THE ODDEST BIRDS KNOWN

Penguins, which walk upright on two legs like a man, are called "the oddest birds on earth." They waddle about in a solemn and dignified manner, all dressed up in gleaming full-breasted suits and black frocks, with their flipper-like wings reaching out like human arms. They look and act like little fat men all dressed up for an evening formal party. Their breasts have soft, silvery plumage, which is often used to make muffs and coat collars. Their backs are jet black. These birds are friendly and trustful of man, which makes them an easy prey for seal hunters and others, who catch them for their oil and feathers.

These birds live in the cold waters of the Antarctic region, but they come to land to build their nests and rear their families.

They have a most unusual manner of courtship. The male penguin selects a pretty colored pebble as a love gift for the lady of his choice. He carries this pebble in his beak and places it with great solemnity at her feet. If she doesn't like the pebble, she will strike his head with her beak and drive him away. Then he must seek another lady friend. If she accepts the pebble, they become mates and rear a family.

Penguins eat mostly fish. They swallow fish and digest them, then when they feed their young, they re-gurgitate the food and give it to the little penguins by mouth.

Penguins cannot fly, as they lost this art during past ages. But they are expert swimmers and

divers and can make as much as twenty miles per hour in the water! These are the only birds known that walk upright like a man and often display human traits. They play games and engage in sports, much as humans do. They will sometimes steal pebbles from one another, and when they do this, they cannot seem to conceal the guilt they feel, and are seen to slink away with a sort of hang-dog expression!

DESTROYERS OF FISH

Fish are beautiful and interesting to study, and most everybody would like to see our streams and lakes teeming with fish. But man is their worst enemy! Greedy men, in the guise of modern progress, have polluted our streams with corrosive acids and chemicals from coal mines and washers; they are continually dumping wastes and detergents from laundries into our streams. Also waste crude oils from the oil fields seep into our creeks and rivers and make them unfit places for fish. The flesh of fish taken from streams polluted with crude oil is not palatable, as it bears the odor and taste of the oil.

The poisonous chemicals from coal mines will kill a fish in about one week. A man recently placed a healthy catfish in a pool of water that was polluted with acids from a coal mine. He observed the fish closely. At the end of the week, its skin began to corrode and peel off, and it soon died! The skin was literally cooked by the acids!

Indeed men are considered the worst enemy of the fish, because they render the streams unfit for their living in them.

The next worst enemy of fish is the watersnake. This snake is especially fond of trout and when a stream is to be stocked with trout, all the watersnakes should first be cleaned out.

Mud turtles also devour great numbers of fish and these should be eliminated from all streams where fish are to be protected and increased. A project that should be national in scope is the cleaning up of our streams and the stoppage of their pollution with wastes from mines, oil fields and factories. Let's give our fish and other aquatic life a sporting chance to come back!

The City of Martin states that it is a Fourth Class City duly authorized and existing by virtue of the laws of the State of Kentucky. Pursuant to K.R.S. 81.210 on the 6th day of March, 1961 the City Council of the City of Martin by ordinance annexed to the boundaries of the city the following described property:
"Beginning on the west right-of-way line of Kentucky State Highway No. 80, crossing Beaver Creek and Right Beaver Creek and continuing with said west right-of-way line to a point in said right-of-way line in line with a fence extending up the hill in a southerly direction to or near a concrete block building previously used as a mine explosives magazine, thence crossing Kentucky State Highway No. 80 and running up the hill with the fence to the south side of the abandoned county road, thence running with the south side of the abandoned county road, passing a cemetery to a fence running down the hill to Kentucky State Highway No. 122, thence leaving the south side of the abandoned county road and crossing same down the hill with the fence and continuing in the same direction across Kentucky Highway No. 122 to the North right-of-way line of Kentucky State Highway No. 122; thence running with the North and the East right-of-way line of Highway No. 122 to the intersection of the East right-of-way line of Kentucky State Highway No. 80, thence running with the East right-of-way line of Kentucky State Highway No. 80; thence running with the east right-of-way line of Kentucky State Highway No. 80, crossing right Beaver Creek and Beaver Creek to the present southern city limits of the City of Martin, Kentucky, thence crossing said state highway with the city limit line to the beginning."

There is no newspaper published in the City of Martin and the Floyd County Times is the only newspaper published in Floyd County, Kentucky.
