The two-James Gordon May, 18, of Lakeville, and Jackie Lee Salyers, 24, of Salyersville-were jailed here late Friday afternoon after they had commandeered Mr Meade's auto, robbed him and threatened his life.

After he had heard Meade recount the details of his harrowing experience and after the defendants had declined to cross-examine their accuser or to testify in their own behalf, Trial Commissioner Harold J. Stumbo set their bonds and declared, "This is the most disgraceful thing I ever heard of."

Bonds demanded for the two are: \$10,000 for kidnapping, \$10,000 for G. Archer and \$2,500 from the Presarmed robbery and \$5,000 to keep tonsburg General hospital of which the peace. The two were remanded he is part-owner.

The Department of Economic Security received \$880,000 from the U. S. Department of Labor: the Department of Education received \$400,000 from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The two state departments will jointly administer the program. Economic Security is responsible for recruitment, selection and job placement. The Department of Education is responsible for conducting the vocational classes.

A team of vocational education specialists from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare met in Frankfort with representatives of the two state agencies to assist in preparing classes that may be taught under the program.

Thirty-five vocational training classes, to be taught in area vocational schools, have been proposed by Kentucky. Federal approval is needed before any of the classes can be taught. Hilton says he is hopeful some of the classes can begin within the next few

Powell says he expects the Manpower program to surpass the Area classes taught and number of perder the ARA program.

Powell said that under the Manpower training program an unemployed person can receive up to 52 weeks' training and draw weekly subsistence payments averaging \$30. ARA classes, limited to 16 weeks, are aimed at persons living in economically depressed areas. Manpower program is aimed at workers who possess obsolete work skills, and persons who have no work

panding America. They moved to Arkansas, Missouri and other states of the middle West and in the later decades of the nineteenth cen-

Typical of this urge to go west was William Margard, grandson of John B. Maggard. Having grown to adulthood in the home of his parents. Henry and Polly Stamper Maggard, in the cabin home near the present Isom, Letcher county, he learned and loved the old, old


