joining the County Clerk from placing on the ballot the names of a Martin slate of candidates composed of W. G. Goff, John H. Turnley, E. K. Frazier, R. E. Dermont, Arthur Judd and Alton Crisp. The plaintiffs — Glover C. Spencer, John C. Billter, John Henry Osborne, Delbert (Red) Ison, Haz Slone and Estill Newsome —, who are candidates for the same offices, contend defendants filed with the County Clerk a petition bearing the signatures of 24 persons but that 11 of these also signed the petition of the plaintiffs. This, they say, left defendants only 13 bonafide petitioners, seven less than the number required by law. At the same time they point out that their petition bore the names of 64 residents of Martin and that the loss of the 11 signatures in question does not affect validity of their petition.

The temporary restraining order was granted by Circuit Judge Hill, who pointed out that KRS 118.080 provides that for a municipal office the petition must contain the names of 20 petitioners and that "if any person joins in nominating, by petition, more than one nominee for any office to be filled, he should not be counted as a petitioner for either nomination."

A hearing seeking a final determination of the rights of both slates of candidates is expected to be held, but no date for such a procedure has been set.

In the second suit Gorman Collins, Republican nominee for County Judge, names as defendants his Democratic opponent, County Judge Henry Stamba, and Magistrates Grover C. Holbrook, Zeb Cusley, Fred Conn and Edward Caudill. Claiming that defendants have failed to provide enough machines so that all qualified voters may cast their ballots, plaintiff asks:

1. Redistricting of precincts "according to the lines existing and established at the last general election, or along some other equitable lines."
2. A mandate to the defendants to so redistrict and to provide a machine for each such precinct of 300 voters or less.
3. A mandate requiring defendants to provide extra voting machines, one for every 10% of the total number of machines, as stand-by machines to be placed at the disposal of the County Clerk.
4. A mandate to require the printing of paper ballots in a number sufficient to permit all voters to cast their ballots.

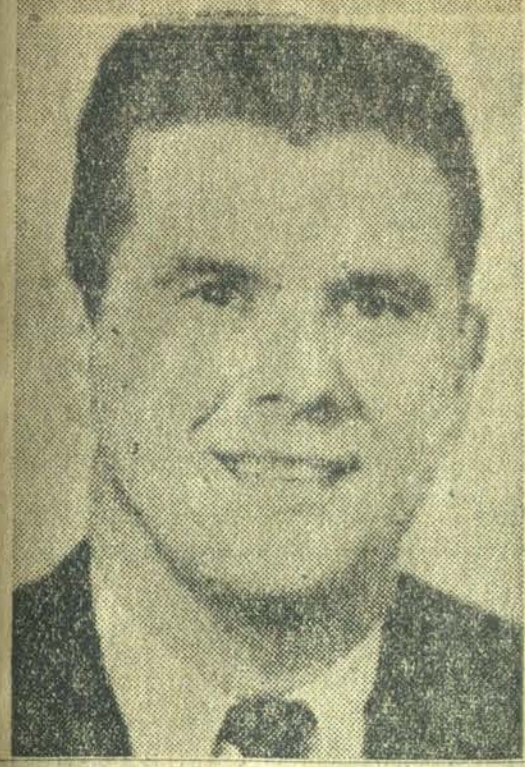

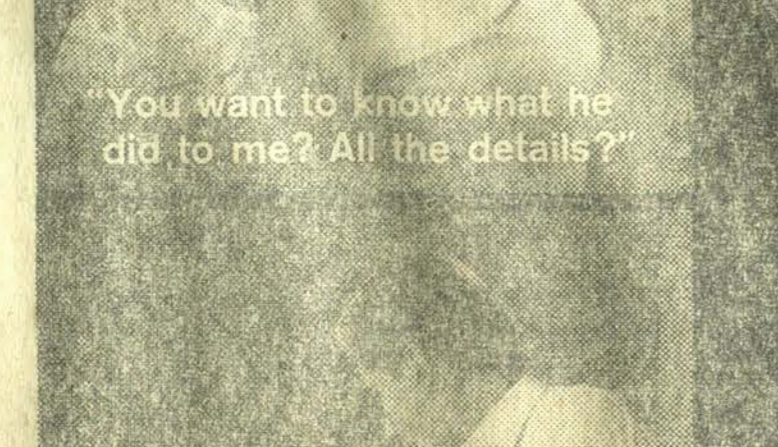

from what I know not. So it is that I fill this column with a minimum of effort:

Everything is farther than it used to be. It's twice as far from my house to the station, and they've added a hill that I've just noticed. The buses leave sooner, too, but I've given up running for them because they go faster than they used to.

Seems to me they are making staircases steeper than in the old days. The risers are higher and there are more of them because I've noticed it's harder to make two at a time. It's all one can do to make one step at a time.

Have you noticed the small print they are using lately? Newspapers are getting farther and farther away—when I hold them I have to squint to make out the news. Now it's ridiculous to suggest that a person my age needs glasses, but it's the only way I can find out what's going on without someone reading aloud to me, and that isn't much help because everyone seems to speak in such a low voice I can scarcely hear them.

Times sure are changing. The barber doesn't hold a mirror behind me when he is finished so I can see the back of my head. The material in my clothes, I notice, shrinks in certain places (you know, like around the waist, or in the seat). Shoe laces are so short they are next to impossible to reach.

Even the weather is changing. It's getting colder in winter, and the summers are hotter than in the good old days. Snow is much heavier when I attempt to shovel it, and rain is so much wetter that I have to wear rubbers. I guess the way they build windows now makes drafts more severe.

People are changing, too. For one thing they are younger than they used to be when I was their age. On the other hand, people my own age are so much older than I am. I realize that my own generation is approaching middle age (to me, that is roughly between 20 and 101), but there is no reason for my classmates tottering blissfully into senility.

