

Testimony produced during the ourt of inquiry probe into causes tragedy was placed in the hands of the grand jury by County Judge Henry Stumbo immediatey after the jury was empanelled fuesday morning.

noted that the grand jury at the April term requested the court of inquiry. The requested probe was begun May 3 and continued till June 24. Eighty-nine witnesses 184 DISABLED were questioned and three persons submitted to lie detector GET BENEFITS tests at Frankfort, his statement reminded the jury.

The Court of Inquiry was complete in that all the known witsses were interrogated in detail and an accurate record of the testimony was made and transcribd. That record, together with the results of the lie detector test and all other available evidence is delivered to the grand jury for such action as it deems necessary or proper," Judge Stumbo's statement to the jury said.

Two Needs Among Many

Economists, amateurs and professionals alike, can with a great deal of academic fluency and profundity tell you why in the labor-capital picture such and such is happening. They can in most facile fashion point to the need for the delicate balance between wages and living expenses, the buying power of workers and the production power of plants, and so on to dizzying spirals of both thought and economy.

We have no such learning and can offer no panacea for our economic troubles. What we dare to offer can be expressed in plain, mill-run language.

It occurs to us that the situation has developed at least two great needs:

For a "Summit" conference between labor unions and industry leaders, to agree on a wage-price relationship and that agreement not to be made primarily for the good of the two groups involved but for the welfare of the United States.

2. Federal legislation providing for free election of all union officials, such election to be by secret ballot and all candidates for union office in opposition to incumbents given full protection as to their union rights and privileges.

Back to suggestion No. 1:

The current "recession" is the only economic depression suffered by the American people wherein employment drops, opportunity falls, the nation's payrolls decrease-and yet the cost of living rises and continues to rise. Now, as an end to this slump of many months is glimpsed, there is threatened a strike by the United Auto Workers unless the wage scale is hiked. And that could be the blow that might wipe out whatever gains that have been made. Steel is basic, and on automobile manufacture steel depends to a great degree. An increase in auto workers' wages now, with the resultant increase in automobile prices, would make a sick auto industry sicker, in turn affect steel and touch off a damaging chain reaction all along the line of the national economy, including Eastern Kentucky's coal. A strike could be equally deadening. For these and other cogent reasons industry and labor should meet at the top-not as they have met heretofore, as enemies, but as friendly rivals now joined in determining what is best for America first. then, with that higher-than-usual ideal before them, what is best for them. Higher wages for a few, higher prices for a few, bigger unemployment payrollsthese, obviously, are not the way to prosperity or a stronger nation. Free elections to name union officials must be provided, to give the worker in the ranks a voice in his labor union government. The convention method suits nobody but the top officials whose prime ambition is to stay in power at all costs. Hand-picked delegations, delegates cowd by strong-arm methods, wellgreased steam-rollers in parliamentary action inside convention halls keep the Hoffas and the Becks in power. Against these and their tyrannies the men who do the work and pay the union dues and give the breath of life to the union movement must have some protection. The decent wage-earner must be given a chance to rid his union of crooked officials, of despots, of all criminal elements that have given union labor the reputation it does not deserve. The right to vote should be his without threat of reprisal from higher up; the free choice of representatives and union officers is inherent under the American system of government but this has been lost sight of under the rule of a few top-echelon dictators and their satraps.

Kentucky squirrel hunters are having a rough time, but prospects should pick up in the next two weeks.

That's the gist of a special report released last week by Game Biologist Harold Barbar, West Liberty. leader of Kentucky's squirrel research project for the Division of Game.

Barbar, compiling early reports from wildlife biologists across the state, said hunting was fairly poor in Eastern Kentucky, traditionally one of the state's best areas, and not too much better in the Central and Western regions.

He looked for prospects to pick up, though, in the next several veeks

Prior to the opening of the season on August 15, biologists predicted a banner squirrel crop for hunters. They are still holding to that estimate, believing the current slow hunting is due primarily to weather and heavily foilaged trees,

not to any lack of squirrels. Barber said early hunting is always slow and that the most successful hunting occurs when squirrels reach a peak of activity-usually during late August in western and central Kentucky and September in the eastern region.


