INCUMBENTS RETAIN MOST CITY OFFICES

Administration Forces Here Defeat Write-In; Coch Wins at Martin

Except for two Council posts at Martin, administration slates in all three Floyd towns where city offices were contested were swept into office at Tuesday's election.

The two who broke the administration ranks at Martin were Cecil Conley and G. H. Dingus, New Deal ticket candidates for City Council. In Prestonsburg the incumbents, Mayor Harry Sandige and City Councilmen J. Y. Goble, Wm. O. Goebel, Paul C. Combs, Sam Wells, Dr. Edward B. Leslie, Curtis W. May, and Bob Francis, were re-elected. A write-in vote netted Fred A. James votes in each of the city's seven precincts after he had formally withdrawn from the Mayoralty race. His vote total was 234 to 567 for Mayor Sandige. Two women, candidates for Council here on the Economy ticket, Mrs. Mont Gibson and Mrs. Myrtle Allen Pate, received a total of 373 and 345 votes, respectively.

An eighth member of the present City Council here, Watt Hale was re-elected in the voting at Depot precinct over Sam Hale, 71 votes to 66. The Councilman representing this precinct (West Prestonsburg) is not elected by city-wide vote as in the cases of the other seven members of the Council.

At Martin Denzil Halbert, Martin county athletic coach, was elected Mayor on the Bee Hive ticket representing the administration over J. H. Osborne, 225 votes to 144. He will succeed E. P. Grigsby, who did not seek re-election. Councilmen elected there on the Bee Hive ticket were Charles H. Stanley, Leonard Osborne, John P. Sammons, Eugene Frazier.

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ADAMS' DEATH CAUSE AWAITS

Autopsy Findings, Said; Former Cliff Resident Becomes Ill in Factory

Cause of the death of William W. Adams, 42-year-old native of this county, in a Cincinnati hospital Saturday afternoon awaits findings from an autopsy, it was said here this week.

Mr. Adams, an employee of the Fisher Body Co., Cincinnati, became ill six days previous to his death and fell unconscious while at work. He suffered three broken ribs, and thereafter was intermittently in a coma.

He was a son of J. B. Adams, of Cliff, and the late Victoria Howard Adams who died a year ago. One daughter, Miss Wanda May Adams of Ragland, W. Va., survives as do the following sisters and a brother: Mrs. Tom Calhoun, of Prestonsburg, Mrs. Minerva Howell, of Cliff, Mrs. Laura Hanson, Phoenix, Ariz., Mrs. Alma Zennie, Cincinnati, Mrs. Emzie Cisco and Mrs. B. P. Collins, both of Martin, and James Adams, of Brooklyn.

Funeral rites were conducted at the Pruitt Memorial Chapel on Abbott Creek, the Rev. Ira McMillen, Jr., officiating. Burial was made in the Arnett cemetery at West Prestonsburg under direction of the Carter and Callihan Funeral Home.

Doctors Offer Services In Next Week's Clinics

Floyd county doctors will join hands with the Floyd County Health Department next week in five mass immunization clinics in an effort to give first polio shots to children, ages 1 through 9.

Beginning next Monday, parents will have the opportunity to get first polio shots free of charge for all children in this age group. The clinics have been planned as follows: Monday, Nov. 14, at the Martin school; Tuesday, Nov. 15, at the Betsy Layne school; Wednesday, Nov. 16, at the Floyd County Health Department; Thursday, Nov. 17, at the Wheelwright Community Center hall; Friday, Nov. 18, at the Garrett school. Clinics will open at 9:00 a. m., and continue until all who come have been taken care of.

The Floyd county school system has volunteered its services in getting parental permission slips to parents for their signatures, providing clinic sites and school bus transportation for all children ages 5 to 9. The buses are not permitted to carry children under this age limit. Parents who have children between the ages of 1 and 5 will have to provide their own transportation to clinic sites.

There must be a permission slip signed by either parent for every child, it was emphasized this week. This is a must for all immunizations before public health workers are permitted to render such service. Any parent who has not received a blank permission slip may obtain one at the clinic site and sign it there at the same time his or her child is immunized.

\$4,000 SAVING IS NECESSARY

To Get Health Center Work Here Under Way As New Funds Raised

If a saving of \$4,000 can be effected somewhere, contract on construction of the proposed Floyd County Health Center will probably be awarded today (Thursday) by the State Buildings & Properties Commission.

