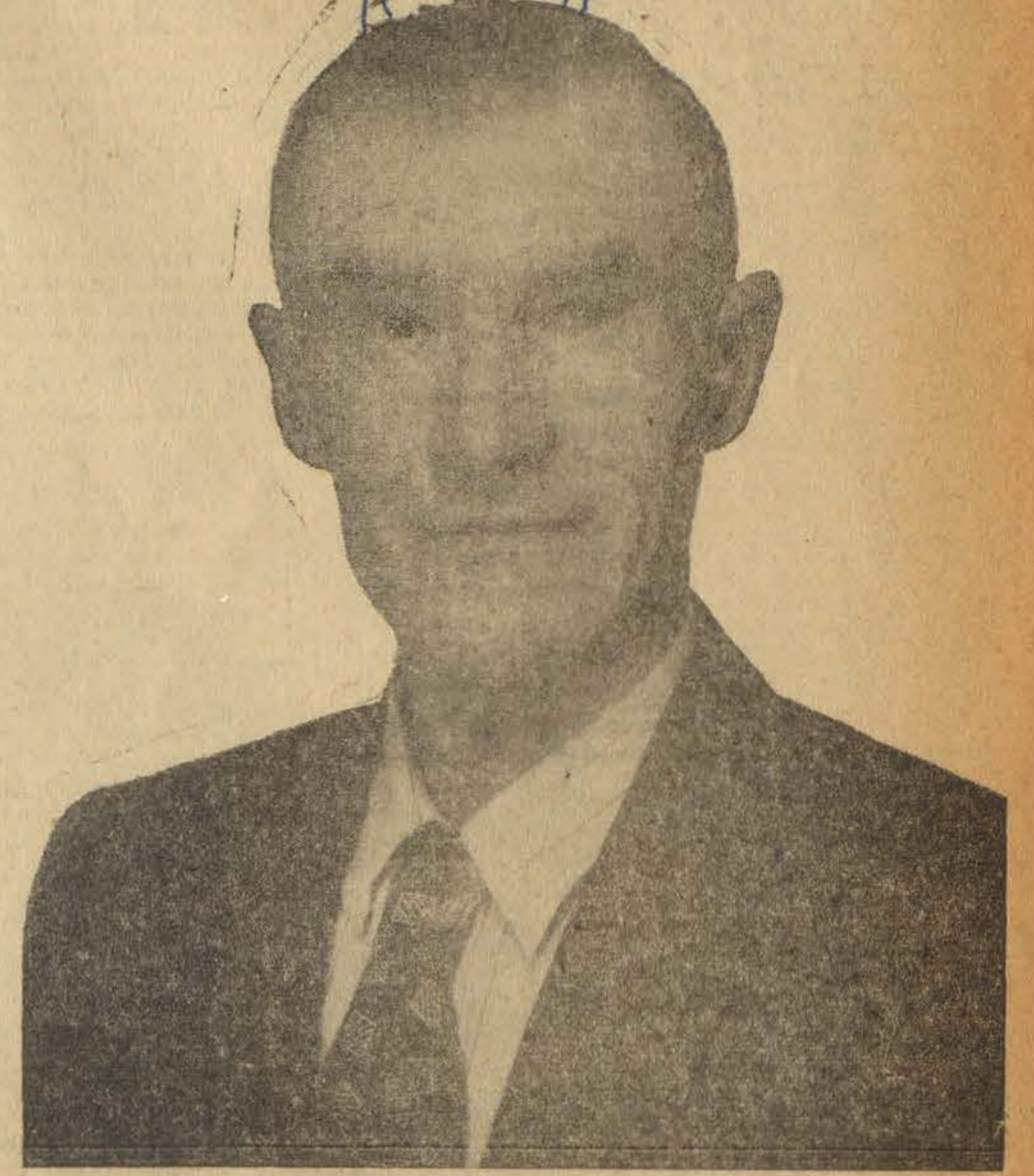

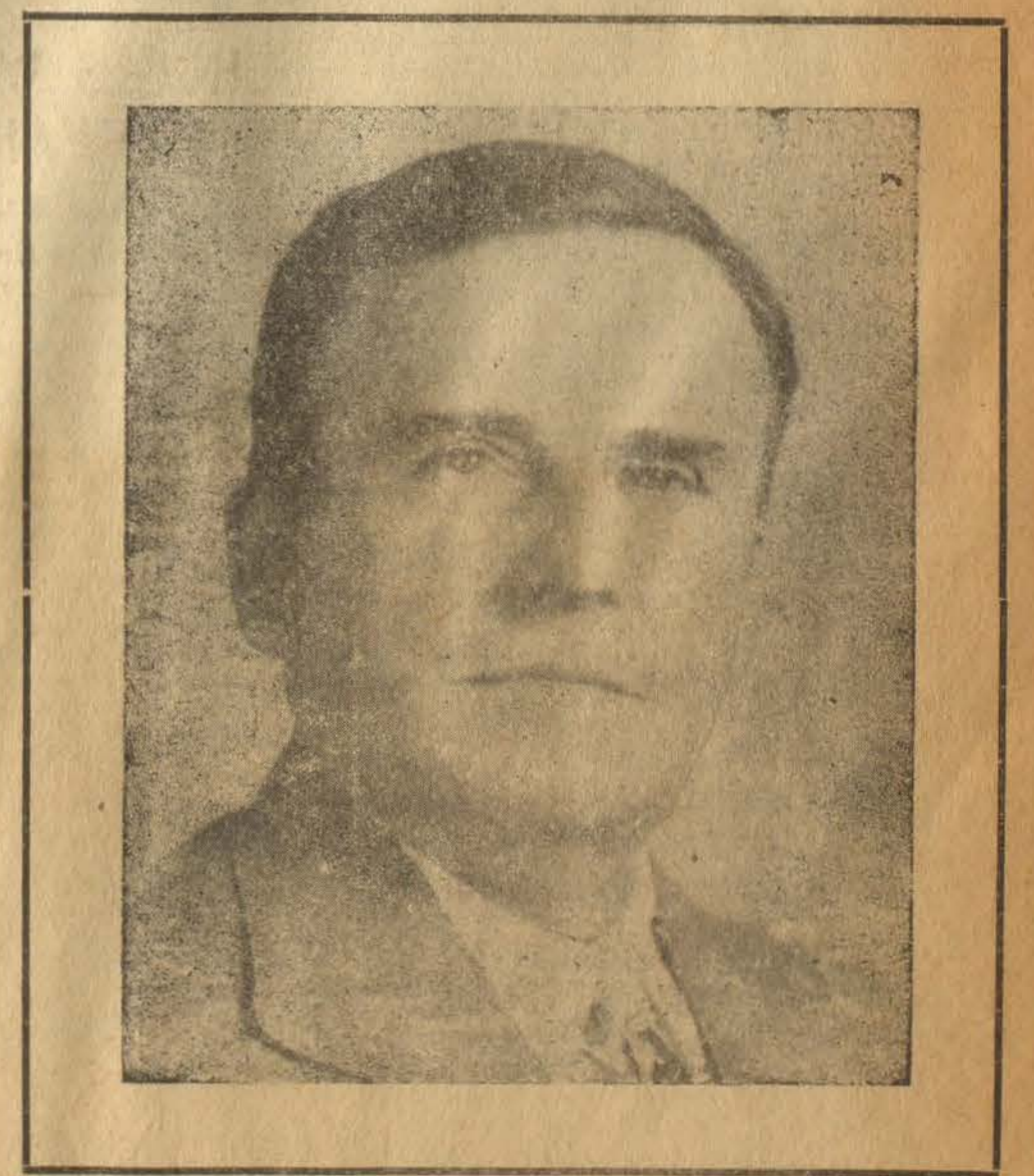

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LACKEY SALISBURY
Candidate for COUNTY JUDGE
DISCUSSES ROADS

While traveling over the county, I have personally inspected many of our roads and bridges in Floyd county. I have found that a great many communities have been entirely neglected as far as roads are concerned. Some of the roads that I have traveled over are in a bad shape at this time and will be impassable when the bad weather sets in. The people that live along the paved roads do not realize the seriousness of this situation.

Take the Mare Creek road, for an example, where there are no bridges. The first ford is a water hole about 30 feet long and 2 feet deep at this time. Mine water keeps the creek filled. With bad weather it will be impossible for cars to cross this creek. A small bridge is urgently needed at this ford. Many of our other county roads are in the same or a worse shape.

It would seem to me that most of the road money has been spent, or wasted, on roads that do not serve many of our people. Roads have been constructed, at great cost, over high mountains that do not serve many of our people. One of these roads is so steep and narrow as to be almost useless for normal traffic. If the money that has been spent on these mountain roads had been spent on roads along the valleys, we would now have many miles of good roads where they are urgently needed.

My road program is simple: Where people are bottled up and can't get out, do something for them. Low water bridges can be built at small cost. If we can't do any better, at least do that much. I believe in spending the road money where it will do the most good for the most people. I don't believe in spending it all in one place. Each gravelled road ought to have some black-top put down each year. New roads ought to be laid out and a part of the money spent on new construction each year.

Most of the present county bridges need flooring and painting. If they are not given attention, they will rust and fall down. Rust and scaled-up paint must be removed before paint is applied.

Get honest workmen to operate the county road machinery, not politicians. Insist on honest work for honest pay.

If we had the \$6250.00 that was paid the auditors to tell the present County Judge, and others, what they owed Floyd county, then we would at least have that much money to spend on emergency work on our county roads. This money could have been put to a better use. Every man ought to know what he owes. Any of our mine bookkeepers, bankers, school teachers, or business men could have easily figured out how much our County Judge, and others, owed Floyd county without sending to Louisville and getting high-priced auditors to do the work. If they had been capable administrators they could easily have figured this out for themselves and saved the taxpayers the entire \$6250.00. If I am elected your County Judge, it will not be necessary to send to Louisville for auditors to cause me to pay over to the County Treasury money due Floyd county, because proper reports will be made by all officials.