The state's wildlife biologists now

are in the field conducting squirrel hunters' bag checks, a regular weekly activity during the squirrel season. Working in every county in the state, they compile information back spot. used in determining population trends and health conditions, particularly the success of the previous breeding season. This information is subsequently used as one of the



Desha didn't have either saddlebags or pocketbook at the time. When Desha arrived at home, his appearance so terrified his wife whome he had married the year before that she left next morn-AND SERVICE . . . ing and never returned. The case was tried in Harrison county, where the Governor then resided. Judge John Rowan defended young Desha. As the evidence that had been introduced before the jury was conclusive, a verdict of death was returned, which was appealed. A new trial was granted but as the evidence was about the same as in the first trial, he was again convicted, and the verdict was death. His father believed his son was innocent and remained by the side of his son during both trials. Date for execution was set Friday, July 14, 1826. Isaac B. Desha still maintained that he was innocent and would not accept a pardcn, but let the law of the land take its course. He attempted to commit suicide by cutting his throat and severing his windpipe. His doctor reported that he could not recover. On June 18, 1827, Governor Desha granted his son a pardon. A tradition has existed all of the years since, that Governor Desha issued the pardon for his son, and immediately resigned as Governor, but he ddin't and he served his full term of four years, as the records at Frankfort show, retiring in 1828 when his successor had been elected. There is another tradition that Isaac B. Desha did recover, settled in one of the Central American countries, changed his name, married, reared a family, and became prominent in the country of his adoption.

#### THE ABBEY OF BELLAPAIS

In this picture stands one of the finest constructed Abbeys of the Middle Ages. It is located on the Island of Cyprus off the coast of Palestine some one hundred and sixty-five miles. This Abbey is first heard of as a House of the Augustinian Canons, a foundation of the king of Jerusalem, evidently Aimery de Lusignan who held that title from 1198 to 1205. These Augustinians came from Palestine where they held custody of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre before the loss of Jerusalem in 1187. They were refugees from their two Abbeys in the lost territory.

Documents from the fifteenth century refer to the Abbey by the name of Lapais, which is a corrupted form of the name it bears today. Its present name takes on a part of the local

village. From the above documents we learn that the Abbott of Bellapais assisted at the coronation of Queen Charlotte in 1458. The Abbotcy of Bellapais was always considered a rich prize.

The many conquerors of the Island treated it with varying re-spect. The worst blow was dealt it by the Turks who expelled thet Monks from the Island. They seized the Abbey and its properties but permitted the villagers to use the Church, which they have continued to do until this day.

The magnificient gothic style of Bellapais has received the admiration of all that have ever seen it. Its remains are carefully preserved today because of its artistic and historical interest.

Conservation Program To Rehabilitate Farms **Extended** By Congress


Senator John Sherman Cooper (R.-Ky.) said last week that Congress has extended the emergency Agricultural Conservation program. Hundreds of farmers in 31 counties in Eastern and Western Kentucky will receive cost-sharing payments under this program for restoration of conservation projects on farms which have suffered flood damage. The extension was included in the supplemental appropriation bill passed by the Senate Friday. If Congress had not acted, farmers with the rehabilitation work under way could not have been paid for projects which they had not completed by June 30.

"Three months ago I called the attention of the Senate to the fact that authority for this program would expire on June 30", stated Senator Cooper, who also introduced a bill at that time to extend the program. He pointed out that sufficient funds had already been appropriated for the program, but that the money could not be used after expiration of the legal authority

Senator Cooper previously wrote the Secretary of Agriculture, urging him to request extension of the emergency ACP program. Secretary Benson did request the extension, and President Eisenhower later recommended that Congress authorize continuation of the proeram



Mail service in the Big Sandy region began about the time of the organization of Floyd county. Two of the earliest postoffices were Mouth of Sandy, now Catlettsburg, and Prestonsburg. Soon afterward a postoffice was organized at Mouth of Beaver, now Allen, Laynesville, one of the valley's earliest, was kept by James S. Layne, pioneer resident, at the present Betsy Layne.

Mail was carried through the mountains on horseback before railway days. Many routes were mere "bridle paths" over the hills. Shown here is Cal Robinson, a veteran of decades on the mail route from Quicksand Creek to the Right Beaver section.

Today there are very few instances of mail transportation by horseback. The eep and truck have succeeded the horse, the railway has taken the place of hte steamboat packet. Air mail service circumscribes the valley insuring quick delivery to all parts of the nation and world.