After the low bid on the project, that the Home Appliance Company, Prestonsburg, was found to be \$105,970, the Commission rejected the bid, since only \$75,000 had been earmarked for the job. Quick action was demanded, and the Floyd fiscal court last week appropriated an additional \$7,700 from the county hospital fund to meet part of the additional cost, with the provision that that amount be matched by the state and the amount appropriated by both county and state be matched by Hill-Burton federal funds.

Another trip to Frankfort by officials resulted in assurance of Hill-Burton funds. The state later made \$7,500 available, and the Hill-Burton contribution amounted to \$15,000.

HALF OF JOB IS COMPLETE

Cook Says In Reporting On Dog Law Work; Says 350 Stray Dogs Killed

With approximately half of the county worked, Roy Cook, county dog warden, expects to complete his coverage of the county in enforcement of the new state dog law by the last of February or the middle of March, he said this week.

To date, more than 350 unwanted stray dogs have been destroyed, while homes for about 30 have been found, Cook said. At Wayland 16 strays were picked up in five hours a few days ago.

The dog warden this week is completing his work in the Right Beaver section of the county, and will move next week to Left Beaver Creek where he will remain till the job is completed. He expressed his appreciation of the cooperation offered by citizens and had particular praise for the Stone Coal and Wayland communities where he most recently worked.

Dog tags may be procured at the following points on the Beaver Creeks: Viola Stewart's Store, Langley; Francis Hardware, Garrett; Hawley Scott's Store, Stone Coal; John Spurlock, Printer; Henry Reitz, Drift; Ellis Martin, Minnie; George Newman, Hi Hat.

"I will appreciate the people in these communities coming to these places and getting their tags," Cook said. "If they have any strays, I suggest they tie them up so we can be sure to get them."

Prestonsburg is one of the spots in the lower section of the county where the dog warden's work has not been completed.

INLAND COAL AMPLE HERE

Company President Says East Kentucky Reserves Are Sufficient for Needs

Predicting a brilliant outlook for his own company, Joseph L. Block, president of the Inland Steel Company, in an address last Thursday before the New York Society of Security Analysts, described Inland's coal mines in Eastern Kentucky as "ample to take care of our needs for high volatile coal for many years to come."

At the same time he disclosed that the company owns low volatile coal properties in West Virginia for future development and others in southern Illinois regarded as of great economic value to the company.

Scores of Floyd county farmers, 4-H Club members and exhibitors at the 1955 county fair and others will be awarded certificates, medals or prize money at an Achievement Night program here Friday at the grade school auditorium. Thomas Eryant, who for 30 years was associate dean and director of the University of Kentucky's Extension Service, will be the principal speaker.

"We are trying to recognize the farmers, 4-H Club members, Council members and all the others who have contributed to the agricultural progress of this county," said County Agent O. E. Boggs. "All who have in any way performed an outstanding job on the farms are entitled to this recognition," he added.

Trophies for the occasion, contributed by Prestonsburg businessmen, have been on display here for several weeks. Names of most winners of the awards will not be made public until tomorrow night. Some names, however, have already been released.

1. Corn Derby. Trophies for first, second and third place are to be given by the Prestonsburg Kiwanis Club.

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HAROLD FIRM GRANTED AID

Telephone Company Gets REA Grant of \$337,000; Dial System Is Planned

The Harold Telephone Company has been granted a \$337,000 loan by the Rural Electrification Administration at Washington, it was announced this week by Paul R. Gearheart, president of the company. The loan will be used for expansion in the area served by the company, it was said.

Gearheart, who acquired the property of the old Roberts Olga Telephone Company over two years ago, had a survey made by an engineering company to determine the potential expansion possibilities of his company preliminary to the loan application. Results of the survey were highly favorable for expansion, the engineers said, and a potential addition to 1,000 subscribers to the company's service was seen.

Gearheart says that a dial system will be installed and the additional 1,000 telephones will be chiefly on new lines and in his area. Lines on Frater Creek, Mare Creek, several tributaries of Big Mud and other localities are planned for the future.

Since Gearheart acquired the Roberts Olga Telephone Company he has been installing new lines and poles and seeking to increase the efficiency of service to his present 125 subscribers. The organization of a stock company is being considered, it was said, with shares to be offered to the public. The original telephone company organized in the Harold area was set up by B. F. Elliott about 40 years ago but he sold to Mrs. James Roberts who organized the Roberts Olga Telephone Company. Gearheart, the present company's president, is a grandson of Mrs. Roberts.

