Pikeville, Ky., Sept. 12 (Spl.) — Eight appointments to the faculty of Pikeville College were announced today as Pikeville's first semester as a three-year school opened.

Five are additions made necessary by the expansion program which will lead to the establishment of a four-year college at Pikeville next fall. Dr. A. A. Page, college president, said. The others, with four announced earlier, are replacements for teachers who resigned this year or are on leave of absence.

New instructors at Pikeville, and their teaching fields, are: Stanislaw Velinsky, Ph. D., Nashville, Tenn., education and psychology; Edward F. Cox, M. Vets Who Have Lost GI Term Insurance May Ask Replacement

Veterans of the Korean conflict who lost their World War I or II GI term insurance because their policies expired within 120 days after their discharge may now apply for replacement of that term insurance under a new law, O. H. Gerald, Acting Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Louisville, announced. The new act is Public Law 194, 84th Congress, Gerald added.

Under this new act, veterans whose GI term insurance expires after April 25, 1951, either while they are in active service or within 120 days after discharge may replace such insurance within 120 days after discharge, or within 120 days after July 29, 1955, whichever is later.

They must file application, meet good health requirements and pay the premium at their attained age in order to qualify.

Previously, only those GI term policies that expired while the policyholders were in active service after April 25, 1951, could be replaced within 120 days after discharge. No provision was made for the replacement of term policies that expired within the 120-day period after discharge. The new law adds the latter period for replacement.

In addition, the new law grants another opportunity for replacement to those persons whose term policies expired while they were in active service after April 25, 1951, but who failed to apply for replacement within 120 days after discharge. These persons now have 120 days after July 29, 1955, in which to apply.

Gerald said detailed information may be obtained from any VA office or by writing to the District Office where the Kentucky veteran's insurance records are maintained at P. O. Box 8079, Philadelphia 1, Pennsylvania.

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

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LEGISLATION HELPS LITTLE

Says Industry Speaker; Neither Does It Hurt Irreparably, He Adds

PUT-IN-BAY, O., Sept. 8 — A coal industry spokesman said here today that legislation enacted during the first session of the 84th Congress "neither helped us greatly nor harmed us irreparably." In an address before a meeting of the joint committees on land and water use of the National Coal Association and American Mining Congress, G. Don Sullivan, administrative assistant of the coal association, explained that the full impact of congressional action will not become evident until the effectiveness of national defense amendment to the Trade Agreement Act is determined. (The amendment, which was adopted in lieu of attempts by oil and coal state legislators to place a quota limitation on oil imports, provides for holding the imports at 1954 proportions).

Mr. Sullivan told his audience that the amendment "was not wholly acceptable" to the coal industry, but that the provision—if enforced—can nevertheless curb the "progressive usurpation" of coal's East coast markets by importers of residual oil. He added that the coal industry is prepared to continue during the next session of Congress the crusade for a 10 per cent quota restriction on crude and residual oil.

The industry will also resume efforts to have Congress remove other competitive burdens, including below-cost sales of natural gas to industrial customers, Mr. Sullivan declared.

In his address on "Washington Perspective," Mr. Sullivan reviewed recent developments in the various federal agencies which are charged with the responsibility of issuing regulations and orders affecting energy fuels. Quoting a Cabinet committee's recommendation that railroad freight rates be adjusted to remove "the excessive and disproportionate contribution that coal rates are making to meet the cost of other unprofitable services of the railroad industry," the National Coal official said that his industry is "hoping for expeditious action" by the railroad and Interstate Commerce Commission.
