

# REASONS WHY

# You should **VOTE** Chandler and Waterfield

HAPPY CHANDLER supporters are convinced that the present administration of Wetherby-Beauchamp-Clements is bad. They know the present administration is the worst from the point of view of civic morals and good government that Kentucky has ever had. About one month ago the administration had sufficient funds to finance the Minimum Foundation Program, and still have a million dollars left over. About one month ago a surplus of EIGHTEEN MILLION DOLLARS came into the Treasury as a result of the withholding tax. This sum was quickly taken by the Governor and distributed or allocated. None, so far as we know, came to Floyd county. Within a week after the surplus came in the Governor told a group of school officials who were interested in seeing the program immediately financed, that he was indeed sorry but that the surplus had been distributed or allocated elsewhere. Can you intelligently believe that the administration ever intended to finance the program?

Happy Chandler has stated that the Minimum Foundation Program will be financed. Twenty years ago he said that free school books for children would be provided, and when elected that program was carried out. You can rely upon this pledge by Chandler.

#### BLANKET ASSESSMENTS

Last year the present administration forced a blanket raise in taxes on Floyd county. Every merchant has been required to pay fifty per cent more upon merchandise; all farm and other property, EXCEPT CITY LOTS, were given a fifteen per cent additional tax burden. This was done by the administration at a time when the people of Floyd county had very little with which to pay taxes, at a time when we were in the throes of a local depression because of lack of coal orders. Instead of reducing the tax burden, the present administration made it heavier. Next year the administration says they must have twenty-five million dollars more. Their candidate has said as much.

#### SALES TAX

The administration's candidate has said, "the tax base must be broadened." He says he intends to tax us further to the tune of TWENTY-FIVE MILLION DOL-LARS. This means a sales tax. Happy Chandler opposes a sales tax. He opposed it twenty years ago as he does today. He declared then, as he declares now "No one but the very wealthy objects to a sales tax on bank stock, Cadillac automobiles and mink coats, but we do oppose a sales tax on corn meal, baby's milk and beans." How do you feel about it?

#### THE OLD AGE LIEN LAW

The present administration placed the lien upon the homes of the old age pensioners. Administration supporters recently placed an advertisement in this paper proclaiming that Chandler was responsible for the lien. Let them point to one home in Floyd county or in the whole wide state of Kentucky that had such a lien upon it before 1952. They know and we know that the Old Age Lien Law was passed by the 1952 Legislature, a little over two and one-half years ago, under the present administration.

It is known as Senate Bill 101. It reads: "On and after July 1, 1952, the Commonwealth of Kentucky shall have a lien upon all real estate and rights to real estate belonging to, or thereafter acquired, by any recipient of public assistance as a needy aged or needy blind." Only one member of the administration controlled Senate voted against Senate Bill 101, and that was a Senator Losey. In the House it passed under Wetherby's prompting by a

Happy Chandler is determined to take this lien off the homes of the old people. The administration candidate isn't concerned enough about these old and blind people to even make a statement about it.

#### ASSESSMENTS OF STATE EMPLOYEES

The present administration is assessing state employees two per cent of their salaries in violation of the law. Instead of reducing their salaries by two per cent and thereby saving your tax dollars, the administration believes that by collecting from a lot of individuals a small amount no objections will be heard and no one will be able to afford to prosecute for the violation. Dividing the crime into small parts does not lessen the evil of it. How much of this money do you suppose will be used for the sinkink ship of the Clements-Beauchamp-Wetherby administration and how much will stick to the fingers of the collectors?

#### ABOUT GOLD CARDS

The present administration adopted the practice of giving Gold Cards to favorites of the administration. These Gold Cards entitled the holder to free meals, lodging and anything else available at State owned parks. The Commissioner says that this practice has been stopped. It shouldn't have been started to begin with, and if it was a good practice why was it stopped during the campaign? When you go to a State park, you pay and usually pay plenty high. Try renting a boat at the boat dock of what is called a State Park in our county. You won't find the Gold Carders here, they're at Kenlake, the luxury spot for state favorites, built, equipped and operated at your expense.