Hayes Metal Products Starts Work Trebling Size of Hi Hat Plant

Excavation is near completion for construction work which will treble the size of the plant at Hi Hat of the Hayes Metal Products Company, it was announced recently.

The firm will itself do most of the construction work, which will see the building of a 30 by 50-foot structure. The walls will be of concrete block, the remainder in steel. In addition to this building, the Betty Jean Calhoun store building will be put into use as the company's main office and supply room, and another large building will be used for employe recreation and for a bath-house.

The Hi Hat firm also plans the manufacture of new products, among which will be mine traction devices and its own hydraulic hoists. It hitherto has bought elsewhere the hydraulic hoists for use with heavy steel truck beds which it produces.

HUGE MARGIN OF CHANDLER SETS RECORD

Hogge, Bailey Apparently Elected With Democratic Slate for State Offices

The sun shone bright two days ago in Kentucky, and "Happy" Chandler, one of whose favorite songs is "My Old Kentucky Home," set to rest all doubts as to his popularity with the voters of the Commonwealth.

The former Governor, U. S. Senator and Baseball Commissioner swamped his Republican opponent, Edwin R. Denney, beneath a tide of votes that mounted higher than even the most optimistic Chandler supporter had ever predicted. This morning (Thursday) with approximately 85% of the state's precincts counted, Chandler's plurality in a four-man race for governorship stood around 120,000. Chandler himself had predicted he would defeat Denney by 113,000.

His lead is the greatest ever recorded by a candidate for Kentucky governor.

Floyd county turned in a Chandler majority over Judge Denney, of 2,211 votes. The vote in this county for the other two candidates for the post, Jesse K. Lewis, independent, and Dr. Garrison on the Prohibition ticket, was negligible. Chandler polled 6,080 votes in this county to 3,869 for Denney.

The voting was quiet in this county, despite the fact that three city elections had generated some heat. Tabulation of the vote was completed Wednesday night, but only the Chandler-Denney vote had been tallied this morning.

Swept into office was the entire Democratic state ticket, some of whom ran ahead even of Chandler. Judge Astor Hogge in his race for a one-year unexpired term to the Court of Appeals was leading Robert B. Bird, Republican 51,107 votes to 33,374, with 645 of the 1,055 precincts in the Seventh appellate district counted. The G.O.P. may also have lost its Third district Railroad Commissioner. Pleaz W. Mobley, Manchester Republican was trailing Walter J. Bailey, Democrat, by 11,984 votes with two-thirds of the ballots tabulated.

By next election approximately 150,000 new voters will be added to the registration lists as a result of last Tuesday's election. The voters

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STEPHENS YET IN LOUISIANA

Floyd Sheriff Awaits Word Before Leaving To Return Prisoner

Bob Stephens, who has confessed to the slaying 21-years ago of Lacey Hunt in this county, remains in Baton Rouge, La., jail while the Floyd county Sheriff's office awaits word from Louisiana authorities that he is ready for release to this county.

Governor Wetherby's office has notified Sheriff Gorman Collins that he has issued a requisition for Stephens' extradition. The extradition papers will be issued by the Governor of Louisiana, and when this is done the Sheriff will be notified.

Stephens claims he killed Hunt, a 72-year-old resident of the Sugar Loaf Community, in self-defense. "Watch what you put out about me," he warned a reporter for a Baton Rouge newspaperman last week. "I'm going to plead not guilty up there, and if I come out of this all right, I'll come back and sue you."

In a statement issued from his jail cell and signed, "Sam Stephenson," Stephens added:

"I will be leaving Louisiana soon to go on trial in my home state of Kentucky for a crime I am supposed to have committed 21 years ago. If I am guilty, I should pay for my crime. But please bear in mind that a person is innocent until he is proved guilty.

"I hope that justice will be done at my trial, and that I will be able to return to Louisiana and my family and spend the rest of my short days here.

"Finally, I would like to ask all people who are Christians of all faiths to pray that justice will be done."

DELAY TRIAL IN DEATH SUIT

Former Officer Here Is Defendant in Case But Hearing Continued

W. L. Rice, whose appeal from a 21-year term in the slaying here of Reedy Wheeler has been filed with the Kentucky Court of Appeals, was returned Oct. 22 to the Floyd county jail and remains a prisoner here this week.

