RC FAMILY AID PLANNED Flood-Stricken Number Exceeds 1957, Survey Of Floyd-Co. Shows

Approximately 1,100 flood-stricken families in this county MAYOR TELLS will receive assistance from the American Red Cross, it was an nounced this week by the loca chapler. This is an increase of 7 families over those aided follow ing the 1957 flood.

The Red Cross spent \$520,000 on rehabilitation in this county six years ago and it is though this amount will be exceeded slightly this year.

Workers are now visiting homes that were flooded and Mrs. F. L. Heinze, chapter chairman and Rev. Harold Dicks, disaste chairman, urge people who have registered to await these visit and not try to come to disaste headquarters here. Those wh have not registered should com to the disaster headquarters be fore March 31. New applications will not be accepted after that

"We have about 1,000 applications," Rev. Harold Dicks pointed out, "and it takes some time to reach everyone, but flood caused needs will be met just as rapidly as possible. In working out a so lution to a family's problem necessities are considered but not luxuries.'

Those who received cot blankets and mattresses during the emergency should, as soon a they are able, return this equipment to one of several centers: (1) Prestonsburg, Rescue Squad building; (2) McDowell, McDowell high school; (3) Martin, Martin Police Department and (4) Garrett, Griffith's Furniture store.





lion damage inflicted by the past winter. Every effort will be made, he said, to divert more funds to the recovery operation in Eastern Kentucky.

Other recovery operations were initiated from Frankfort as Governor Combs wired top Congressional committee chairmen to take immediate action on floodcontrol projects for Eastern Kentucky. "We will make maximum use of every state and federal program available," the Governor said. "But we know these must be reviewed to be effective in this unusual case where every program has already been extended to the maximum.

Two groups of officials from several federal agencies visited Eastern Kentucky last week. Governor Combs accompanied one group on Friday. Included in the party were Rep. Carl Perkins, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture John Baker, Edward McDermott, director of Emergency Resource Planning for the national Civil Defense office; Robert Shea, vice-president of the American Red Cross; and representatives of the U.S. Small Business Administration, Public Works Commission, Corps of Engineers and other agencies. The group attended public meetings at Hazard and later at Pikeville to advise localities on immediate flood recovery procedures and to learn from homeowners, businessmen, public officials and others the extent of damages and what additional programs might be put into action.

Lieutenant Governor Wyatt had accompanied a similar group of federal officials on the previous day, but conferences held later in Washington indicated the need of more intensive information on the 20-county disaster area, hit doubly by recurring floods and continuing economic problems.







One of the leases Ockerman showed was made to Mrs. Joyce Weddington for oil and gas rights in Natural Bridge State Park. She is the wife of Joe Weddington, of Prestonsburg, a partner with Chandler in the insurance business.

Another lease bearing Chandler's signature was made to Sheriff Ralph Smith, of Livingston county, who served as county chairman for Chandler in 1955. He is holding that same post during the current campaign.

Smith's lease was for the camping area at Kentucky Dam Village State Park. Ockerman said the state got only \$3,943 for that Jease in 1960. But last year, with the camping area back in state operation, Ockerman said records show the state grossed \$50,233.



we could have built for several years but thanks to the extra money we are getting from the state under the present tax program we are able to sell bonds for the construction of a Vocational School, a fine Consolidated School for Middle Creek and plan a new grade school for Wheelwright."

The truth is that the Floyd County School System is getting over one-fourth million dollars more each year to use for buildings, grounds, heat, lights and payments on bonded indebtedness than we had before Combs became Governor. The truth of this statement can be checked by writing or calling Division of Finance, State Department of Education, Frankfort, Kentucky.



The little, white tablets in the family's aspirin bottle could be as dangerous to your child as the fangs of a rattlesnake.

Innocent looking as they are, aspirins account for about 125,-000 of the annual poisonings of children under six. Prof. Richard M. Doty of the University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy, says about 500,000 children under six are poisoned annually.

Half of them are poisoned by taking too much, or unprescribed, medicine; one-fourth of the total are poisoned by aspirins. Of the total poisonings, 50,000 to 100,000 receive hospital emergency room care and about 500 die.

Dr. Charles A. Walton, also of the UK College of Pharmacy, points out that many household substances not marked with the familiar skull-and-crossbones are hazardous or may have have a corrosive effect on the body if they are taken internally. Such common products as lye or laundry bleach, he says, may incapacitate one for life.

Professor Doty says one of the most serious breaches of poison safety occurs when parents put paint, bleach or other harmful substances in containers a child might associate with a pleasing flavor. Paint thinner in a soft drink bottle, he declares, is like waving a red flag in front of a bull

It isn't possible to lock up an entire household, the UK professor concedes, but insofar as possible all poisons, medicines and strong materials such as weed killers should be kept safely out of children's reach