I ran into my roommate the other night and he had changed so much that he didn't recognize me. "You've put on a little weight, Bob," I said. "It's this modern food," Bob replied. "It seems to be more fattening."

I got to thinking about poor Bob this morning while I was shaving. Stopping a moment, I looked at my own reflection in the mirror. They don't use the same kind of glass in mirrors any more.

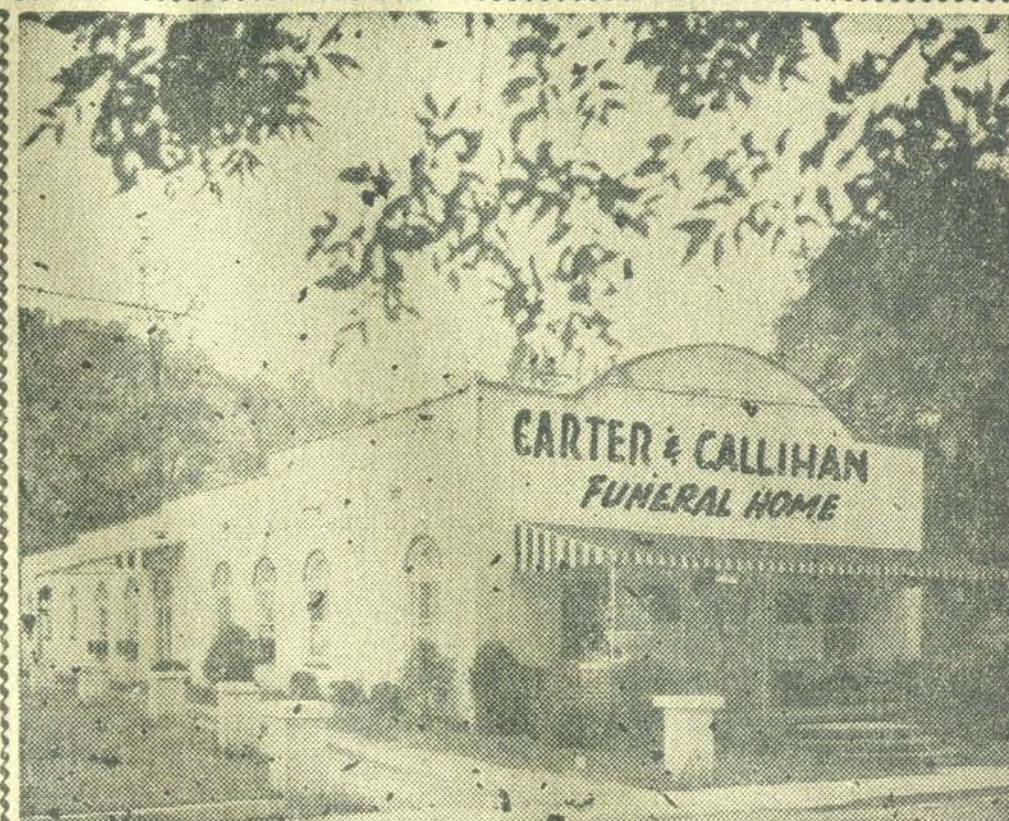

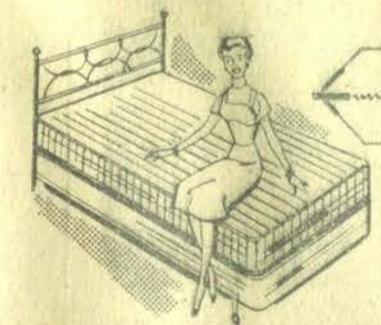

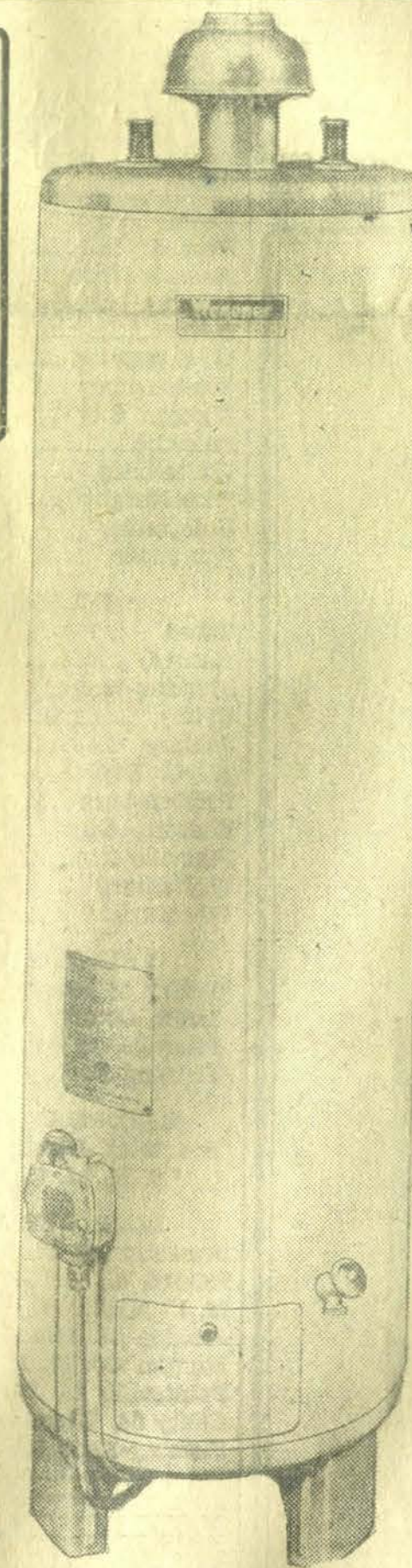