Rice was brought here from LaGrange reformatory to appear as witness in the damage suit filed against him. Sheriff Gorman Collins and their bondsmen by Mrs. Wheeler. The case was continued, however, until March 7.

Jailed recently were Steve Smith, who was fined \$20 and given a 30-day sentence after trial in Magistrate Grover Holbrook's court on a charge of possessing whiskey in a taxicab, and Marvin Pannin, who was arrested by State Trooper Armitage on a drunk driving charge. Smith later executed bond and is appealing his case to circuit court. Other recent arrests:

of the state approved Constitutional Amendment No. 1 which gives 18-year-olds the right to vote. Kentucky is the second state in the Union to adopt voting rights for this age-group. Georgia was first.

Amendment No. 2, which eliminates taxation of household goods, apparently has been approved also. The 57-year-old **Chandler** said that with the "blessings of Almighty God" he would undertake "to discharge the heavy responsibilities with whatever strength and intelligence and devotion I have."

He said he would "need the support, the forbearance and the prayers of all of our people which have sustained me through the hardships" of the campaign.

Denney, former United States district attorney who lost his first state-wide race, had no comments to make about the vote after conceding his defeat and congratulating the winner.

But **Eldon S. Dummit**, **Denney's** campaign chairman, said **Chandler's** final-week criticism of Agriculture Secretary **Benson's** farm policies weighed heavily against **Denney**. **Chandler** branded **Benson's** policies "a failure" and said a vote for **Denney** would "give aid and comfort to **Benson**."

State Senator Doug Hays, Representative **Lon C. Hill** of the 96th district and **David Martin, Jr.**, Democratic nominee for Representative from the 97th district of this county were elected without opposition.

The Governor-elect, as he had predicted, polled majorities in every Congressional district of the state except the heavily Republican Eighth, home of his opponent. The available gubernatorial vote in the Seventh:

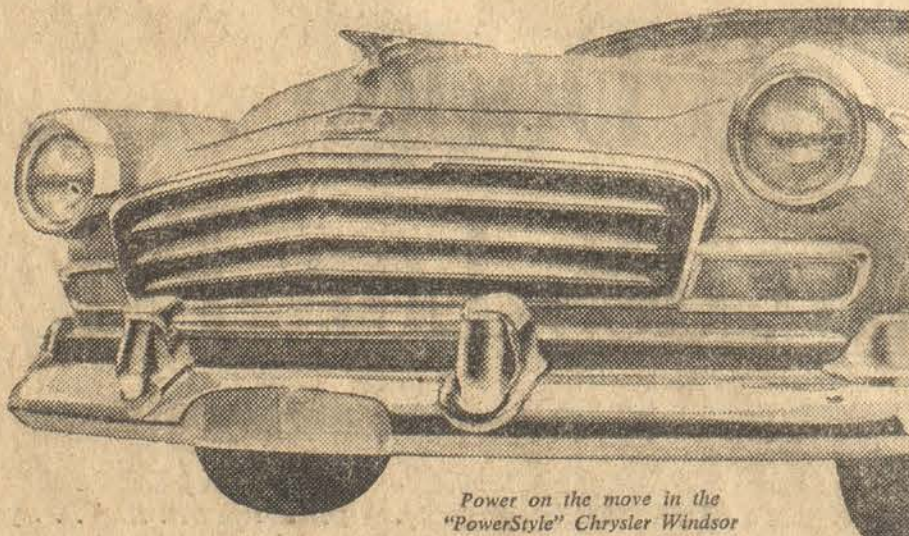

Few programs for public betterment in Kentucky have ever been so selflessly and and perfectly conceived and carried out as was this idea of taking reading matter out to the people. Its effect in this county, as elsewhere, was first noted in the schools and then in the homes. None can predict the far-reaching effect this splendid service will have on the thinking, the morals, the citizenship and even the economy of the county in the years ahead; for a book dropped into the right hands is as a pebble tossed into the water from which ever-widening rings proceed.

In this county administration of the Bookmobile project by a Library Board that is deeply interested in this important phase of education and by a librarian-driver to whom the work is more than a mere job and money earned has made the program effective beyond the hopes of the most enthusiastic. pany "in the not-too-distant future."

Shortly before his New York speech Block announced a three-year expansion program for Inland's East Chicago steel plant. The program, he said, will lift Inland's steel-making capacity by 15% to 6,000,000 tons of ingots by 1959. The expansion project will involve the expenditure of \$265,000,000, he said.

