This Job Is Too Big for Only a Few

If Floyd county and Eastern Kentucky are ever to attain their rightful place as an attraction to those seeking surcease from the artificiality, grime and turmoil of city life and its ordered humdrum, nature must get an assist not only from individual householders and civic-minded citizens but also from local and state governmental units.

The natural beauties of the area are so well-known and so enthusiastically recognized by the visitor that it is trite for editorial writers and others who would do a Chamber of Commerce job in lauding these attractions to mention them. But the competition is keen; there are similar areas in neighboring states, and their beauty has been enhanced by men and not buried in accumulations of dirt and debris, automobile graveyards and refuse heaps.

The job facing Eastern Kentucky is so herculean that the sporadic efforts of small groups make almost indiscernible gains, often fail even to hold the line. The attack must be on a grander scale. Community pride, individual effort, these have their place and must exist if every community is to cease to be a frog in a flower-garden, but the overall job is too big for a few.

Each city government within the area needs to allocate funds in sufficient amount each year to provide adequate waste disposal facilities and to supply modern equipment for a well-staffed street department. It should be obvious by now that shovels, rakes and brooms in the hands of two or three men cannot cope with the situation.

Roadside beautification, stressed in some sections of the state, should extend to every highway in Kentucky. That is a job for the Department of Highways.

State laws and city ordinances against the litterbug, the property-owner who breaches the principles of sanitation and permits his premises to offend an entire community should be enacted, if they are not already on the statute-books; and, if they are already there, they should be enforced.

This editorial is being written after a desk-bound editor has only recently looked upon what several other states have to offer—flat country, rolling country, lakes, long, straight stretches of highway bordered by endless rows of pine and fir—and who returned to Eastern Kentucky to look again upon the grandest scenery of the whole, long trip.

But in too many spots in this pleasant valley of ours we find that one must look higher, to the hills, to see the beauty. In too many places the valley itself has too many eyesores sticking out of the landscape and gracing same as much as a very large wart beautifies a very dainty nose.

Leslie Officers Seek Mother, Child Killer; Woman, Attack Victim

Hyden, Ky., July 27—State and county officers are searching for the killer of a blond, blue-eyed mother and her 4-year-old son, gunned down as they crossed a mountain on a trail too rough for anything but walking.

County Attorney Robert C. Muncy said the bodies of the mother and son were found between their home in an area called Hollins Fork and one called Bull Creek.

A neighbor said the woman and her son were going to visit her father, Sheridan Osborne, who lives at Bull Creek.

The victims were Mrs. Mary Holland, 24, and her son, Clifton. The woman's husband, Tilford Holland, is unemployed. They had no other children.

Muncy said Mrs. Holland apparently was raped, then shot in the head with a shotgun. The young boy's body was found, shot in the back with a shotgun, about 15 paces away, the attorney said.

Muncy said bloodhounds were brought into the area after the shooting was reported about 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, but the dogs failed to get a clear scent after traveling about 10 miles through the steeply sloped, heavily wooded country.

Two men who live in the area were picked up for questioning, Muncy said, but they told authorities they did not know anything about the shooting.

Muncy said the two were still being held Thursday night, but that no charges had been placed.

The area where the killing took place is about 4½ miles north east of this community and about 85 miles southeast of Lexington.

Muncy said the spot where the woman and her son were attacked is so rough that she apparently had dismounted from a mule and was leading the animal along the trail when her assailant appeared.

The mule was wounded by the shotgun blasts, too, the attorney said.

Muncy said the position of the boy's body indicated he was fleeing from his attacker when he was shot. The woman's clothing was torn, the attorney said.

Mrs. Holland was described by a friend as a "rather small, quiet blond-haired woman with blue eyes."

Her husband at one time was a coal miner.

