The fine is the heaviest ever imposed in this county on such a charge.

Circuit Judge Hill overruled the Magistrate's motion for a new trial. May executed bond after having been granted an appeal to the Ap-

Also overruled by Judge Hill was a motion filed at the outset of the trial by May's attorney's, seeking to remove Commonwealth's Attorney Martin and to have appointed a Commonwealth's Attorney pro-tem for the hearing.

The maximum fine for assault and battery is \$5,000.

Martin testified that he was struck by May on the back of his head after he had entered the Circuit Clerk's office last October to inquire about some "cold checks." He said he did not see May until the latter hit him. Circuit Clerk W. W. Cooley called as a witness for the Commonwealth, said May struck Martin.

The defendant testified, however that he and Martin had been talking prior to the altercation and that

TAX ESTIMATE

Required of Taxpayer, R. H. Allphin Announces; 50,000 Taxpayers to File

Frankfort, Ky., April 6 - Comnissioner of Revenue Robert H. Allphin reminded taxpayers today that the Kentucky pay-asyou-go income tax law provides for declarations of estimated income tax by persons not subject o withholding

The Department of Revenue anticipates 50,000 Kentuckians will ile a declaration of estimated 1955 income. Persons who make declarations are required to pay one-third of the estimated tax due by April 15, 1955. The balance of the tax due can be paid in two installments by July 15 and Nov-ember 15, 1955. The declarations can be amended if the taxpayer estimates his income will vary from the first estimate.

The declaration requirement applies to all persons who expect to receive \$1,500 income, more than the \$1,000 of which is not covered by withholding. Thus, the requirement applies to those who are self-employed and those who work outside Kentucky and earn wages or salaries not subject to

Circular Deals With Irrigation

The interest in irrigation has brought from the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture and Home Economics a new circular dealing with the use of water to improve the yields and quality of

Despite the 44 to 48 inches of rainfall in Kentucky in normal years, there often are periods during season when moisture is needed to keep crop yields from being

Many farmers already have installed irrigation systems for tobacco and other crops. Their results have attracted attention. In some instances increased yields in one year paid for the irrigation system.

Written by Earl G. Welch, agricultural engineer, the circular deals with irrigatiing tobacco, corn, alfalfa, pasture, truck crops and berries, the cost of irrigation systems frequency of applying water, amount to use, sources of water, pumps, pipes and other equipment, and the new Kentucky law on water rights. 





SPORTS AFIELD

An ounce of prevention is worth you know what, so right now is the time to rejuvenate your casting reel insists Jason Lucas, angling editor of Sports Afield magazine.

We'll concentrate on the casting reel for these reasons: In most fly fishing the reel is subject to very little wear and needs almost no attention; a spinning reel does operate on each retrieve, but it too can be said to be idle during the cast. These two reels can go through a long life without much oiling or other

The case is quite different, however, with a casting reel. During each cast it works fast and furiousy-spool, crank and gears whirring, evel-wind mechanism racing madly back and forth. Perfect smoothness is necessary; without it you'll have constant backlashes, short and difficult casts.

To avoid this, your casting reel needs pretty constant attention which includes an ocacsional complete overhaul. Now is the time to do it, before the fishing season. Reconditioning a casting reel is a simple and interesting job that should not take over an hour. It calls for no mechanical aptitude, unless the end bearings are worn. So, before proceeding, see about those.

Remove the end caps. Take the spool between thumb and forefinger and shake sidewise. Look, or feel to find out if there's a very noticeable amount of sidewise play. If there is, send the reel to its maker for new bearings; it cannot cast properly with worn ones. Let him do the whole overhaul job while he has the reel. It will cost very little, and he'll make it just like

But if the bearings aren't unduly worn, and nothing is bent, you can do the job yourself.

Remember when assembling the reel again, you work backward from what you did in taking it apart. If you have forgotten what some of these steps were, don't get annoyed or impatient and start forcing things; if something doesn't slide into place easily, you've got it wrong. Try reversing it, or try another part


