MEET STUDIES AID PROBLEM Means of Resumption

Of Food Distribution Is Given Study Today

DECEMBER 1, 1955

FISCAL COURT

The Floyd fiscal court was cheduled to tackle at its meeting here today (Thursday) the tough problem of handling surplus foodstuff distribution of the needy" list.

The court several weeks ago suspended delivery of foodstuffs to central distribution points, at the same time cut from the pay roll all road employes but one as funds budgeted for those purposes were at, or near the point of exhaustion.

Now, however, the court is attempting to find some way to restore, at least in part, the service to the needy.

"The trouble with distributing commodities from the office here County Judge Henry Stumbo said this week, "is, the most needy who live at some distance from Prestonsburg can't come here to get the food they need. So we are applying those who don't need elp as badly as those we're

Judge Stumbo indicated he will sk that the relief rolls be carefully screened to eliminate all cases that are not in real need, then try somehow to resume deivery of the foodstuffs to points utside Prestonsburg.





Methods of distribution vary in different localities. There are three nethods. Shots may be given by private physicians, who obtain the vaccine from their local health department; by the local health department directly; or a combination of these two sources. This is the state-wide plan endorsed by the Kentucky State Medical Association. The vaccine is free, although private physicians may charge for ad ministering the shots. The vaccine is safe. Government inspection now regulates its manufacture. Recent sensitive tests have guaranteed its safety. The evidence of its effectiveness in reducing the deadly, crippling effects of polio shows that the vaccine prevents polio in three out of four cases. Paralytic polio has been greatly lessened through the use of polio immunization.

BANDITS HOLD FAMILY GROUP

Minister, Wife, Companion At Gunpoint in Robbery; Are Robbed in Paintsville

Questioning of 30 or more per-sons by Paintsville police has failed to result in an arrest in the hold-up-robbery of three persons at Paintsville, Nov. 20.

The Rev. and Mrs. Claude Preston and her sister, Miss Beulah Van Hoose, who were held at gunpoint for an hour could not identify any person questioned as one of the two shabbily dressed men who robbed the Prestons and Miss Van Hoose of \$300. They said they had never before seen either of the holdup men

Authorities acted on the theory that the robbers had been "briefed" on the circumstances and habits of the family, however, because the two insisted on another pocketbook being produced after two purses had been given them. Circumstances of the robbery, as told by The Paintsville Herald were

The three had returned from Staffordsville about 9:30, where Rev. Preston had conducted services in the Baptist church. Shortly afterward the bandits rang the doorbell, and were admitted into the living room by Rev. Preston who stated his first impression was that the men had come to ask him to conduct a funeral.

As he turned to invite his visitors to sit down, both men drew guns, threatening and forcing the Prestons and Miss Van Hoose to turn over their pocketbooks. Miss Van Hoose gave them her purse containing \$19.00 and Mrs. Preston gave them \$22.00. After taking Rev. Preston's wallet, the shorter of the two men demanded that he hand over the other wallet. "We know you carry two," he said. As the trio was denying knowledge of another pocketbook they were taken to the bedroom where they were bound to bedposts and a chair with strips torn from the sheets on the bed. The men also demanded to know where the money safe was locat-

Rev. Preston, who owns and operates the Nu-Way Dry Clean-ing Plant on Depot Road, is acustomed to carrying two wallets during business hours, it was stat-

After Mrs. Preston pleaded that her husband reveal the hiding place of the second wallet, the two intruders departed after they taped the mouths of their hostages and threatened to kill them if they called police. They stated that one of the men would remain on the outside of the building for one hour and warned of bodily harm if the police were contacted.


Backing Administration Of Kentucky in Education, Theme At Louisville Meet
