





In the Prestonsburg Community College the earnest student will find a curriculum designed by, and instructors selected and employed by, the University of Kentucky. The net result for the student who desires to learn will be two years of college education which will be equal to the same period of study at the University of Kentucky itself and which will enable the student to go on for the final two years of college work at any four-year institution of his

Dr. John W. Oswald, president of UK, is deeply interested in the community college here and wherever such a college has been established. He has seen the great worth of such a system of higher education in the state of California, and so it is that he looks ahead with enthusiasm to the development of Kentucky's system of colleges that are designed to reach the people.

Two years hence, the Prestonsburg Community College will be having its own commencement exercises as it sends those who will enroll here in September on to other colleges to receive their degrees. We have an idea that, as they look backward, a few years farther on, they will be proud to have been the first in a college which, resplendently new and modern, they saw on its way to generations of service in the field of education.

Because of this facility of which most of us have dreamed and for which many worked and gave. we congratulate, even a bit more heartily than usual, those of this and surrounding counties who are being graduated from high school this year.





C. & O. vice-president M. I. Dunn told the Senate appropriations subcommittee last week that the carrier was ready to go ahead with the work as soon as the Army Corps of Engineers made a lump-sum payment of \$11 mil-

The engineers contracted in December to make the payment for C. & O. relocation of its lines, clearing the way for the Fishtrap flood-control dam project on the Big Sandy River. The matter had been in negotiation five years.

"We are prepared to let five contracts for simultaneous construction of a major portion of the line within 30 days after payment is received, Dunn told the senators.

The Interstate Commerce Commissio non March 31 approved the relocation of the C. & O. line and "We are acquiring right-of-way for the new line now," Dunn said.

The relocation will require "a substantial capital expendi-ture by C. & O.," in additions to the payment received from the Corps of Engineers, Dunn

Dunn has agreed to relocate the 19 miles of line, from Millard to Dunlap, outside the projected area. He said the new line "will permit the opening of coal mines in a heretofore virgin area and provide a permanent boost to the economy of this depressed region.

Senators John Sherman Cooper and Thruston B. Morton, Kentucky Republicans, asked the committee to provide all possible additional funds to keep the project construction on schedule and enable the engineers to meet their obligation to the railroad.

Gen. John Hunt Morgan Marker

An historical marker, commemorating Gen. John Hunt Morgan's raids in Kentucky, was dedicated here, May 9, by the Greenville Davidson Chapter, United Daughters of the Confederacy. It was erected at the approach to the new four-lane Mountain Parkway bridge.

Morgan, following his defeat at Cynthiana in 1864, retreated to Virginia along the old state road and passed through Prestonsburg, June 18, 1864. He arrived at Abingdon, Va., two days later, where he began to reorganize his shattered troops. He was killed a few weeks later at Greenville, Tennessee.
