WDOC SLATES FM IN AUGUST

16,500-Watt Installation Costing \$30,000 in Plan, Station Manager Says

Radio Station WDOC will begin FM (frequency modulation) broadcasting August 8, Gorman Collins, manager and part-owner of the station here, said Wednesday.

The station will spend \$30,000, he estimated, in adding FM broadcasting to its regular AM service.

A transmitter and new tower will be located atop Abbott mountain, and this will be operated by remote control from the station's present studio on the Auxier Road here.

Collins said the FM station will be of 16,500 watts and will broadcast from 5:15 a.m. till midnight. It will feature University of Kentucky football and basketball games, Cincinnati Red's games and local nighttime sports.

He said the station will be of such power that perfect reception without the use of an aerial will be possible over a radius of 20 miles and that the range of the station will extend to Paducah, Kentucky, to the west, and will cover large portions of Virginia, West Virginia and Ohio.

PRIMARY IS MARKED BY LACK OF INTEREST

FLOYD VOTE TOTAL DROPS UNDER 3,000

Wyatt, Perkins, Morton, Wheeler Win in Floyd; Sheriff Has Court Tiff

Floyd county's quietest election saw fewer than 3,000 citizens casting their ballots Tuesday, but the small vote did not prevent clear-cut majorities from being recorded for Wilson W. Wyatt and Carl D. Perkins, Democratic candidates, respectively, for U. S. Senator and Representative in Congress, and for their November opponents, Republicans Thurston B. Morton and Charles D. Wheeler.

Perhaps the liveliest action of the campaign involved a court action as an aftermath of a voting-place change made by Sheriff Henry C. Hale in Cow Creek precinct. Sheriff Hale moved the polling place from the school to a building near the home of Lewis Burchett, farther up the creek. Mrs. Bradis Goble sued to hold the old voting site, near the mouth of the creek.

Circuit Judge Edward P. Hill heard the case Monday morning, and both sides emerged, claiming victory. Judge Hill, however, ruled that the election should be held in the school building if it was available for the purpose.

Winners of the primary in the county polled leads in every precinct. Wyatt had his closest call in Middle Creek precinct where his edge over Marion Vance was only 11 votes.

Governor Comes Home To Vote, Later Visits Plant Here and Park

Governor Bert T. Combs returned home Tuesday to vote, as is his custom, but the business at the polls required little time. He did not say how he voted but it is suspected he cast his ballot for Wilson Wyatt and Carl D. Perkins.

The hatless, shirt-sleeved Governor conferred with a group interested in the community college here, stopped to shake hands and chat briefly with persons he chanced to meet, then visited the strawberry processing plant here and Jenny Wiley State Park before returning to Frankfort.

State Officials Tour Inland Steel Workings

Commissioner James Marcum, of the State Department of Revenue, and Commissioner Robert Mathews, of the Finance Department, toured the Wheelwright mining operations and the Price preparation plant Monday as guests of the Inland Steel Company. They were accompanied by Minor Clark, Inland's manager of properties at Wheelwright, Arthur Bradbury, safety director, and Paul E. Hayes, Prestonsburg attorney.

"I like Eastern Kentucky and its people enough to stay here, although I am not continuing the work I came here for in the first place, and I hope my new association works out well enough that I can stay here permanently," Mr. Simpson said.

Milk, Cheese Plentiful In Floyd Stores, Noted By U. S. Market Service

Milk and cheese will be plentiful at Floyd county foodstores during June, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service.

Many other dairy products also will be in good supply during June as Kentucky's dairy industry joins the rest of the nation in celebrating the 26th Annual June Dairy Month observance. Milk and cheese, along with broiler-fryers, vegetable oils, peanut butter, canned peaches, canned tomatoes, corn meal, fresh vegetables, and corn cereals, are listed as wise buys for food stamp coupon recipients in USDA's food guide for June.

USDA food coupon users and other budget-minded shoppers will find a list of the June "food buys" posted at most Floyd grocery stores to help them when shopping.

CLARK, WALLEN FIGURE IN PERSONNEL CHANGES

W. W. Wallen, operating manager, has been elected to the position of vice-president in charge of operations by the board of directors of the Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company, effective June 1.