# WARD ASKS CHANDLER TO ANSWER PERSONALLY

Statement By **HENRY WARD** Commissioner of Conservation

June 14, 1955 Frankfort, Kentucky

I have written a personal letter to A. B. Chandler in which I have asked him to answer himself the questions which I have put to him. The letter was mailed to him yesterday, and the attached copy is not being released until today so he cannot say he has not had adequate time to frame an answer.

Chandler is the candidate for Governor, not Joe Leary, his campaign manager, and so it is Chandler who should answer questions about his personal actions of the past.

It is relevant to this campaign to raise these questions because they bear on Chandler's qualifications to represent the people of Kentucky as their governor.

The copy of my letter to Chandler follows:

Mr. A. B. Chandler, Versailles, Kentucky

Dear Mr. Chandler:

The fact that you have refused to answer questions which I have put to you and instead have let your campaign manager, Joe Leary, speak for you indicates either that you are afraid to answer or your campaign organization is afraid to let you talk for yourself.

I challenge you to give the people of Kentucky the answers to questions which have a material bearing on the use you have made of the influence which you built up through the years as a result of holding public offices to which the people elected you

Let me review briefly the situation which involves the two of us-a situation which, incidentally, you created by your attacks on my personal honesty and integrity. Early in your campaign for Governor, you started an assault against the state park program which I have headed since 1948 and against me personally. I suspect you thought I intended to run for lieutenant governor, and your purpose was to try to tear me down. I also suspect you knew that this administration has received credit for having done an outstanding job in giving Kentucky one of the finest state park systems in the nation, and you hate to see the administration credited with having done anything

That is political strategy which I understand, although I think it is a tragedy that Kentucky has to be subjected to that brand of politics. But I do not believe that the people are as stupid as you indicate you think they are.

I decided that I would not be a candidate for any office, and one of the reasons was that I wanted to be in a position of not asking the people for anything for myself. That leaves us in this situation: you are the candidate asking the voters to give you the governor's seat for another term; I am an official responsible for what I may have done in the past but asking for nothing for the future. I also am a citizen with a right to get the real facts about this campaign to the people.

The question of "Propriety' is an important issue in this situation. Your campaign manager stated last Saturday that I must not understand the word or I would not have questioned your record of having received pay from a Lexington whiskey wholesale company at the same time you were a United States Senator and high commissioner of baseball.

In a statement which he made for you, Mr. Leary said: "Mr. Ward would not understand nor appreciate the relationship between a lawyer and his client, for he has demonstrated a complete lack of appreciation

The word "propriety" is defined as "fitness or suitability of conduct."

I agree that I do not have an appreciation of propriety if that means a United States Senator or the high commissioner of baseball cannot be questioned about the acceptance of valuable gifts or retainer fees from private corporations or individuals merely because he operates under the guise of being a lawyer.

#### QUESTIONS SWIMMING POOL

I most emphatically question the propriety of your acceptance of a swimming pool from Ben H.

Collings, a Louisville contractor, during World War II when you were a member of the U.S. Senate. You certainly knew that he was a bidder on war contracts. You certainly knew that materials used in that pool were needed for the war effort, to produce shells and weapons for use by the men who were then risking their lives in defense of the nation. Your claim now that the swimming pool issue is a "dead cat" is a reflection on the intelligence of voters. Hubert Meredith, who was then attorney general, made the proper observation on your acceptance of the swimming pool when he said: "Virtuous women and honest men do not accept gifts of consequential value."

Isn't it a fact that the permit of Collings to do business with the United States government was suspended by the War Production Board because of his use of materials critically needed for the war effort in the building of your swimming pool?

