

The letter was published without any explanation as to what "these weapons" were, or what part Mrs. Lincoln played in their "transmission." Perhaps it was assumed that everyone would know that the reference was to the "Lincoln guns," thousands of which had been sent into Kentucky and distributed to Union men, including those in Home Guards units.

Although the Commonwealth's official position remained one of armed neutrality, Kentuckians continued to leave the state to join the armed forces of the North or the South.

At Lexington, it was reported that Jomes B. Clay, a son of Henry Clay, and William C. P. Breckinridge, had left in a spring wagon for Richmond, Va., via Cumberland Gap, to join the Confederacy. "On next Thursday," the story added, "Roger W. Hanson, R. W. Wooley, Price McGrath, Calvin C. Morgan and John W. George leave for the same place by the same route. The last five go on horseback."

Both Needed and Wanted

When Ex-Governor Chandler says the highway from the Blue Grass into the Mountains is neither needed nor wanted he not only goes begging an issue but also runs counter to the thinking of the Eastern Kentucky Regional Development Commission which he himself

It was this Commission at a meeting held in Prestonsburg, months before Mr. Chandler left office, that first pointed out as the No. 1 need of Eastern Kentucky a modern highway to link it with Central Kentucky.

Nobody disagreed with that thinking then, and that includes the man who was Governor at the time. As of this date, the only opposition to such an artery of communication and traffic comes from three sources: 1. Those who for political reasons or personal spite oppose everything the Combs administration would do: 2. Those whose properties will be crossed by the highway to their damage; 3. Ex-Governor Chandler.

With his sure instinct for appealing to a certain segment of the electorate, Mr. Chandler declares that what is needed is up-the-creek roads. He is on safe ground there, but it should be remembered that the Eastern Kentucky Turnpike will not prevent, or even affect, the construction of such secondary roads. It also should be remembered that Ex-Governor Chandler himself sponsored with splendid effect—and was supported by this newspaper in so doing-a \$100,000,000 bond issue that was necessary for Kentucky to benefit from the federal government's program of road-building, which does not include up-the-hollow roads.

Eastern Kentucky needs and wants this highway. Its needs include smaller roads, many other things, but these cannot blind us to this essential which sound, farsighted business men-among them, good friends, even appointees. of Mr. Chandler-have declared a "must" if Eastern Kentucky is to shake itself free of its shackles and become united in business and social life with more favored areas of the state.

Our only concern is-How long must we wait for things to get moving from our end of the highway?