Mr. Wallen succeeds E. E. Clark, who is retiring effective June 1 after 37 years of service with the company.

Mr. Wallen will continue to have his headquarters in Prestonsburg, and will report to W. C. Bomhoff, Ashland, vice-president and general manager.

Mr. Clark's permanent address after July 1 will be 21 River Drive, Ormond Beach, Florida, it was said.

Both the new and the retiring holders of the company post began work with the land department—Clark as a stenographer and clerk in 1924, Wallen as a clerk in 1938. Except for 15 years, from 1945 to 1960, when he was with the Ashland office, Clark has lived in Prestonsburg. He was promoted to chief field agent July 1, 1926, and to the post of superintendent of realty January 1, 1940. Upon his removal to Ashland he became land agent April 16, 1945, and assistant to the vice-president April 16, 1953. Clark was promoted to vice-president in charge of operations, with offices here, September 1, 1950, upon the retirement of H. L. Ley.

After two years' work as a clerk in the office here, Wallen was transferred to the Ashland office September 17, 1940, and entered the military service in October, 1943. He returned to work with the company at Ashland in December, 1945, and was promoted April 1, 1946 to the post of chief field agent, returning to Prestonsburg. He became land agent April 16, 1953 and operating manager April 1, 1960.

INTOXICANTS ARE SEIZED

Carr, Burchett, Barnett Charged With Violations; Vanderpool Is Arrested

Raid by Sheriff's deputies and Claude Flanery, Alcoholic Beverage Control Board agent, Saturday resulted in the confiscation of intoxicants at two places and the arrest of the alleged owners.

Lum Carr, on whose premises at Arkansas beer and whiskey were found, was booked on a charge of possessing alcoholic beverages for the purpose of sale, later was fined \$20 and costs and jailed 30 days. Raleigh Barnett, of Buck's Branch, near Martin, was charged with possession after liquor was confiscated at his place. Search of a building at the Dewey Lake Inn failed to uncover intoxicants, but Willard "Goat" Burchett was arrested on a warrant issued by Magistrate Bryant Derossett, charging Burchett with selling intoxicants.

BIDS SOUGHT ON PROJECTS

Bituminous Surfacing, Bridge Repair Planned For Floyd Construction

Bids for two bituminous concrete surfacing projects and a bridge repair project in Floyd county will be received by the Highway Department on June 15, Commissioner of Highways Henry Ward announced this week.

The projects will include surfacing of the Garrett-Salyersville Road for 2,037 miles beginning at the Magoffin county line at the head of the Racoon fork of Salt Lick Creek, surfacing of .384 mile of the Jenny Wiley State Park lodge road, beginning at Ky. 304 near the boat dock, and repairs to the bridge over the Big Sandy at Prestonsburg on the Prestonsburg-Water Gap-Allen road.

These highway improvements are being financed entirely out of the state road fund.

A contract to provide signs for 43 miles of the Eastern Kentucky Turnpike was awarded by the Highway Department on May 25, Commissioner of Highways Ward announced. Ben-Tom Corporation submitted the low bid of \$276,358.00.

The 43 miles of Turnpike between Winchester and Campton are expected to be open to traffic before the end of this year.

This modern highway is being built with proceeds from a \$39 million revenue bond issue.

HFA APPROVES LOAN FOR CITY SEWER JOB

House Numbering Slated By Prestonsburg Jaycees

The Prestonsburg Junior Chamber of Commerce has completed plans for a new system of numbering houses within the city limits of Prestonsburg. Cal Herrick, president of the Jaycees, stated this week that the club, after several delays, is ready to start the job of numbering all houses within the city.

The plan has been approved by the local Planning and Zoning Board and was worked out at Frankfort by the Department of Economic Development at the request of the local board.

The city council has given the Jaycees permission to do the job of numbering the houses. An ordinance is being prepared to be presented to the City Council at its next meeting to make the new numbering system official.