Looking to 1956, Block told the New York group that the demand for steel now seems "insatiable." Describing the outlook for the steel industry, Block said, "I share the view that in the next decade or two the steel industry will have to expand at a rate somewhere between two and a half million and four million tons a year."

COAL LOADING ON INCREASE

In the Big Sandy Field; Coal Production Report Shows Rise Since Spring

Coal production in the field represented by the Big Sandy-Elkhorn Coal Operators Association increased 29.79 per cent over the corresponding period last year, a weekly report for the period ending Oct. 29 shows. The report for that week showed the Association mines loading a total of 7,045.8 cars of 50 tons each which was the highest production reached in any one week this year.

The percentage increase in tons was 2,486,740 tons over last year and the increased tonnage was partially due to the added number of days of mining each week. Last year, to this date, only an average 144.92 days had been worked but this year the figure reached an average 181.67 days.

The production rise in coal in the field represented by the Association has been going up since the first of the year, a summary of the group's reports show. The week ending Oct. 22 the total of 50 ton cars was 6,547.4 and the rise has been gradual since late spring. Coal men however anticipate a lessened production by the end of November when the Great Lakes freeze.

Production actually exceeded the present 29.79 per cent increase over last year in the three weeks immediately preceding the last report. These three weeks the production excess amounted to 30 percent plus. Total cars loaded last year by the Association mines reached only 166,924.8 but this year loadings stood at 216,659.6 cars. Last year tonnage for the same period as this year was 8,346,240 tons but it stands now at 10,832,980.

TIDBITS OF KENTUCKY FOLKLORE

"Drummers and Traveling Salesmen"

There has always been a trick of calling objects by plain or fancy names, according to the company present or the social standing of the speaker. Hence there are hosts of synonyms in language, so many that it requires a good-sized lifetime to master them and their subtle differences. There are crude words, ordinary words, dress-up words, religious words, political words, man words, woman words, child words. Not to know which one to use often makes a fellow regarded as green or coarse or pious or hypocritical. Suppose we take the two words or expressions "drummer" and "traveling salesman" as illustrations.

If the dictionary knew its stuff, these two would be listed as synonyms, and within very wide bounds they are. But in the strictest sense they are not. The drummer was a man who was half real, half the creation of the folk. In the days when most people had never been far away, the drummer, nattily dressed and riding in a "double rig," seemed like somebody else from away off, a sort of metropolitan figure that breezed into remote neighborhoods at intervals and brought samples of what the big world was eating or wearing. Most of the time the drummer was DRIVEN by a colored or white man whom the livery stable had employed for just such important duties. The driver took care of the "rig" and the horses; the drummer had nothing to do but take care of his big trunks of samples and his immaculate clothes. Prince Charming probably never looked quite so appealing as did this dude from the Big World. It was a great event to be in the country store when the drummer arrived; the yarn-spinners at the stove or on the front porch talked in subdued tones to hear what the store keeper and the drummer were saying. I used to feel doubly honored by being sent to trade in a basket of eggs at the store if I could see a drummer. We had one that was well over six feet tall and was red-headed. His comings and goings were as regular as those of Halley's Comet. Every spring and fall he came into Fidelity, maybe proving thereby that the earth is round, or that the sun is the center, or something.

But there was another side to drummers that I heard little about at Fidelity. Maybe our drummers were circumspect, or maybe I was

too young and dumb to understand. I refer, of course, to the heart-smashing tendencies of the drummer as he appears in back-country areas generally. In other places I have found enough wild yarns about drummers to fill a good-sized book, all of them about the way the country girls fell for the wild fellows and how fickle all the drummers were. To have run away with a drummer was regarded as the lowest sort of calamity to befall any girl. But the same winning manners seem to have persisted, for even the youngest of my students tell the same sort of yarns about the weak little girls who could not resist the drummer's oily smile and charming manners.

Now what is a traveling salesman? He goes around to places to sell his firm's stuff, just like the drummer, but he is likely to be driving his own car and counting the miles or the hours until he can get back to his home or his headquarters. Sometimes he tramps the streets between customers and looks about as foot-weary as most peripatetics. He has manners, yes, but rarely the oily smile that the drummer inherited or else acquired. I hear no modern risqué yarns about the salesman except those that were old and have to substitute traveling salesman for drummer, long after the genuine flavor of such yarns has passed. And so, with the coming of automobiles and quicker transportation, the picturesque drummer has passed off the scene; within a few decades any story told about him will have to be footnoted as much as American stories containing slang have to be explained learnedly to the British people who read them. "Did you ever hear about the drummer that . . . ?"

