





But Prestonskurg has made no such claim to distinction.

Boldly emblazoned signs, reading, "A.B.C. in '63," you will see here. But nothing of the only man who ever left Prestonsburg to reside in the executive mansion at Frankfort.

This is not to guarrel with anybody. Those who oppose Governor Combs have their rights, and we recognize them. In fact, this editorial does not concern them, But it does concern the friends of the Governor. It should concern all of us who have long lamented our lack-lustre position in Kentucky, those of us who believe Prestonsburg has some claim to a singular position in the state, temporary though it is.

It should concern us who have a friend at Frankfort that we are doing a great job of keeping that fact secret.

Those, then, who agree with us should join in placing at the approaches to Prestonsburg attractive signs stating simply, proudly, at our own expense, that this is the home of the Governor of Kentucky. Let us do this without rancour toward any other individual but simply in recognition of one of our own and on behalf of our community.

As Governor of Kentucky Bert Combs does not need the advertising. But Prestonsburg does.

# Crack Down First on the Crack-Pots

Boating Director Scott Barbour has warned the public that the time is near when his division will get tough and begin issuing citations and making arrests for violation of the law governing boats, boaters and boating.

It is time for arrests and fines. But we think Mr. Barbour in his recent statement failed to stress the major violations being committed on state waters, and thus indicates he is not getting a true picture of the situation.

He pointed out that 17 per cent of 1,234 boats inspected showed one or more violations that would have warranted a citation. Then he added that most violations included lack of registration for the current year, failure to have at least one life preserver per person aboard, also no anchor and line.

These are the sins of omission. What about those of commission? What is the status of that boat which has life preservers fore and aft and amidships, which has its registration number gleaming on the prow, and has both anchor and line-and also has a nitwit at the controls who by his recklessness threatens the safety of other boaters?

They arrest drunken drivers of automobiles. Why not crack down on the drunks afloat? Can you imagine a motorist in his right mind cutting some of the capers perpetrated by boaters on Dewey Lake, for instance?

Bear down first on those sins of commission, we say. Then, if officers have any spare time left, they can with justice check the technical violations. We believe in this boating law-if it can be made to mean anything.





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

# TIDBITS Kentucky Folklore

#### SPRING HOUSES

Somehow I have failed, in the twenty-seven years of this column, to record the passing of the spring house. In the south-central part of Kentucky, where I have spent all my life since early manhood, water is not the abundant commodity that it is in the Jackson Purchase and in the Mountains, where every hill seems to have a spring at its base, every valley a running stream. In the pioneer times, because much of the Green River-Barren River area was a prairie, the first houses were likely to be built bac kin the hills, where there were trees and springs. Wherever there were springs in the Barrens, there soon grew up all the buildings of a farm. Since stone was so plentiful, a stone springhouse was erected and often was a real work of art. A water supply and a place to keep things cool were thus guaranteed. A whole book, profusely illustrated, could be made about the springhouses I have known. I came into this area ealry enough to see many of them in use, for that was long

before electric refrigeration. Some of the spring houses had elaborate shelves where all sorts of buckets and jars and cans could be set. In some of them the water was diverted to flow around the vessels to be cooled. Vines often grew up over the springhouse, making a picturesque nock in a corner of the yard.

Then by degrees deep wells were put down, and the springhouse began to lose its importance. In recent years R.E.A. has penetrated even the remotest places; it will seem unbelievable to younger persons that the springhouses were once so important. Very few of them have been kept in repair. More modern houses are often built far away from such water supplies. In general, the old stone springhouses are, like the cabin in the old song: "Falling down, and the roof is caving in." Many of the old stone houses are practically obliterated except for a pile of stones. Cattle, through many ycars, have sought the spring and have helped time itself topple the stones. Sometimes the wreck of a former picturesque building stands in a veritable jungle of weeds, and briars and bushes, deserted, no longer needed in the economy of farm life. Because of the limestone in which the springs around here originated, sometimes a new channel for the spring has been found; thus the springhouse ruins stand dry and deserted, just as hundreds of ponds that I have known have gradually become dry and are cultivated fields. It is hard to convince younger people that an older time could have values comparable with those of the present. Before we acquired a liking for ice water, cold spring water seemed about the finest drink ever vouchsafed to men. Coming to the spring from hot, dirty work in the fields, we of other times, whether we said so then or not, somehow gave thanks as we knelt to drink from Nature's own bounty. We who were reared in sandy areas of the state had little to fear of contamination of the water supp.y and relt that nothing was more pure than spring water. When I first came to the limestone country, I drank long and often from the springs. Now I shudder at my rashness, for I know that, even then, with far fewer means of contaminating water, the underground drainage had already made water unsafe for human consumption. Typhoid fever was still an annual event, even in the town, when I was young and for a long time after. Something very poetic went out of our lives when we had to admit that spring water might be deceptively clear and cold. But this conception of springs in the limestone area came largely after the spring and the springhouse had been abandoned. Some stronglybuilt springhouses remain, remnants of other times, but, so far as I know, nearly all of them are merely kept for memories sake and not even to keep milk and butter and canned fruits and fresh meats ccol. Why take something out of the refrgierator or the deep freeze and take it down the hill to the springhouse?



This was the only overland route from the Yadin River in North Carolina and from Virginia, via Cumberland Gap, to the early settlements from 1775 to 1795.

Here, if you listen to the oldtimers, you will hear of mountain tends, moonshine stills and "revenooers," quilting parties and the days when neighbors gathered at corn-huskings.

Although the years have accounted for many changes in the area, the language of the people till bears the flavor of their forebears who spoke medieval Chau-

Like their ancestors, many of the mountain people use such earthy Anglo-Saxon terms as "holp" for "poke" for bag, "pack" for carry and "ferninst" for opposite. 



#### PRESTONSBURG NATIVES PIONEERED CALIFORNIA

Jesse Barnett was born in Prestonsburg in 1826, son of Elias Barnett (1805-1880) and Nancy Blair Barnett. Elias Barnett, also a native of Prestonsburg, carried the first overland letter from Independence, Missouri, to California in 1841 with the Bidwell-Bartleson immigrant party.

Jesse Barnett, his wife, Lorena Clark Barnett, and their children, followed Elias Barnett to California in 1855 with a covered wagon train and settled in Pope Valley where he died in 1906. The Barnetts, courageous and daring, were typical of the vast number of Kentuckians who helped to people the west.
