Henry Stephens, Jr., of Prestonsburg, last Friday filed in the Floyd circuit court a \$50,000 damage suit Martin, Inc., and its president and cashier, Glenn C. Spradlin.

The plaintiff also seeks to recover he \$275-a-month salary he was paid and bruising his heart. as assistant cashier there at the time of his recent discharge, such compensation being claimed till his discharge is made official by the bank's board of directors or until he can find similar employment at a salary equal to that paid him at the bank.

Damages are claimed because, the plaintiff alleges, his "wrongful discharge" greatly clouded his reputation as a banker and that "such defamatory actions" to his reputations have greatly handicapped him in any effort to resume his lifelong connections with any bank either as an employe or in any other man-The plaintiff is a onetime cashier

Not every man cited by the state police is guilty-no enforcement agency can be perfect; but it's obvious that three-fourths of those arrested aren't innocent, either.

It all goes back to public sentiment, the interest the people themselves have in law enforcement.

For instance, two types of law violation have become so unpopular with the rankand-file that conviction in the courts is almost automatic. Through effective publicity and a program of education, those charged with the enforcement of the fish and game laws and the law against forest fires have convinced the people that there is little or no excuse for men to dynamite streams, to kill game out of season, to set woodlands afire and create destruction that will last for vears.

And so it is that the courts, with public sentiment solidly behind them, stand behind these officers.

Four Eastern Kentucky High School Basketball Stars Setting Records

Four Eastern Kentucky high school basketball players-two of whom are members of Floyd county teams are establishing individual scoring records for their respective schools every time they take the floor.

Never before in the history of the region's basketball have players hit the goals with such consistency and scored so many points in the games. Five or ten years ago, when a player scored 20 or more points a game he was a sensation. Today, 50 points for an individual is not uncommon, 40 is considered a good night, and 30 is better than average. If a player falls under 30, he fails to keep pace in the scoring records. The most prolific individual scoring star is Wayland's Kelly Coleman, who set an all-time high for Kentucky scorers last season with 1,174 points in 36 games for a 32.6 (See Story No. 10, Page 2)

Another sort of inaccurate observer thinks that Kentucky talks a broad Southern dialect. That is fully as laughable as our Elizabethan English. It is probable that not more than ten per cent of the people of the state talk what could be identified as Southern by any careful student of language. Time and again I have heard outsiders speak of having heard such interesting Southern words or expressions or tones in Kentucky, when every illustration given would be just as valid for Indiana, Illinois, or Ohio as for Kentucky. Many times these so-called Southernisms are merely family variations in speech. I can recall that at Fidelity there were many people who outdid some of the New Englanders in their long o's or au's. Our nearest neighbor pronounced sausage as if it were spelled sossidge. Another neighbor shortened his i's so much that his pronounciations of dime sounded like damn. And yet both of them were just one generation away from North Carolina, with no earthly knowledge of or cultural connection with New England or the northern Middle West.





COURT RULES