CONGRESSMAN REPORTS NEWS OF AID ACTION

Loan Held Contingent On Financial Inability Of City, Perkins Says

Congressman Carl D. Perkins wired Prestonsburg radio stations Monday that the Community Facilities Administration of the Home Finance Agency had announced its approval of a \$710,000 loan to the city of Prestonsburg for improvement of sewage facilities.

At least one newspaper wire service reported the loan approval, but no newspaper serving the area had reported the action in Washington as of Wednesday morning.

Mayor George P. Archer said he had received no word of the loan approval but expressed interest in the news.

Congressman Perkins' statement added that the \$710,000 loan will be supplemented by a grant of \$170,000 under the Federal Water Pollution Program to meet the \$880,000 estimated cost of the project.

The loan, he said, is contingent on the inability of the city to procure private financing of the project on reasonable terms.

Mayor Archer said private financing is not available. The federal agency's interest rate is 3.375% and the loan may be amortized over a period of 30 years, it was said here.

The loan and grant announced by Perkins will be used to build a sewage treatment plant and to lay new sewer lines so as to centralize the outlet of all sewage into the plant.

Estimated cost of the project has been advancing at the rate of about 10% a year. Action by the City Council will be necessary to determine how the loan will be paid off in annual installments.

Basic engineering work on the project was done by Bell Engineering Co., Lexington, when the new water plant here was built, and the engineering was completed a few months ago.

SCHOLARSHIPS ARE AWARDED

Inland Steel Company Names Aid Recipients; Fitts To Study Medicine

The Scholarship Committee of Inland Steel Company's coal mining operations at Wheelwright announced the winners of the 1962 scholarship awards at graduation exercises at the Virgie and Wheelwright high schools.

A four-year scholarship to the University of Kentucky, valued at \$500 per year, was awarded to John O. Fitts, who will enter pre-medicine at the University. Mr. Fitts' father is pastor of the First Baptist Church at Wheelwright.

A two-year scholarship to Pikeville College, valued at \$400 per year, was awarded to Edith Jones, Bevinsville. Miss Jones plans to undertake a nursing career.

A two-year scholarship to Pikeville College, valued at \$300 per year, was also awarded to Larry M. Burke, of Virgie. He plans to enter the field of education, majoring in mathematics.

Two Floyd countians who have made important contributions in the area of public service were honored here Saturday evening with membership in the Floyd County Hall of Fame.

The two new members are Mrs. Emma Wells May, wife of R. V. May, Prestonsburg, and W. J. Reynolds, Jr., of Allen. They were presented as the 1962 members by Marvin Music, Prestonsburg businessman, president of the organization.

It was the Hall of Fame's seventh annual meeting. Forty-six members and guests attended.

Governor Bert T. Combs, a Hall of Fame member since its inception in 1956, was honored with the First Life Membership card to be issued, and his photograph was presented by Mr. Music to Robert Wallace for hanging in the Floyd County Library with photos of other members.

Governor Combs was not present at the meeting. In making the presentation of the life membership and photo, Mr. Music reviewed the Governor's career,

citing his work for education, health and welfare, highways, parks and other items of his state program, and concluded with this statement:

"I want to go on record now as predicting that Governor Bert T. Combs will go down in history as Kentucky's greatest Governor."

The statement drew heavy applause. A second Life Membership card was presented to Norman Allen.

George L. Ramey, head of the Mayo Vocational School, Paintsville, and the speaker of the evening, was introduced by Chalmers H. Frazier.

area of education in this section—a trade education at Mayo for every boy, and eventually for every girl, in a 16-county area; two years of a college education for mountain boys and girls at the community college to be established in Prestonsburg.

"I just wonder if we aren't nearer home base than we think," he mused.

"I don't think," Mr. Ramey said, "we're going to get much out of ARA (the Area Redevelopment Administration), except that we are profiting, and will continue to profit, from the meetings we have had, crying on each other's shoulders, meeting and planning together."

"Money," he added, "should be spent on Mayo and on a college here, not because we are in a depressed area but simply because we are people and because we have people who need these schools."

The speaker dwelt on the beauties of Eastern Kentucky and he spoke in particular of the monumental work done at Jenny Wiley State Park, all adding to a natural beauty "second to none in the nation." "I wonder," he added, "if I think enough of Jack May when we consider the beauty of this lake."

