Miss Ruth Leslie, 4057 Nichols Avenue, N. W., Washington 24, D. C., writes, among many things, of her work with the National Genealogical Society. She is the author of 'Lesley, Leslie, 200 Years in America, 1755-1955."

She refers to an article in The Times on the Auxier family.

"Perhaps you have a copy (only a few exist) of Agnes Auxier's history of the family from which I quoted at length in my grandfather Leslie's section of the family history (Martin Leslie's wife was Sarah B. Auxier.) I knew Agnes when I was a little girl and she was working on it then. Mrs. Garland Rice (nee, Auxier) and Earl Atkinson, brother-in-law of Fanny Mayo Atkinson, were instrumental in giving it the 'light of day' long before Agnes' death. Much credit is due them, as well as Fanny, who presented me with a copy which I

prize very highly." Miss Leslie notes that her book on the Leslie family was reviewed in the National Genealogical

Society magazine. "It was in the March, 1957, issue that my Lesley, Leslie book was reviewed-by the man who is now the editor. An entire column was given to my book. He found only one fault (his words), and that was the lack of charts. I worked many weary days and hours over the charts, but the absence of the necessary data in so many families although I begged for it for two years, resulted in mostly blank spaces in the chart form, so I postponed that portion of the book until such a time as these data could be supplied. My aim is to compile a supplementary volume (not a new edition) which will contain charts, as well as source material; and additional data, as well as any important corrections (these must be documented) which are sent in to me."
