It all started with a letter to all Red Cross chapter chairmen in vhich Porter Tull, Red Cross regonal manager at Alexandria, Virginia, alerted them against the posibility of flood and the need to be prepared against the possibility of such an event. The first two paragraphs of the letter read:

"The U. S. Weather Bureau and nany private weather forecasters are anticipating general flooding conditions throughout the Eastern area as a result of the unusually heavy snowstorms and other storm yet to come. In 1257 and/or 1959 a number of chapters in Indiana, Chio, Kentucky and West Virginia were affected by flood conditions. "The snows this year are heavier and the flooding could be much nore severe. There is some specuation that flooding conditions might occur as early as the week of February 25."

"I am wondering if there would be any burial records, that would show a Hale with his wife's named that could be traced to her maiden name of Hall? Even as I write this, that sounds impossible, Guess it isn't much of a clue. "Dad thinks he recalls the name John mentioned by his grandmother but felt there was a John Huff so was confused."

The second letter, dated January 21, is excerpted:

"I was able to get papers of John Hale's descendants and Ezilpha was not listed as a child. Through the Iowa Census I found Benjamin Hale from Virginia, his wife Hanna from North Carolina, and a daughter Elizabeth born in Kentucky. I feel he could be Ezilpha's father for perhaps she would



HIKE JULE

The late S. B. Osborne, of Martin, in his book, "Hike Jule," published in 1943 depicts life on Beaver Creek before the railroad penetrated the section very deeply. His account of "sports" at the forks of Beaver Creek eighty years ago is enlightening. Osborne wrote

"In the early 80's my father lived in the country on Beaver Creek. forty miles from the nearest rail road. We had no roads, except dirt in the summer and mud in the winter. We had no talking machines, no radios, no electric lights and no modern improvements. "People would naturally conclude that life under these circumstances would be a very dull affair, but we had our diversions. In the winter we could play snowball and could skate on the ice without skates and sometimes without shoes. In the summer we could swim and fish if there was no work to do. But for three months of the year we had to work from daylight till dark making a crop. In those days a living had to be dug out of the ground.

"We had one sport that was the real sport. Our home was about a mile from the forks of Beaver Creek where the crossroads store and postoffice were located and as soon as I was big enough I learned to go there on Saturday evenings. The local bad men gathered there at that time and got drunk. The gathering generally wound up with a fight in which somebody would get shot or stabbed or knocked down. Everybody seemed to enjoy it very much except the
