

A close look into the economic ills of Eastern Kentucky and its growth potential was being made this week by high-ranking federal officials. members of Congress and industrial leaders.


This was being done during a three-day tour of the region under hte Eastern Kentucky Regional

Based on the total assessed valuation of the County which we understand is \$38, 922, 986.00 AN AVERAGE ANNUAL TAX LEVY OF ONLY 7¢ PER \$100 ASSESSMENT will be sufficient to pay off all the bonds and the interest over the specified number of years the bonds are to be paid. In our opinion this is a very small cost for securing a new courthouse which would be a tremendous asset to the County.



Completion of the projects will be done under the 1958 Force Account Act, which permits the state to use its forces, without seeking bids, when the cost of individual projects does not exceed \$12,000. According to estimates of R. L. Parker, a state engineer, the 10 Knott county roads will cost \$3,603 to \$11,938. His estimates take into account only grade and drain work. "Even if we considered surfacing the roads now," Byrley said, "it could not be done until spring." He said the decision by Highway Commissioner Ward J. Oates to complete the projects was moti-







# A Pictorial Review of East Kentucky

(No. 15 in a Series)



#### MARTIN VAN BUREN BATES, GIANT OF THE MOUNTAINS

Martin Van Buren Bates, native of Boone's Fork of the Kentucky River weighed 485 pounds but wasn't fat at all, being a man 7 feet and 4 inches tall. He wore size 23 shoes.

Bates married a Newfoundland woman who was as large as he was and taller. One child, weighing 20 pounds, died at birth from seasickness on the Atlantic ocean.

They joined a circus, traveled to England, where the King and Queen presented both with gold watches During the Civil War Bates became known for his Confederate sympathies and Capt. Jackson Allen (1814-1900) a Unionist of the Right Beaver Creek section of Floyd county, was sent to arrest him. Allen put the huge man on a horse, tied his legs together by running the rope under the horse's belly, and leading the animal, he brought Bates in as prisoner. Bates was allowed the run of the camp and enterprising soldiers began to show him for a price. Capt. Allen always said it was he who put Bates in the show business.
