



they preferred neutrality. One hundred years ago this week, the Journal pointed that out to the Owensboro Shield, one of the few Kentucky newspapers that did not like the policy of armed neutrality. "Why arm the state at all if she is to be neutral?" the Shield had asked. "Why expend money in arms if they are not to be used. Many who urge this miserable policy do so from the prompting of fear; others, and the more designing, that the state may thereby become an easy prey to the enemies of the South.

The Journal reminded the Shield that Governor Magoffin, who favored the South, and such pro-Conier, the Lexington Statesman and the Frankfort Yeoman all were for armed neutrality. Looking ahead to the congressional election June 20, the Journal said: "The general duty of the representatives of Kentucky at the coming session of Congress is prescribed clearly by the attitude of the state and by the reasons for

"The attitude of Kentucky is neutrality, not because she is indifferent as to the cause at issue between the belligerents, and not because the Crittenden Amendment is yet unadopted, but for the reason that her people are linked by natural sympathy with the people of the South, that she believes offensive war is adapted to consummate the downfall rather than the salvation of the country and, finally, that her citizens are so fiercely divided amongst themselves with respect to the side which stern duty would call her to espouse actively that she could not actively espouse either side without precipitating a deadly conflict at home between her own sons."

The fierce division between Kentuckians was illustrated by a news affray occurred at Cynthiana in which Robert Jones was mortally wounded by Benjamin Desha, who shot him with a revolver. The twain had been drinking, and the former was shouting for Lincoln and the latter for Jeff Davis, when

I have been fooled many times by the starling's imitation of other birds, including the wood pewee, the robin, the neadowlark and others.

The starlings are aggressive, and so successful where other birds fail to survive, there is grave danger they will drive out many species; birds like the purple martin, wrens and bluebirds are being forced to leave by the more aggressive starlings. These birds congregate in vast flocks during the winter, and often as many as two million may be found at a single roosting place!

Q-Is it possible for a man to have first priority for VA hospitalization without actually serving on active military duty? I have heard of such a case.

A-Yes. Certain very few inductees or enlistees of World War I. World War II, and the Korean Conflict who did not enter active duty may be entitled to hospitalization under the first priority group. To be eligible, they must have incurred disabilities not the result of their own misconduct while en route under orders to report to a place for final acceptance, inductance, or entry upon active duty, or while at such place or enroute home.

Q-I am a nonservice-connected World War II veteran. Can I be admitted to a VA hospital?
