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


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

#### This Is Most Confusing

In one breath John Robsion, Bert Combs' opponent or Governor, says Combs cannot hold the support of the General Assembly because of schisms within the Democratic party.

In the next, he says Bert Combs will raise taxes.

One wonders how any Governor can raise taxes if he cannot have the support of the Legislature, since the state constitution provides that only the legislative body may levy taxes.

Such muddled thinking and the transparency of such arguments are making it doubly hard for the Louisville Republican to get his campaign "off the ground."

### Something To Consider

Before the Prestonsburg City Council campaign eaches the usual heated state that forbids any comment from a bystander on penalty of being accused of "taking ides," THE TIMES would like to submit for consideraion of the opposing slates the matter of the city's streetcleaning department.

We have no criticism to offer of the efforts being made by those who attempt this work, but we would point out that Prestonsburg needs more than it now has if it is not to earn and deserve the reputation of being the dirtiest town on the river."

Men using shovels, rakes and pushbrooms cannot keep a community of this size in presentable condition.

Worse yet, the ineffectual work of these men using antiquated tools is costing Prestonsburg a reported ninimum of \$7,000 a year.

That amount of money should go a long way toward buying a street sweeper and sprinkler which, used at night, could cover not one street but several streets every working day.

#### J. H. (UNCLE JIM) HATCHER

We are indebted to a recent issue of the Huntington Herald-Advertiser for a story on J. H. Hatcher, hotel man, farmer, logger, mine operator and eccentric philosopher, who died at Pikeville in the 1930's, The story, titled, "Late Pikeville Hotel Man Collected Quotes," is by Charles Stafford, an Associated Press writer.

It follows: Friends knew Uncle Jim Hatcher as a crusty innkeeper with a big heart and a cracker barrel philosophy. But by the definition of a poet, he was a great man.

"A great man," wrote Ralph Waldo Emerson — as Uncle Jim probably could have told you "quotes bravely, and will not draw on his invention when his memory serves him with a word as good."

There never was a braver quoter, outside politics or the pulpit, than James Hatcher. He filled the lobby walls of the James Hatcher Hotel with quotes.

Above the entrance to the room which happens to be campaign headquarters of the Democratic party, is this quotation credited to Monty Hale, Hollywood, Calif.: "Always tell the truth and you will never have to remember what you

In a prominent place is an original Hatcher statement: "All towels, linens bedding and fixtures in this hotel is (sic) mine. I want no more mistakes made when packing to leave. This practice is no longer a joke with me. James Hatcher."

Uncle Jim is 20 years dead. But by the terms of his 37-page will and the obedience of his nephews, his

quotations live on. Jack and Joe Trimble, who op-

erate the 106-room hotel, plan to redecorate the spacious, old-fashioned lobby this summer. They are going to paint the walls, but they have carefully photographed them so the quotations can be painted on again after the job's

Hatcher started in the '30's lettering a little advice and some local history on the walls,

"People coming through would have a quotation they wanted on the wall," says Jack Trimble. "Uncle Jim would take it down and when a sign painter would come through -that was during the depressionhe would give him a night's lodging for painting some signs."

"Uncle Jim," Trimble says, "had a kind heart—the kindest heart in the world—but he had a crude way of showing it. There never was a hungry man went through here, there never was a man refused lodging. Uncle Jim would give them a room and feed them and cuss them out."

Hatcher made his modest fortune in timber and coal. He opened the hotel in 1931, eight years before his death at the age of 80. He is buried on a hill above town, where his tragic love story is carved in Italian

marble. Dominating the burial plot is a graceful monument of Hatcher's wife, Octavia: "Died May 2, 1891, age 20 years, 11 months and 11 days." Nearby is a smaller monument, a sleeping cherub, with the inscription: "Infant son Jacob, died Jan. 4, 1891, age 1 day."

Hatcher had no other children and never remarried. But he raised the seven children of a nephew.

He sent the boys to St. Joseph's School in Bardstown, Ky., a Catholic prep school. "I had to write Uncle Jim every week," Jack says. "He would correct the letter and send it back to me."
