## T. B. Hospitals Have Eliminated Waiting Lists

Kentucky's biggest move against tuberculosis came in 1944, when the General Assembly created the State Tuberculosis Hospital Commission and six districts, each to be served by a hospital.

How may a patient take advantage of services offered by the TB hospitals? The Commonwealth Magazine outlines this procedure for being admitted to one of the institutions:

A physician or a county health department fills out the patient's application, lists his medical history and attaches an X-ray film of the chest.

Each application must be signed by the county judge of the patient's county. The judge must certify that the patient has been a resident of Kentucky for 12 months. The year's residency requirement has been established in most states.

The application goes to the TB hospital in the patient's district. The district hospital director notifies the patient when a bed will be available.

## BEARS IN 1ST SEASON LOSS

**Pikeville College Quint Upset in "Warm-Up" Meet By Concord College Five**

Pikeville, Ky., Dec. 1 (Spl.) — The Pikeville College Bears, after their only defeat of the young basketball season, took third place in the West Virginia Tech "Warm-Up tournament" Saturday at Montgomery, W. Va.

The Bears rolled easily over Concord College of (West Virginia, 94-77 in the tournament's consolation game Saturday night, to stand 4-1 on the season. They missed the championship finals by only six points, as the host Golden Bears of West Virginia Tech edged them 99-94 on Friday.

Under Coach Bill Daniels, the Bruins had won their only conference game of the season earlier in the week, roaring past the Transylvania College Pioneers 101-77, Monday.

Scoring honors were handed around the Bears squad last week. Donnis Butcher, the Bears' top point-maker to date, was high-point man Saturday night with 29 points, after Garrett Mullins had led the squad with 24 points the night before, and George Carroll's 38 markers had been tops against Transy.

Mullins also took over the top spot at rebounding for the Bears, snaring 25 rebounds, a season record, against West Virginia Tech. He got 15 more on Saturday to bring his season total to 85 rebounds in five games, an average of 17 per game.

The Bears piled up a 10-0 opening lead over Concord, then coasted to their 17-point winning margin, 94-77, without being tied or headed. They held a 54-30 half advantage. Eleven men scored and the entire squad got a workout in the easy win over the West Virginians, who are scheduled to meet the Bears in two regular-season games in January and February.

Free throws lost the West Virginia Tech game for the Bears, as each team dropped in 31 field goals and each was called for 35 personal fouls. The host Golden Bears converted only 68.5 per cent of their free throws, getting 15 for 54, but the Danielsmen took just 32 of their 56 chances, dropping to their lowest average of the year, a feeble 57.1 per cent. The Bears are to entertain the cagers of Knoxville College and Kentucky State College, respectively, on Monday and Wednesday of this week. They will play in two other home games—against Kentucky State College, Saturday evening, and Tusculum Monday evening—and next week will go on the road to play Villa Madonna at Covington, Thursday, and Georgetown College at Georgetown, Friday.