The Prestonsburg Black Cats won their first game of the season last Friday night as they scored with ease in every period to swamp the Russell Red Devils, 44-0, on the local gridiron.

Coach Doc Ferrell used every man on his squad in downing the hapless Northwestern Kentucky Conference team, which was playing its first game in the Big Sandway in ten years.

Prestonsburg scored in the first two minutes when end Paul Ousley blocked J. Blanton's attempted kick on the Russell 20-yard line. Three plays later, quarterback Lowell Hughes went over from the five and Jap Alexander dove for the extra point.

The Black Cats built up a 25-0 halftime margin while limiting Russell to a lone first down. In the free-scoring medley, Hughes rifled a 25-yard T.D. pass to Alexander for the second marker. Halfback Chester Shepherd added another six-pointer in the second quarter after intercepting one of quarterback Harris' heaves on the 25-yard stripe.

An exchange of punts gave Prestonsburg the ball on the Russell 35, from which punt halfback Clifford Goble carried to the seven and Shepherd went over for the fourth touchdown of the half.

With substitutes flowing freely into the game in the second half, the Black Cats continued to roll as the defensive unit of Charles Salyers, Thurman Lafferty, Paul Ousley, Bucky Burchett, Donald Buzkett and Johnny Thompson stopped Russell without any appreciable gains.

Hughes fired a 20-yard pass to Ousley, who moved 20 yards more, to set up the fifth touchdown of the night. On the next play, Hughes hit C. Goble in the middle for a 31-0 lead.

Hughes increased the count to 37-0 on his 17-yard punt through the entire Red Devil team and Jap Alexander passed 20 yards to end Dee Caldwell for the last tally of the game. Lafferty played for the extra point.

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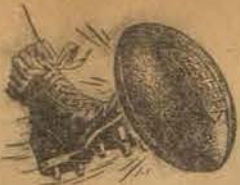

Six State Hospitals Admit 1,280 Patients

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 14—Kentucky's six state tuberculosis hospital admitted 1,280 patients and discharged 1,238, with a medical diagnosis indicating the condition of 843 had improved during the fiscal year ending in June; it was reported today by Joe D. Miller, executive director of the State Tuberculosis Sanatoria Commission.

Some 200 patients remained on the list awaiting admission.

The figures compare with 1,221 admissions and 1,022 discharges during the previous fiscal year.

Out-patient clinics reported 10,400 visits were made for X-ray examination and treatment as compared with 8,914 during the preceding year.

State tuberculosis hospitals are located at Madisenville, Louisville, Paris, Ashland, London and Glasgow.

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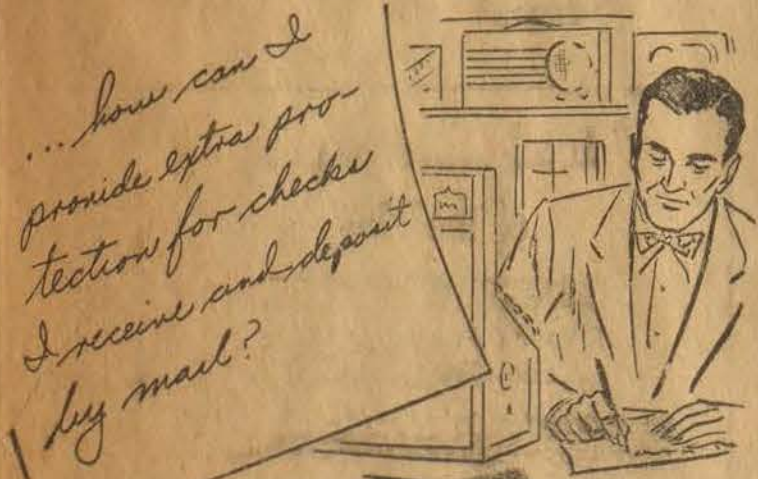

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U. S. Grants Cut; 97 Will Lose Jobs

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 14 — A reduction in federal administrative grants to the State Department of Economic Security will require dismissal of 97 employees of the state's unemployment insurance and employment service programs by October 1, it was announced by Commissioner of Economic Security V. E. Barnes.

There now are 568 employees administering these programs. The cut in administrative funds for the present fiscal year was from \$2,354,702 to \$2,077,225—with \$215,933 of the reduction being for personal services. In addition, the Department of Labor has directed discontinuance of Elizabethtown and Morehead offices of the Employment Service, reducing from 24 to 22 the number of these offices in the state.

A general order was issued both by O. B. Hannah, director of the Division of Unemployment Insurance, and L. P. Jones, Employment Service Director, to release all employees 70 years old or more. This, it is expected, will account for about 10 of the number to be released, with the remaining coming from other age groups.

More than 82,500 seamen are currently employed on ocean-going ships of the American merchant marine.