IT'S A GOOD WORLD

In another good editorial last week our editor cited the huge decline in murders, in this county, the last twenty-three years. Indeed Floyd has come a long way. Mr. Allen lacked space to list a few other causes of the decrease. He omitted the prayers of the God-fearing men and women who have glorified every generation in mountain history. Always some who kept hoping and working for a brighter day were the leavening agent.

Such an individual was one man Kentucky lost not long ago. He rose from a humble home to a high position in the nation. Had he agreed to run, he could have been nominated for the presidency. Reliable reports claim that shortly before his death, wealthy, influential ones from afar offered him an unbelievably high sum of money to influence a decision, in a notable case. The bribery would never have been known. But, true to the best in mountain caliber and tradition, he said, No. Others like him have always been a powerful force for good here.

Another factor responsible for improvement is the many good church and school leaders who lose no opportunity to help Godly parents convince the youth that one does not have to be high-tempered just because some of his ancestors were.

Mr. Allen's editorial might well be placed on every school bulletin board in this county. Teachers would do well to discuss it with boys and girls, who can still lower the present murder rate. Side by side with his editorial on the bulletin board, youngsters would place future goals, so the next quarter of a century will see a similar decrease in assault and battery and other types of cases which remain too numerous.

If youths in schools are properly trained and taught, they can do

much to stamp out prejudice, illiteracy, superstition, and want. If enough admit actual conditions, as the editor and many leaders have, and pull together, the present generation can remove them without waiting till these youngsters grow up. More of us need to recognize that the needy are primarily OUR responsibility. The interest manifested in them by the community and county will in many respects largely determine the extent of concern they receive from state and federal governments. Aid or relief may continue regardless, but they are not a permanent solution. Actually, they prove to be a costly handicap in the long run, to recipients and taxpayers both. We need also to realize that many of these poverty-stricken people have made a valuable contribution to our heritage.

The editor rightly gave much credit to increased education and civilization, pointing out that idleness alone breeds mischief. That statement called to mind two others. One: It came from the pen of the late W. R. Thomas, of Allen. You will find it in his book about our section. He quoted that witty statement one judge gave when instructing a grand jury, "Gentlemen, whenever you see a great big overgrown buck, sitting at the mouth of some holler, or at the forks of some road, with a big slouch hat on, a blue collar or celluloid, artificial roses in his coat lapel, and a banjo strung across his breast, and a-picking 'n' Sourwood Mountain, fine that man, gentlemen, fine him! For if he hasn't already done somethin', he's a-goin' to!"

Second: The other remark which proves idleness breeds trouble came from a high school principal, who once said the difference between his community before and after high school students started taking magazine subscriptions there, was unbelievably striking, as prior to that time only a small minority of the population read many magazines. Today vast numbers use numerous good ones.

How many of us pause to think of what the Bookmobile project is doing in that line? Often it reaches many who otherwise would have little or nothing to read. Do we, like Mrs. R. V. May, remember to call Mr. Wallace to pick up discarded magazines, which may be the only ones some families have for a year? I was shocked to find how few pupils in my classroom have magazines at home, and how few subscribed to a daily paper. Most of us take such things for granted. One child said, "Mother and Daddy love the pictures, but they can't read much." A small boy reported that he was teaching his dad to read.

How many of us think to donate one good book a year to the Bookmobile? How many churches, Sunday schools and other religious organizations collect Christian literature to send by Mr. Wallace wherever it is wanted or needed? Missionary Societies would do well to contribute some Bible books for little folks specially—not doctrinal ones—but character-building stories, fine for every child.

Our county could not be more fortunate in its choice of Bookmobile worker. The task is not a job to Bob Wallace. It is a CALLING to him. He loves it; he loves books. He loves every child and adult he serves. Hear him over WPRY Saturday at 9:30.

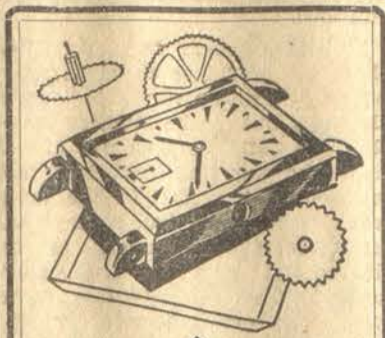
Jack K. Jones, of Wheelwright, was elected vice-president of Eastern State College Veterans Club.

