This will keep only six hours after it is opened and when all attempts to find a first or second-grade schoolchild to take the remaining shot or shots in the bottle fail, the vaccine is given to one or more pre-school children or to an older child. This is done, it was explained, when the only alternative is to let the serum spoil. The practise, however, has resulted in rumors of children receiving the vaccine when they are not eligible

Appeals Court Disbars Abner May, of Pikeville, Because of Misconduct

An order disbarring Abner May, Pikeville, from practising law in Kentucky was entered by the Court of Appeals last Friday.

It directed that May's application for reinstatement be referred to the Board of Bar Commissioners for consideration and a recommendation to the court. The board had recommended

that May be disbarred "because of misconduct in the handling of funds of a guardianship estate,' the Appellate Court said. It made the disparment effec-

tive as of April 13, 1953, the date on which May had surrendered his license. He said he did not admit "any of the matters set forth" in the complaint, but did "not desire to contest" it before the bar association. The Appellate Court said it had

ssued an order November 2, 1953, lirecting May to show why he houldn't be adjudged guilty of inprofessional conduct, and be lisbarred, as recommended by the oard.

No response was received and, the court said, "through inadvertence or oversight the matter lay dormant until February, 1955. when it was brought to the at-tention of the court." Another order was issued, May responded and applied for reinstatement, filing "letters from a number of Pikeville attorneys, certifying as to his good character and conduct since April, 1953."

However, the court said "no cause had been shown why he should not have been found guilty. His good conduct since the ecommendation for disbarment can be considered only upon an application for reinstatement







Goodman was convicted last December on a charge of having carnal knowledge of a female, but has never been sentenced. He said he saw Damron in November after Clements' escape.

The witness said Damron told him he had seen Clements in Detroit, and that he owned a new car, and seemed to be doing well. Goodman, who lost his deputy jailer's job after the last election

said he never saw Clements again The prosecution contends that i was Clements whose body was found without head, feet, or hands on nearby Johns Creek by a tenant farmer, Warren Lewis, a former resident of this county, in March

Identification was based on a brown suit and other personal effects, including a belt, glasses, comb, and a magazine clipping. Charles Raney, a driver for the

Ideal Cleaners of Martin at the ime of the incident, testified that he delivered a brown two-trouser suit to Damron's home August 14, 1953, that bore the laundry mark Three pairs of trousers, all bear-

ing that mark, have been introduced as evidence, two by the defense and one by the prosecution. The prosecution contends that the victim wore the trousers it offered.

Another witness, William Huddleston, owner of Ideal Cleaners, verified that the mark appeared in his records

Testimony of another witness concerned one of two Social Security cards found in the rotting clothing on the torso. One of the cards bore the name of the witness, Saul Crisp, an uncle of Damron's wife, Mrs Blanche Damron,

Combs FOR -- Chandler AGAINST Education Program

Although a member of the Floyd County Board of Education, I want to make it clear at the outset that I speak from my own heart; therefore, no views expressed in this open letter should be interpreted to reflect the feelings or opinions of the Board of Education or any other member. I write to you as voters because I have a deep-seated, personal interest in the educational future and well being of Floyd



County's school children. This interest I have always tried to keep foremost in my mind, not only during the many years I have been associated with our schools in a public capacity, but I have ever urged the educational development of our youth as a partial solution of our economic ills.

In passing, I may remark that our county school administrators are doing the best job possible for our children and teachers with the funds available to us from County and State. While little increase may be expected from county revenues, we have a right to expect much improvement in financial aid from the State.

The interest and future of Floyd county's school children, teachers, and schools are now deeply involved in the result of the Kentucky Governor's race. That is why I expect to take a sincere and active stand for Bert T. Combs for Governor of Kentucky. I am only too glad to tell you why.

Both Judge Combs and his opponent tell us they are for complete financial support for the operation of the Minimum Foundation Program passed by the 1954 legislature. However, it is my positive belief that Judge Combs is sincere, while his opponent, Mr. Chandler, is

again planning to give the teachers, parents and educators "the run-around."

Mr. Chandler's record against education speaks so loudly we cannot hear his promises.

We know that during the summer and fall of 1953 while school teachers and their friends fought to bring about an amendment to Section 186 of the Constitution, which was the very beginning and backbone of the present Foundation Program, and without which amendment there could have been no Foundation Program, Mr. Chandler's newspaper, THE WOODFORD SUN, was publishing editorials urging voters to vote "NO" on this school amendment. To quote from this paper: "we are definitely against the repeal of Section 186 of the Kentucky Constitution."

On the other hand, we can believe Bert Combs when he says he will provide sufficient financial aid to put the Foundation Program into operation during his first year as Governor. Why?-because he is one of us, a mountain boy, of humble origin; his mother was a schoolteacher, and attended rural schools. Judge Combs fought with the teachers and with them won the amendment to Section 186. There is no fanfare or ballyhoo about him because he is not a professional politician. We can trust him because he has not deceived us. From personal and business association with him I know he is sincere, and I for one believe him wholeheartedly.

The hopes of Floyd county school children as well as the hopes of all Kentucky boys and girls ride with Judge Combs in his race for Governor.

I shall support Judge Combs with a confidence that educational progress will triumph over politics. A vote for Judge Combs is a parent's responsibility to his child and a teacher's interest in his own welfare.