Dr. George P. Archer, mayor of Prestonsburg, was elected president of the Hall of Fame for the year ending with the 1963 meeting. Mrs. E. D. Roberts, of Prestonsburg, was named vice-president; Mrs. Betty Stephens, of Prestonsburg, secretary, and Miss Ruth Sipple, of Hippo, treasurer.

Mr. May was honored for her leadership of the Prestonsburg Community Development Council and her participation in the Girl Scouting, library work and Woman's Club activities. She was appointed chairman of the Community Development Council here by Mayor Edward B. Leslie and was reappointed by Leslie's successor, Dr. George P. Archer. Because of her leadership and the cooperation she succeeded in winning from others, Prestonsburg won the Community Achievement Award of \$200 in District 7 and was runner-up in the state contest held later at Louisville. The shotgun blast awakened their son, Ked, about 20, who was asleep in another room. The youth, presuming the blast was caused by his father's killing a chicken before departing for work, went back to sleep without investigating.

He found his mother's body on the floor of the combination living room-bedroom after he awoke again about 11 that morning.

He was listed as the only person, other than his mother, in the house when the blast occurred.

ORDINANCE NO. 9-62 An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, Authorizing and Instructing the City Attorney to Take Necessary Steps to Annex as a Part of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, Certain Territory on the North-eastern and Eastern City Limits of Said City, Lying Between the Big Sandy River and the Auxier Road and Adjacent to the Site of the Proposed Low Rent Housing Units.

WHEREAS, the long-range planning of the City of Prestonsburg contemplates the installation of a sanitary sewage disposal system, and that the proposed location of the sewage disposal plant connected therewith lies in an area North and East of the City of Prestonsburg, and

WHEREAS, it appears that the necessity for police control, location and maintenance of streets, furnishing of public utility services, and other services, to this area is both necessary and desirable, and that the public benefits to be derived would require annexation of this area to the City of Prestonsburg.

NOW, BE IT THEREFORE ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION I. That the City Attorney take the necessary legal steps to annex as a part of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, the following described territory, to-wit:

Being situated on the waters of the Levisa Fork of the Big Sandy River, and North of the Corporate Limits of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, located in Floyd County, and more particularly bounded and described, as follows:

BEGINNING at a stake on the right-of-way of U. S. Route No. 23 and No. 490 and at the Southeast end of the Cliff Bridge, and 40 feet Northeast of said bridge, thence the following courses and distances:

That this Ordinance be published for four consecutive times in the Floyd County Times and that handbills be posted for a period of at least fifteen days prior to the filing of an action in the Floyd Circuit Court; and that such handbills be posted at four or more public places within the City limits of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky; that the City Attorney, as by law made and provided, within thirty days after the adoption of this Ordinance, publication in the Floyd County Times, and advertisement by posting of handbills shall file a petition in the Floyd Circuit Court in the name and on behalf of the City of Prestonsburg for the purpose of annexing and incorporating within the City of Prestonsburg the above described territory.

SECTION III. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed to the extent of such conflict.

SECTION IV. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from this date, after publication as required by law and the provisions of this Ordinance.

A grand prize of \$500 will go to the farmer whose forestry program is judged most complete. A second prize of \$200 also will be awarded.

