These Roads Must Be Seen To Be "Appreciated"

Ky. 404 is that narrow, twisting route which was largely a hasty improvisation done in the 1940's to serve the mining town of David. Over this dangerous road school buses must run and, beginning in late August, transport to school and back home, daily, every child of school age in that part of the populous Middle Creek section. Drive the road today and you wonder how a vehicle as large as a school bus will be able to meet and pass other traffic. You shudder at the thought of a loaded bus plunging down high embankments which have not a semblance of a guard-rail.

Ky. 7, on the other hand, is a comparatively new highway, reasonably straight and wide. Here, the great problem, and problem it is, is dust.

This is the route now followed by all traffic from the upper Right Beaver Creek section of Floyd and Knott counties on the way to the Mountain Parkway and the Blue Grass and by miners travelling to and from Magoffin and Breathitt county employment. The traffic is heavy, and the result is a cloud of dust, by day and night. Homes and vegetation along the route lie deep in a coating of dust. There are many dusty roads in Kentucky, we realize, and we have seen our part of them, but never have we seen one so heavily travelled as Ky. 7.

If inhalation of dust is harmful to humans, respiratory and other ailments may result. Pride in home and its exterior appearance is utter vanity there, for no paint of whatever color or permanence can compete with the dust. And, if school buses drive the highway, and they surely will, come late August and the opening of school, their headlights will burn in broad daylight, competing with the brilliant rays of the sun as the driver hopes to warn other motorists of the approach of his vehicle.

The Floyd County Times has a deep respect for the judgment and integrity of Commissioner of Highways Henry Ward, and it does not want to make his difficult job harder for him. It is aware of his obligations to all Kentucky and of the limitations of resources for road purposes. But we do wish he could drive over these two roads and see

the situation for himself.



Stamper had enlisted to fight against the Ohio Indians and could not set out for his new charge until December.

"There were often times of great excitement and what would usually be called revivals of religion; but so volatile and unstable were the subjects of these excitements that no lasting effect was produced. Often in the short space of three weeks, many that professed religion and shouted as if they were in the suburbs of heaven, went back into their former profligacy. I was led to fear that no permanent good could be effected among these people, but time has proved the contrary.

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

Two years ago, Kentucky became the 24th state to participate in a cooperative research study sponsored by the Kentucky State Police, the Kentucky State Department of Health, the Kentucky State Medical Association and the Kentucky Hospital Association in collaboration with Cornell University.

Aimed at reducing the exessive injuries occurring in highway passenger car accidents, the automotive crash injury research program of Cornell University has as its primary objective the study of the relationship between car design and injury sustained by the occupants.



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
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