I challenge you to permit examination of you income tax returns for the years that you served as public official and baseball commissioner, so that the public may know what use you made of your official duties. Please do not try to say that you were a lawyer and "propriety" makes it impossible for you to reveal "confidential relationships" between you and your "clients."

Later I expect to ask you to explain your acceptance of a luxury cruise on the Caribbean while you were governor, your trip to such lush places as White Sulphur Springs, Hot Springs, Hollywood and other resorts, for I think they bear on the kind of public official you have been and probably would be in the future, but the answers to the questions I have raised above are more important now.






Dr. Graham and his wife do not indulge in movies, card playing, dancing, tobacco, cocktails, etc. He says, "Silly flirtations, unhealthy gossip, shady conversations, suggestive amusement should be avoided like rattlesnakes. You become so busy in the things of Christ that you do not have time for the things of the world. Many young people ask me if this or that is sinful. One question will settle ninety percent of their problems. Ask yourself 'What would Christ have me to do? What would Christ think about my amusements, recreation, books, companions, and TV programs?' We cannot compromise or bargain here. There must be an out-and-out stand for Christ. It does not mean we are snobs or have a superiority complex, lest we be in danger of spiritual pride, which would be far worse than worldliness." (Recall the attitude of the British press toward Dr. Graham early last year?)

# Local Educators Fail To Agree On Why Johnny Can't Read

reading started back in 1846, with a cow. Opinions as to the effectiveness of that method of teaching were sharply divergent here this week after discussion started serialized recently in The Courier -Journal.

Between the cow that started the word method and the present day accumulation of reading literature millions of children have gone to school; some learned to read, some did not.

More than 100 years ago John Russell Webb, a village schoolteacher in New York state associated the teaching of the word, 'cow," with the animal itself. Before that time the teaching of phonics was the accepted method of instruction. Soon a revolution in teaching methods occurred as the profession shifted to the word method. However, phonetic instruction lingered on in Eastern Kentucky until the early 1920's, and many an oldster, and many not so old, recall with great nostalgia the old way of learning to read and decry the modern method as the reason Johnnie can't

Not only old laymen, though, assert the word method is the cause of Johnnie's reading difficulties. Professional opinion here in this county is divided on the matter. # OMBS' OPENING BIGGER THAN BARKLEY'S

Says Lexington Herald

following is an excerpt from an editorial of The Lexington Herald, June 8, 1955:

"A SAVING GRACE"

Having attended both the Sixth District rally of former Gov. A. B. (Happy) Chandler at Winchester and the general opening of the campaign of former Court of Appeals Judge Bert Combs at Shelbyville last Thursday, we are inclined to chance a few observations concerning the Democratic primary that has now been fully opened.

As to crowd sizes, since previous comment has been made upon the attendance at the Chandler rallies, it may be said that the Shelbyville crowd that heard Judge Combs was one of the largest ever present at a political speaking in the state. His crowd at Shelbyville was larger than that which heard former Vice President Alben W. Barkley open his campaign there in the same Fair Grounds a year before. While nearby Frankfort and Louisville accounted for a large element in this crowd, there was a tremendous outpouring from Eastern Kentucky counties, especially those

in the section from which Judge Combs was elected to the Appellate Court. These attest both the loyalty of the mountains to a native son, one of the most notable traits of Kentucky character, and the esteem for Judge Combs in his own part of the state. The weather on the night of his opening was ideal, and Lexington throughout the day heard the sirens of motorcades en route to the Shelbyville mecca. Along the way, especially those who went by Versailles, they might have thought they were seeing more Chandler signs on automobile bumpers, but on arrival in Shelbyville it was easy to see why, because there were literally acres of Combs

A careful count of the crowd by experienced political observers showed at least 15,000 persons from all sections of Kentucky were present at Shelbyville to hear Judge Combs open his campaign for Governor. This tremendous crowd and its enthusiasm indicates the snowballing sentiment which will elect for the first time in history a Governor from Floyd county.