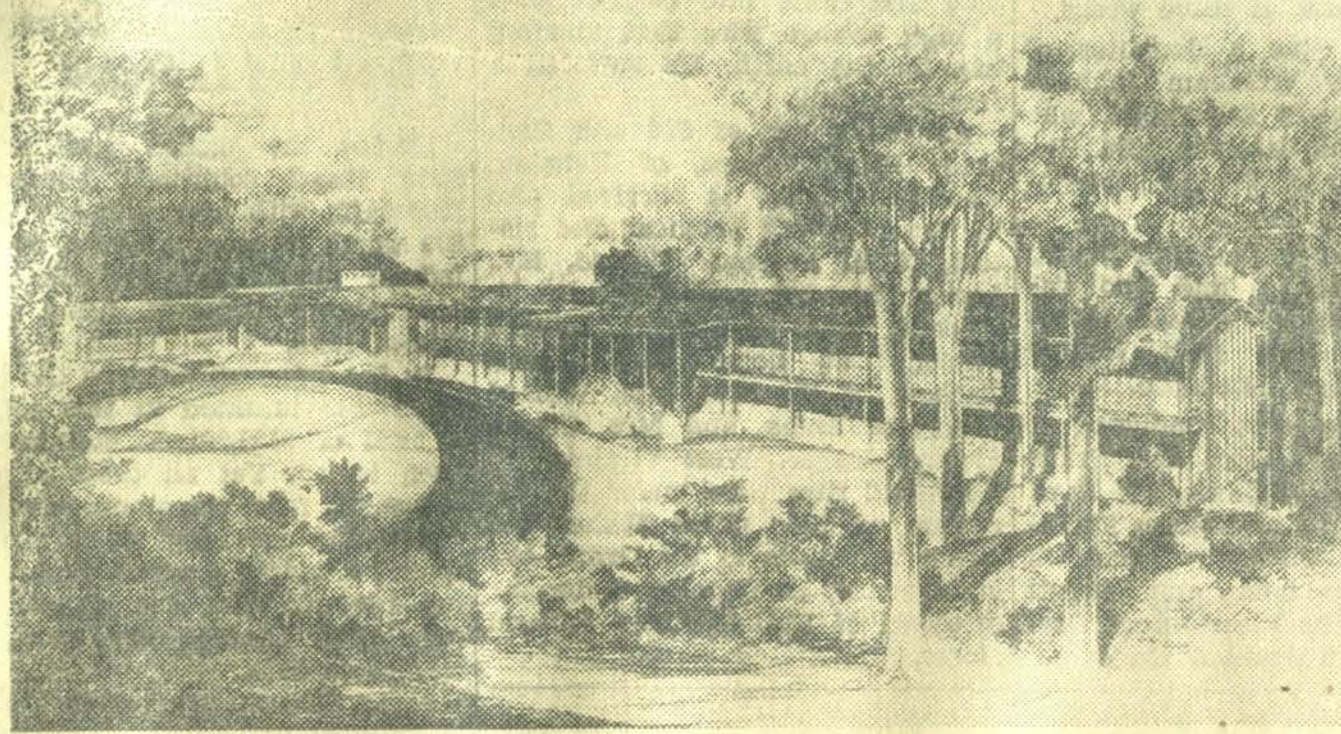
Neither the Hollins Fork nor Bull Creek areas are reachable by paved road, Muncy said. There is little telephone service into the communities of homes clustered on the mountainsides.

Broiler-fryers are very good buys now, but take care of those you buy at the market. Refrigerate as soon as you get them home. Remove the transparent film packaging from broilers, cover them loosely, and store them in the coldest part of the refrigerator until you are ready to use them. Cut-up broiler-fryers should be stored only one to two days for best quality.

More people in this country are killed by bees and wasps than by snake bites. In five years, stings from wasps, bees, hornets and yellow jackets killed 86 persons, compared with 71 deaths from snake bites and 39 from spiders. Rattlesnakes are reported to be the most deadly single kind of snake, killing 55, but bees alone killed 52 persons.



