# Our Historic Heritage

A Pictorial Review of East Kentucky  
(No. 144 in a Series)



GENERAL W. O. NELSON, VICTOR AT IVY MOUNTAIN

Gen. W. O. "Bill" Nelson was a native Kentuckian and was at first commissioned in the Navy but at the request of President Abraham Lincoln, was transferred to the Army to lead an expedition against Col. Andrew Jackson May, Confederate leader in the Big Sandy valley.

Nelson defeated May's troops at Hazel Green and West Liberty and advancing on Prestonsburg, found that his adversary had retreated to Ivy Creek. The Battle of Ivy Mountain, Nov. 9, 1861, was a victory for the Union forces.

The victor of Ivy Mountain was fatally shot by Jefferson Davis, an aide of Gov. Morton, of Indiana, in a brawl at Louisville during the turmoil incident to Gen. Bragg's invasion of Kentucky. Nelson lies buried in the Maysville cemetery.
