Men With an Idea Start Neon Shirt Factory

Nothing could have been further from Neon, Kentucky, last winter than the shirt industry. Yet today some 30 Neon citizens own a shirt factory. It provides nine people with jobs that never before existed. It has added to the income of five other people. And already, the Neon Manufacturing Company is outgrowing itself-seeking more work-

What happened to bring this about? An idea ... and 5 men willing to take a chance on it ... willing to persuade others to take a chance. These five formed a company and sold stock at \$5.00 a share. They bought several second-hand sewing machines and enough cloth to make 5 dozen shirts.

But who knew how to make shirts? Only one man in the area had such experience... and he was willing to train women who could sew. After two weeks the women started their new jobs . . . but progress was slow. It took a week to make that first 5 dozen shirts.

That was last April. The plant now produces 150 dozen shirts every month...and five representatives carry the new line to many areas throughout Kentucky.

'We are rapidly outgrowing our present quarters," the general manager said recently. "Our production is increasing but our sales are staying ahead of production. We hope soon to be able to employ more people."