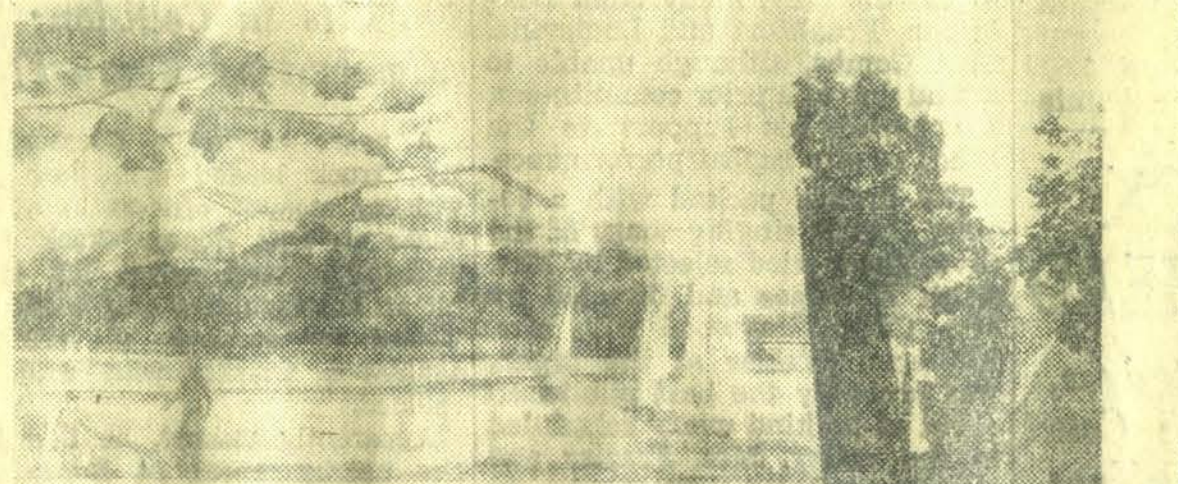

NEW 29-ROOM LODGE at Carter Caves State Park will perch on a steep bluff above Smoky Lake. Lower-level dining room will seat 200. On the main level will be the lobby, lounge and gift shop. The lodge will have a resort pool and is near the site of the proposed nine-hole golf course.



AT GENERAL BUTLER State Park, the new 25-room lodge will be built on a hill overlooking the Ohio River Valley. "V"-shaped in design, it will be constructed of native stone and vertical board siding. Dining room will serve 200. The swimming pool will be 25 by 45 feet.

ALL 222 COTTAGES in Kentucky State Parks have been renovated and redecored and are open this season. The \$10 million parks-improvement bond issue approved by Kentucky voters last fall made the program possible.

Kentucky is in high gear on its massive State parks expansion program. In June, contracts are being let for three new lodges, with four to follow in July.

Contracts for construction of seven new lodges will be let at these parks: Kentucky Dam Village, June 21; Lake Cumberland, June 22; General Butler, June 29; Carter Caves, July 6; Pine Mountain, July 11; Rough River, July 18 (tentative); and Jennie Wiley, July 27 (tentative). All are to be ready for the 1962 season, said Parks Commissioner Edward V. Fox.

A contract for a new lodge at Buckhorn State Park will be let in early September. A two-mile road to the site must be constructed before this work can start. Ground was broken June 8 for a \$168,610 lodge addition at Pennyrite Forest State Park. Natural Bridge State Park, Slade, will get a new lodge—possibly this fall. A site study is now being made.

Governor Combs announced in December that eight new lodges and dining rooms would be built, plus room additions at two parks, giving Kentucky 12 parks with hotel or lodge overnight facilities. The parks system will offer 488 modern hotel-type rooms to overnight visitors by the 1962 season.

