





"Some thirty years ago Otto Leroy Layne visited Floyd county and accumulated a rather comprehensive record of his relatives there. He died in Los Angeles, a few months ago. The records we have, therefore, are thirty years in arrears.

"In October of 1952, I visit Floyd county on a tour of Texas, Arkansas, Tennessee, Kentucky and Virginia, I met several Laynes there, and after leaving several blank forms departed expecting to receive the forms when time permitted them being filled out. None of the forms were received, so the book Layne Genalogy,' was printed without date of many of the present generation of Laynes in that area.