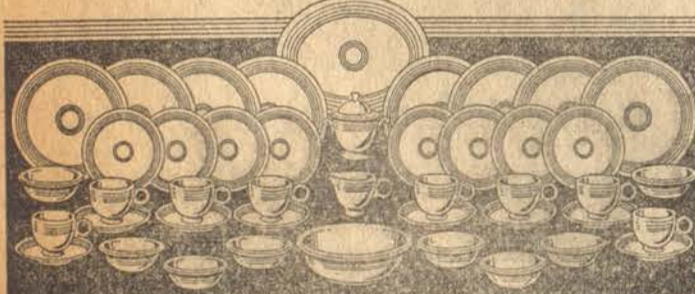

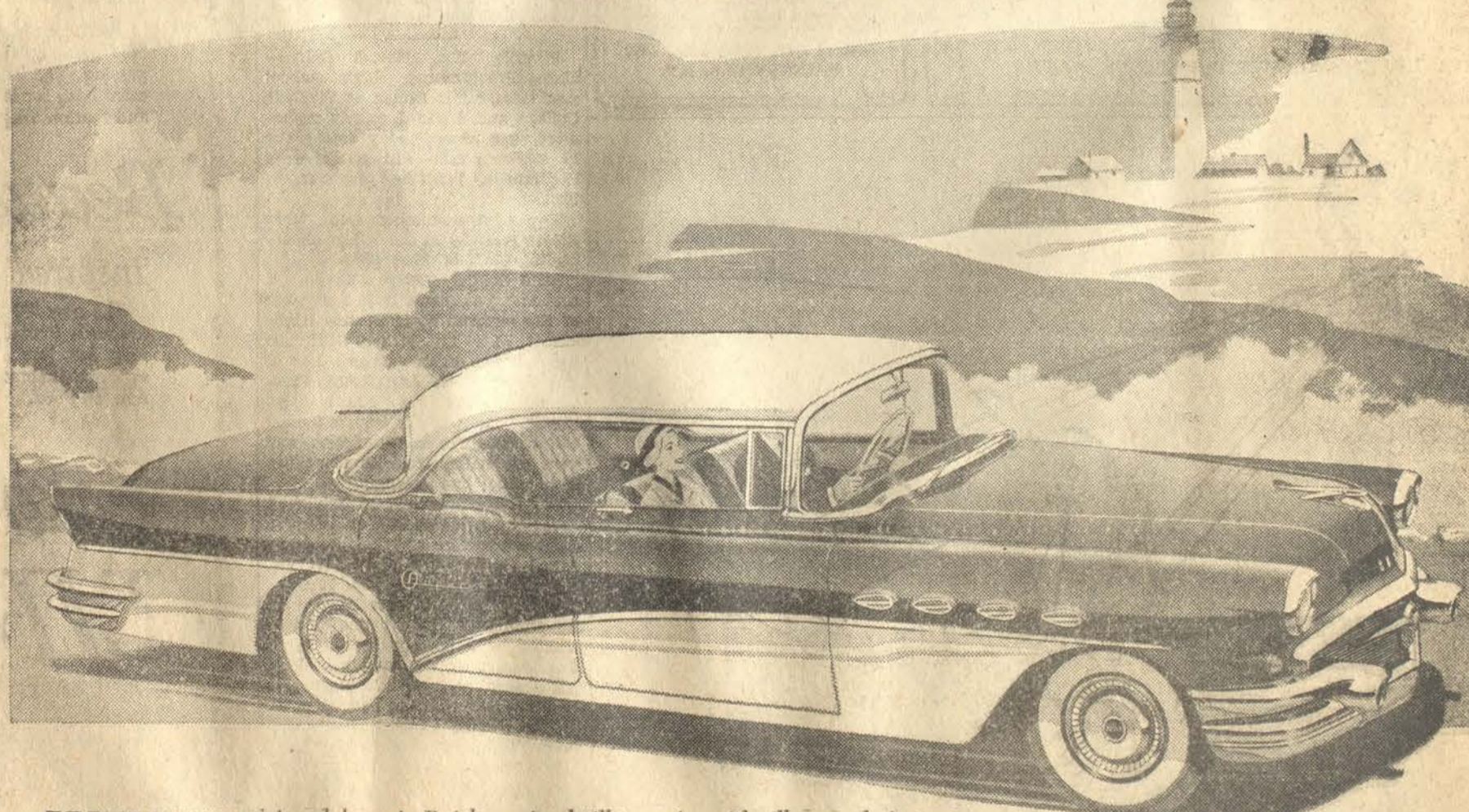

Norfolk, Va. — Taking part in a major amphibious exercise on the