In addition to the lodge construction, all the 222 vacation cottages in the State park system have been completely remodeled and redecored. Kenlake Hotel and lodges

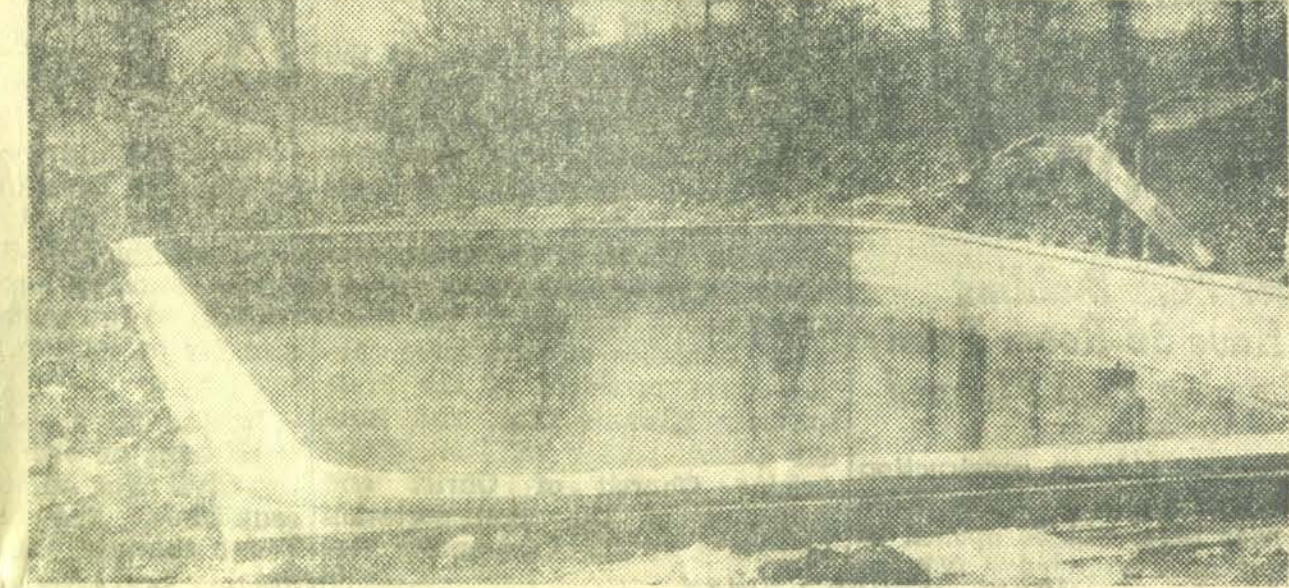
throughout the system have been redecored. Seventy per cent of the cottages received new kitchen units; 80 per cent received new bathrooms.

Five new tent camping and trailer areas—at Lake Cumberland, Kentucky Lake, Pine Mountain, Carter Caves and Natural Bridge—are ready. Each has a modern central service building. This makes a total of nine such facilities to meet the growing demand for camping and trailer sites.

