The mystery murder here in June, 1949 of Muriel Baldridge. Prestonsburg high school girl, vaulted into the news again this week as a man was arrested in Meridian, Miss., as a suspect in

the brutal slaying. Police Chief O. A. Booker, of Meridan, said a man named Ernest Brackin had been picked up there. Brackin, he said, had waived extradition, maintaining he had no connection with the

Officials here maintained strict silence and declined to give out any information in the absence of Sheriff Gormon Collins who had asked his deputies and others not to discuss the case until developments warranted disclosure of names and other information.

The Times learned, however that a man named Sam Stepp, formerly of Martin county, now a resident of Pensacola, Fla., had igned an affidavit alleging that Brackin had told him of committing the murder. Brackin made the statement, Stepp was quoted as saying, while the two were



Tuberculosis, Kentucky's numper one communicable disease problem, is found in all age roups but especially in adults. Ninety-four percent of all active cases in Kentucky are over 20 rears of age. Only 20 of the 635 deaths from tuberculosis in Kentucky in 1953 were children from one through fourteen.

"It is for this reason that older people, rather than children, to vote on the day preceding the should be x-rayed during the mass attack. x-ray surveys," P. M. Crawford, M. D., Director of Tuberculosis Control, Kentucky State Department of Health, says.

Tuberculosis in children often occurs in the form of tuberculosis meningitis. In most cases the source of infection is an older person in the family.

To prevent tuberculosis in children, Dr. Crawford added, more cases must be found in adults. HUNT SEASON TO OPEN SOON

Trapping, Game Seasons Open Saturday, Nov. 20. Extend Through Jan. 18

Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 8-Kentucky's November 20, rabbits and quail may Affeld

Shooting hours for the 55-day vaterfowl season are from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset except on the opening day, when shooting begin at 12 o'clock noon and continue until sunset. The 60 day rabbit and quail season will close on January 18. In all shooting only guns which will hold no more than three shells in the magazine and barrel combined may be used. A hunting license is required for all hunting in Kentucky except for waterfowl hunters, over 16 years of Following the junior leaders, age, must also have a duck stamp

after two or more days of hunting.

The season for trapping and taking raccoon, opossum, mink, skunk muskrat and red fox opens on November 20 and extends through January 18. There is no limit on these furbearers.
