Alleging negligence of the defendant firm, its agents and employees caused the deaths of the three adults and injury to the child, Stephenson sued for \$500,000 damages and \$1,190 funeral expenses in the death of Mr. Vanhorn; \$250,-000 damages and \$1,175 funeral expenses in the death of Mrs. Vanhorn, and \$150,000 damages because of injuries suffered by the Vanhorns' six-year-old daughter, Deb-

Last October, he sued in circuit court here for \$100,000 damages in the death of his wife. Last April, he filed suit in U. S. district court against the United States, asking a total of \$1,153,480 damages and itmeral expenses. He alleged that the bridge collapse was the direct and proximate result of negligence of the U. S. Corps of Engineers. The bridge was rebuilt at U. S.







A New Power Felt in Politics

Perhaps no particular segment of the state's population played a more vital role than the teachers in the recent Democratic primary as pertaining to the gubernatorial nomination.

Determined not to lose the ground they had gained, organized and fighting together as never before, they exerted an influence which reached down to practically every family in the state. They flexed political muscles never before used, muscles they probably did not realize that they had.

Effective as they were, there is a danger inherent in this role the teachers have played. Now feeling their "political oats," they must be aware of the responsibility which goes with power and influence and guard against the radical elements, the hot-heads and those other disturbing influences which inevitably find a toehold in any group of such size and numbers as the teachers represent.

They must not make the mistake other powerful and influential groups have made in the past. Their influence outside their own ranks will exist only as long as they realize that teachers owe their services to all classes of people and as they resist the temptation to see good only in those measures and official acts which are specifically good for the teachers.

The teachers must remember the No. 1 factor in the nomination of Edward T. Breathitt was Governor Bert Combs and his Administration which was marked by three years of progress, and by its imagination and courage which dared to do things never heretofore attempted in the Commonwealth.

They must remember, too, that in Mr. Breathitt they had a strong candidate, a refreshing personality, young, unscarred and yet aggressive, who is in himself the best proof of his intelligence, ability and purpose.

Never sell the teachers of the land and their influence short. Because their influence reaches so deeply into the lives of those about them, especially into the lives of children and youth, it is of extremely great importance that these teachers be the sort of individuals one would want to become a part of his children's lives.

Because they as a group have evinced a new power in the exercise of the ballot, it becomes doubly important that they themselves guard what they have and use it carefully.