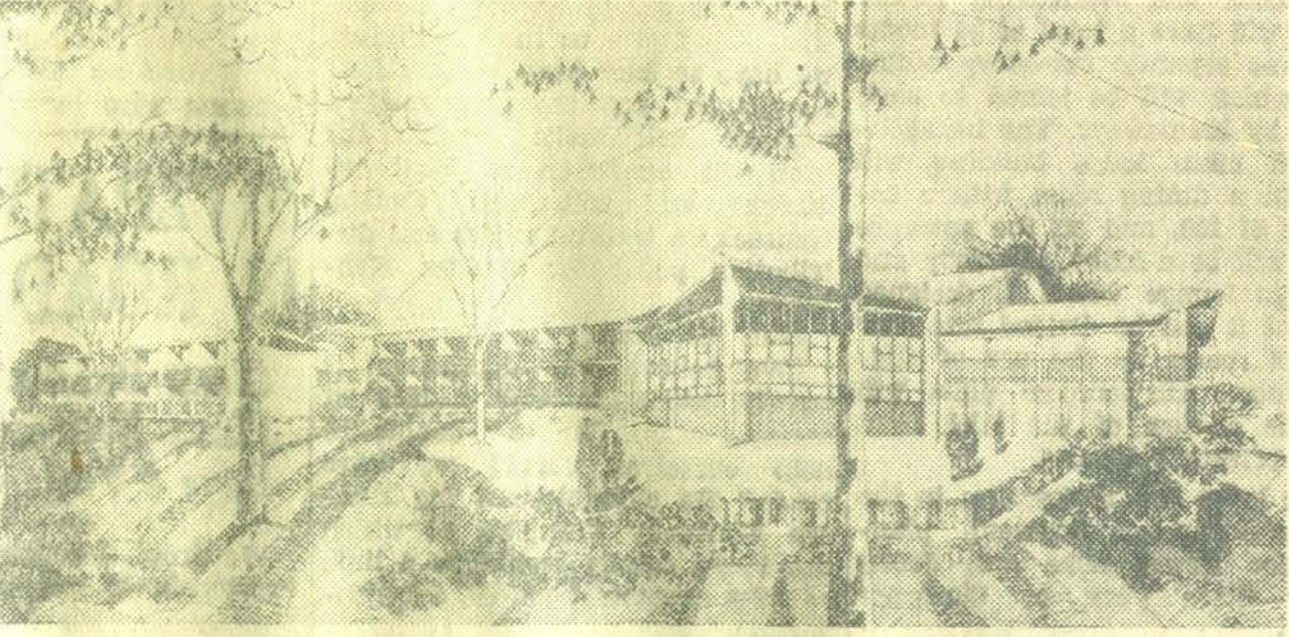
Three new resort-type swimming pools are completed and ready for guests at Pine Mountain, Cumberland Falls and Kentucky Lake. Golf courses are being completed at General Burnside and Jennie Wiley. All existing beaches have been improved and most have been enlarged. Picnic areas have been expanded in many parks and additional picnic shelter buildings have been constructed.

New nature trails have been developed and old trails have been improved. A complete new supervised recreation program is under way with a full-time director at Kentucky Lake, Kentucky Dam Village, Audubon, Lake Cumberland, Cumberland Falls, Natural Bridge and Carter Caves. Baby-sitting services have been set up at these seven parks.

Day-use facilities are open at two new parks, Big Bone Lick in Boone County and Greenbo Lake in Greenup and Boyd counties.



CONSTRUCTION was speeded this spring on three swimming pools for lodge and cottage guests at Kentucky Lake, Cumberland Falls and Pine Mountain State parks. With completion of the expansion program, every vacation park will have a modern swimming facility—pool, dock or beach area.



MAIN LODGE BUILDING at Jennie Wiley State Park will provide a scenic view of Dewey Lake from private balconies for each room. It will have 36 guest rooms, and three separate two-story buildings will have 12 rooms each. Covered passages will connect the buildings. Already under construction is a nine-hole golf course.

Many Older Dependents Eligible for Assistance

About a million and a half older people—the widows, dependent widowers and dependent parents of workers who have died—are due to receive increased payments under the new amendments to the social security law.

The benefits payable to widows age 62 or over will be raised about 10 per cent. Widows eligible for the increased payments do not need to get in touch with their social security offices. The increase will be added automatically to the checks they will receive early in September.

Congress called this increase "one of the most needed changes in the

social security program." Aged widows not only get lower benefits than do retired workers, but they also have less income from other sources than retired workers have.

The average benefit being paid to an aged widow early this year was \$57.80 a month. The yearly income for half the women receiving widow's benefits, not counting their social security benefits, was less than \$270 a year.

Aged dependent widowers and some aged parents of deceased workers are also due automatic 10 per cent increases with the social security checks payable to them in early September. However an increase in a parent's benefit check will be made in those cases where only one parent is receiving benefits based on the deceased son's or