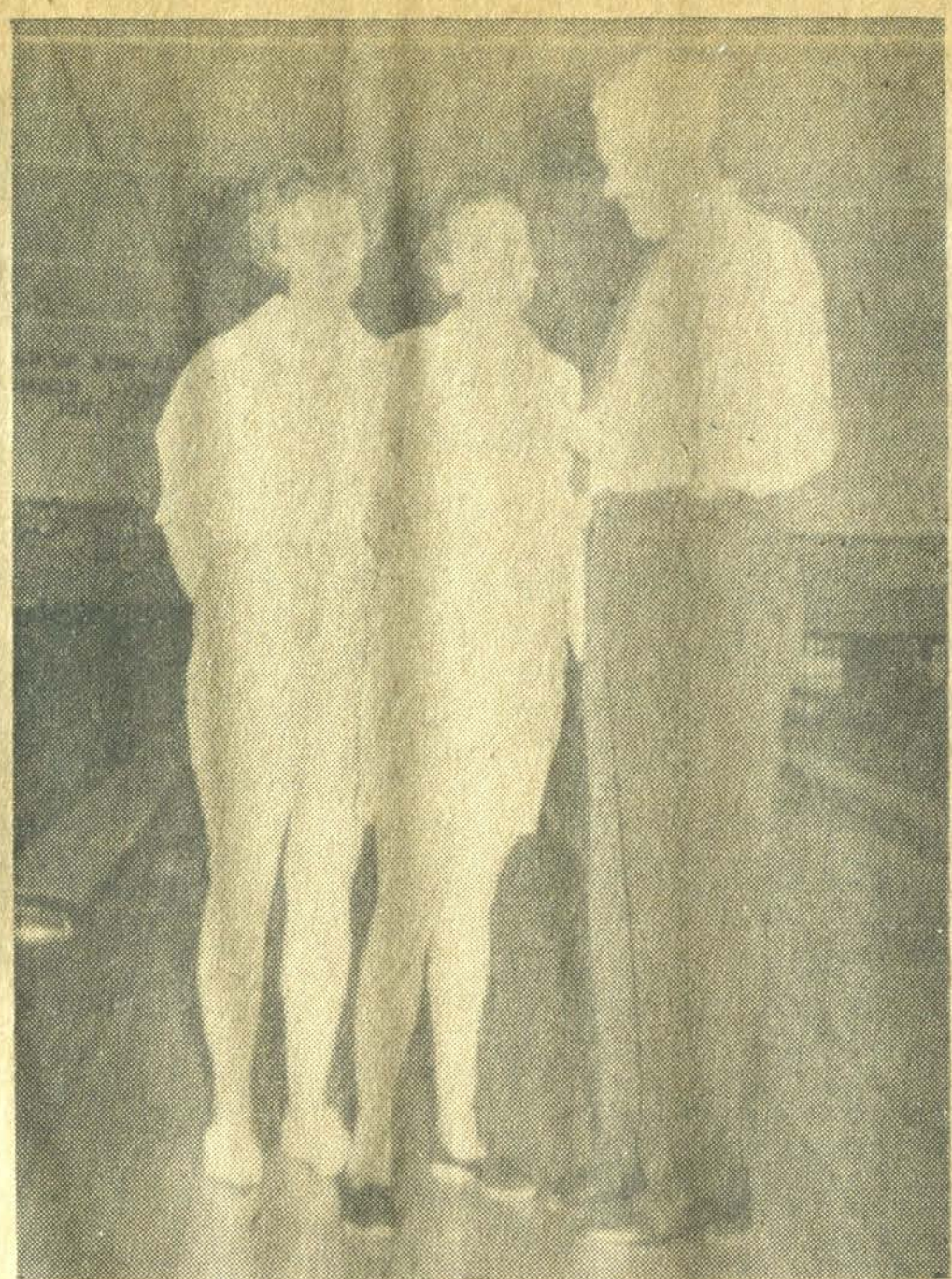

100 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK
The Civil War in Kentucky
By JOE JORDAN
(Kentucky Civil War Commission)

One hundred years ago this week, Union Army Brig. Gen. Jeremiah Tilford Boyle, a Kentucky lawyer who held a Volunteer (Reserve) commission, was appointed military governor of the Commonwealth, with headquarters at Louisville.

At Augusta, the county judge, the county attorney and 118 other citizens of Bracken county were arrested on charges of aiding and encouraging "marauding parties" that had passed through the county a few days before. It was announced that the 20 civilians would be "held as hostages for the safety of any Union men who may be carried off by those guerrillas."

Gen. Lucius Desha, of Harrison county, described as "a native and influential Rebel," was taken into custody by Union soldiers. "The general charge against the accused being that of aiding the rebellion." He was taken on a train to Louisville and there lodged in a military prison.

Union detachments from Lexington visited Mercer county, where 11 persons were taken into custody, and Anderson county, where 13 were arrested. The prisoners included Confederate soldiers at home on leave, suspected spies, and others charged with "giving aid and comfort to the enemy." One of them was identified by the Louisville Journal as "a slave trader on a small scale, a recruiting officer for the Rebels and a fanatical fool generally."