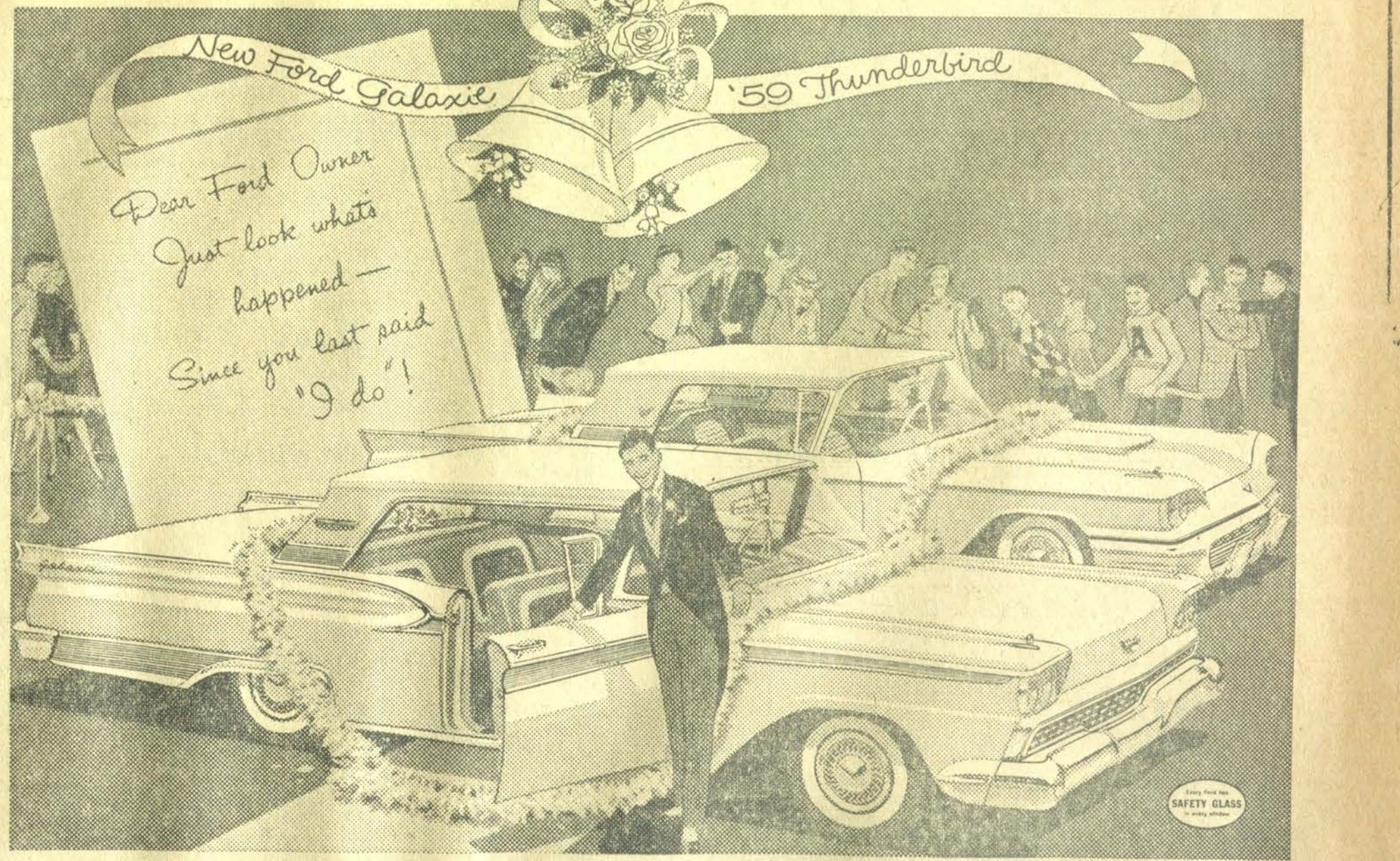

### FLOYD COUNTY MEN FIGURE IN RICH SILICA DISCOVERY

Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 23 — A freakish mountainside crust of shining white silica, discovered in a region where coal long has been king, is offering Eastern Kentucky new hope of economic improvement.

Geologists and industrial promoters agree the Pike County deposit could lure a large number of industries, chiefly in the glass field.

Although used primarily for glass, silica sand is in demand for foundry purposes, filter beds, abrasive, engine sand, and plaster. It is useful in metallurgy, missiles and cosmetics.

The Kentucky Silica Products Corporation has been organized to develop and market the Pike County silica. The owners believe the deposit is the largest source of high-purity silica in the United States.

It is on a ridge about 2,800 feet above sea level, reachable only by an unimproved dirt road off KY 197 south of Elkhorn City.

Incorporators of the lease-holding firm were Joe Weddington, Prestonsburg; James E. Vance, Pikeville, and George Norvel, Point Pleasant, W. Va.

Weddington said the deposit is 2½ miles long, 200 to 400 feet high, and contains an estimated 600,000,000 or more tons of high-quality silica sand.

By comparison, a promising new silica operation at Murray has an estimated reserve of 20,000,000 tons.

Weddington had a ready answer to the obvious question; How has the Pike county deposit escaped notice so long?

"It just wasn't supposed to be there," he said. "A deposit of silica sand at the top of a ridge is a freak formation. Another reason is that the deposit's location is so remote and inaccessible."

He said the Kentucky Geological Survey was "about to find" the deposit. It had been working along the Pine Mountain Fault in Bell, Harlan and Letcher counties but hadn't reached the Pike county location.

Preston McGrain, a geologist with the survey, took samples from the deposit at the request of the promoters, but said analyses have not been completed.

"The deposit definitely has a potential," he said. "It is better from a marketing standpoint than some other deposits because it has a dozen different uses where some silica is limited in its use."

"The Pike County silica obviously is high in purity and low in iron, the most objectionable impurity of some silica."

McGrain said Ashland would seem to be in a position to benefit most industrially from the discovery since it is on a direct rail line and has an unlimited water supply.

Highly industrialized East Tennessee, also linked directly by rail, might profit.

The Clinchfield Railroad, running southward from Elkhorn City, has displayed a keen interest in the deposit since its discovery.

George M. Timberman, industrial agent for the railroad, observed:

"It is obvious that there is a tremendous amount of material in the area. The samples tested by a concern now in the glass-production industry indicate this material will make an excellent glass sand."

"We feel that the development of this natural resource in Eastern Kentucky should be interesting to those companies concerned in glass manufacturing."

"Since the time Kentucky Silica Products Corporation determined to develop this deposit, the

railroad's industrial department has had an opportunity to discuss the location and development of the deposit with several large glass companies and they have indicated an interest that is more than passive.

"We feel that the location of this source of silica sand will cause the glass industry to look at site locations within a radius of several hundred miles."

Spokesmen in the Kentucky Department of Economic Development said they have been co-operating with glass manufacturers indicating an interest in Kentucky locations.

Weddington said Ky-Sil should enjoy a good competitive advantage with other silica operations at markets in Kentucky, West Virginia, Indiana, Ohio and Pennsylvania.

He pointed out that Huntington, W. Va., a short distance from the deposit, absorbs 100,000 tons of silica sand annually, and Charleston, W. Va., uses 166,000 tons a year.

The current market price of silica ranges from \$2.65 to around \$4 a ton. Weddington said Ky-Sil will be able to produce its sand at about \$1.88 a ton at a rate of 1,000 tons a day.

The plan is to blast it off the mountainside and run it by conveyor belt to stockpiles at the preparation-plant level.

The company is in the process of completing its corporation structure and has no definite plans for starting production.

The nomination blanks may be secured from either of the district chairmen, or from the state chairman, Mrs. Peters, at Trenton, Kentucky.

Mrs. M. H. Holliday Sr., Jackson, Ky., who is the 1958 State Mother, has been named chairman of the Seventh district.

Nominees for the State Mother may be sponsored by a church or civic organization or an individual. Requests for the 1959 nomination blanks in the Seventh District or for additional information may be sent to Mrs. Holliday at Jackson.