southeast coast of the U.S. with the 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing, Cherry Point, N. 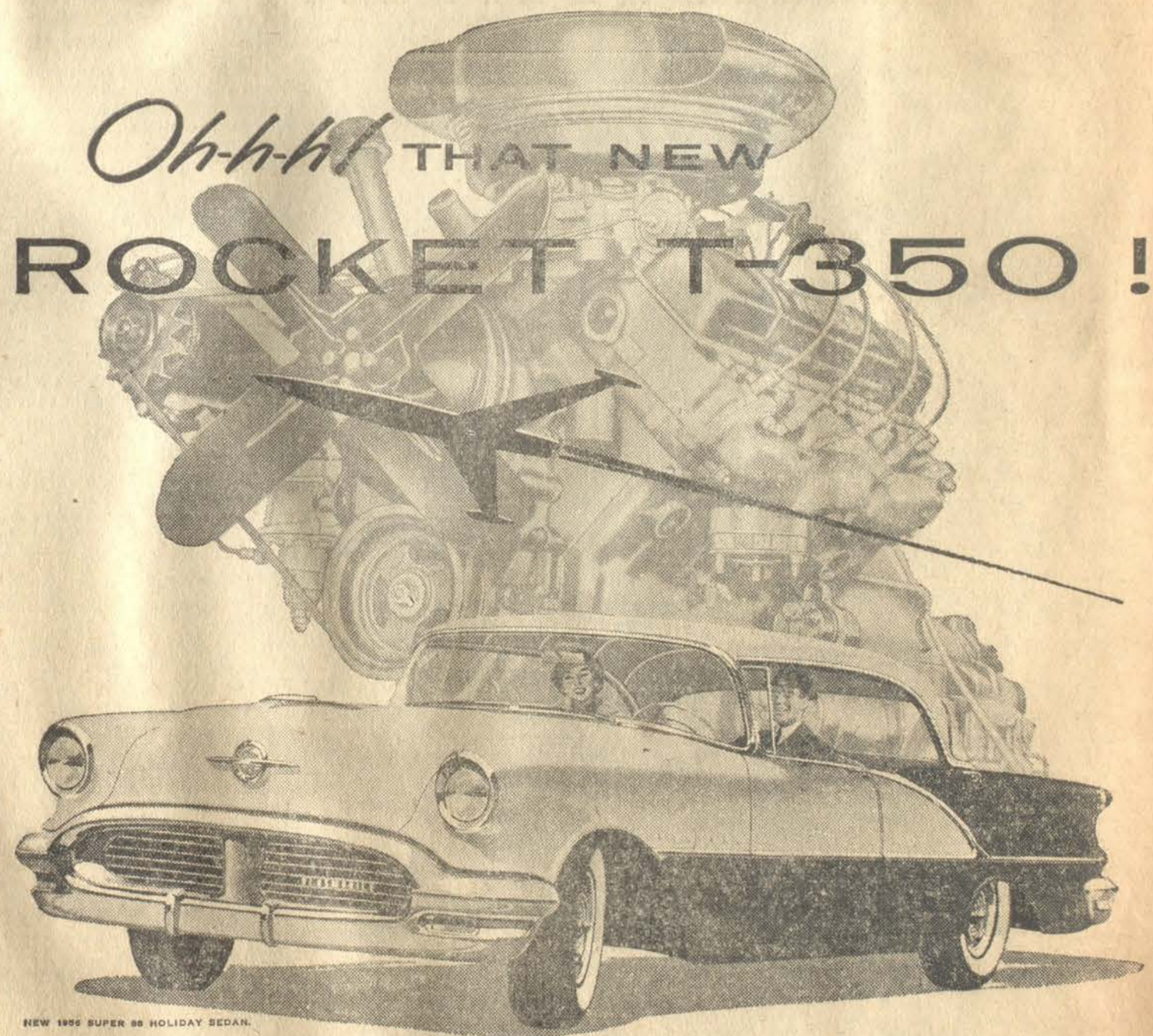