State Voices Support To Allegheny Parkway; Fox Speaks At Capital

Frankfort, May 2 (Spl.).—The state of Kentucky has voiced support for the planning and building of a proposed parkway through Maryland, West Virginia, and Eastern Kentucky atop the Allegheny Mountains, and thence to Mammoth Cave and Natchez Trace.

Edward V. Fox, commissioner of parks for Kentucky, represented Governor Combs and Highway Commissioner Henry Ward at a hearing in Washington before the public-lands subcommittee of the Committee of the Interior. The hearing was on bills proposing an appropriation for a survey of the parkway.

Ward said in a telegram to Sen. Allen Bible, subcommittee chairman, "It is Kentucky's very firm recommendation that Congress authorize the Department of Interior and the Department of Commerce to make studies of alternate routes for parkway extensions. It is understandable that the Allegheny Parkway be brought into Kentucky through the Breaks Interstate Park on the Kentucky-Virginia border and that it follow the Cumberland Mountain range from the Breaks Interstate Park to the Cumberland Gap National Historical Park.

"Kentucky heartily supports the recommendation that this parkway be extended from Cumberland Gap National Park to Mammoth Cave National Park and thence to connect with the Natchez Trace Parkway. Such a route would afford a traveler an opportunity to see some of the most outstanding natural scenery in America and to visit places of both great scenic and historic interest."

Urge Citizens Evaluate Highway Transportation

Frankfort, May 21 (Spl.).—This is National Highway Week in Kentucky (May 20-26), and Gov. Bert Combs and Highway urged all citizens to judge the value of highway transportation to their own activities and to the national welfare.

"An adequate highway network is indispensable to traffic and to the national welfare," Governor Combs said in a proclamation issued at Frankfort.

Governor Combs said the state is moving as rapidly as road fund revenue becomes available to build and maintain a complete, statewide system of roads and highways. "It is necessary to the economy and well being of Kentucky that we keep abreast of other states in our road program in order to maintain and increase the state's economy for all its people," he said.

SHEEP

A few years ago the sheep business was gaining interest in the county. For one or several reasons most farmers have sold their sheep. Prices of both wool and lambs promise to improve this year and there are indications that Kentucky farmers will be buying western ewes to start replacing flocks that have been sold.

Last week a carload of western ewes were ordered from a western broker for farmers of Eastern Kentucky. Billy Merritt, of Bonanza, is getting 25 out of the car. Mr. Merritt has one of the best flocks in Eastern Kentucky.

It would be wise if more farmers would consider producing lambs for sale. Like all livestock, lamb prices go up and down in cycles. The economists say that lamb prices have reached the low part of the cycle and will start back up this year.

There will be a lamb show and sale at Flemingsburg, June 9. Sheep producers from Floyd county can sell their lambs in this sale if they so desire.

FEEDER PIGS

There will be a feeder pig sale at Flemingsburg, Saturday, May 26, for Eastern Kentucky. Floyd counties have participated in past sales both as buyers and sellers.

Feeder pig sales are increasing in numbers and volume sold. Buyers from the corn producing states are looking to these sales for a supply of feeders.

Most farmers could produce feeder pigs from two or more sows, and increase their farm income. There are plenty of opportunities for increasing farm income if farmers would only take advantage of this opportunity.

INSECTS

During May, there will be millions of bagworms hatched out. These bagworms will start immediately to eat junipers, cedars and arbor vitae, and will in a few days kill many thousands of evergreens around homes.

The easiest time to kill these pests is soon after they hatch out. Use three tablespoons of arsenate of lead to each gallon of water. Be careful with these materials because they are poisonous. After the insects have formed bags, they are more difficult to kill. Then it is best to kill them with Malathion used at rate of one tablespoon of 57% Malathion to each gallon of water.

How often your house needs painting depends on what color it is, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Good house paint—if it is white, lasts at least 4 or 5 years before it needs redoing; tinted paints last 5 or 6 years; dark color paints, 6 to 8 years.
