THE TOWN OF DWALE

The town of Dwale was named by "Captain" John Finlayson, superintendent of the Yellow Poplar Lumber Company, for his birthplace in Wales. Finlayson built a home on the bank of the Big Sandy River at the south end of the ford leading to the town. Before the renaming of the town by Finlayson the place was called Haws Ford for Robert Haws, pioneer settler. Finlayson subsequently bestowed the name of his birthplace on a small logging town in Dickenson county, Virginia.







tunity exists in this area of Kentucky for growing seasonal vegetables on anything but a small scale. There is, however, a great demand for out-of-season vegetables which can be produced in this area through the use of relatively inexpensive plastic greenhouses.

Experiments have proved that such vegetables as tomatoes, beans, lettuce, and greens sell like hotcakes during the winter months and that any farmer who invests in one or more of these greenhouses stands to increase his income considerably.

Derrickson already has two of these houses in production, plans to construct at least two more, and is presently experimenting with the best varieties of vegetables and types of indoor cultivation for greenhouse production. Considerable attention is also


