Being hunters and woodsmen they easily proceeded Monday, Tuesday, Thursday along the trail not knowing that the soldier would be retracing his steps. According to Richard Potter, the soldier called at the Potter home near the present Rhododendron Lodge, and near where Mr. Potter now lies buried in a marked grave. The soldier stated his home was in one of the Carolinas but in his eagerness to be homeward bound, he did not give his name.

"Mr. Potter later told of advising the soldier to retrace his steps to Elkhorn Creek where he would be on a state road with more favorable travel conditions. The soldier, unmindful of danger was returning along the trail but no further than this spot when

he was shot from ambush. "In the afternoon a Mr. Swinney and a companion found the dead man and aroused the sparsely settled neighborhood to help bury the victim. A nearby chestnut or chestnut oak tree was felled and boards were split from a section of the trunk and a coffin was made The women removed the victim's shirt and washed it for his burial. It being late in the day, burial was put off until the following day. There was some discussion among the men as to the folly of burying the good boots on the victim, and no one getting any benefit from such serviceable footwear; one of the men stated that since the victim's boots were his size that he would just "swap" and that was done. A good watch worn by the victim was preserved also but it is not known who got the watch. "Opinion was freely expressed

as to the identity of the killer but naming names would serve no good purpose now.

"What possible motive could







Aged Rush Resident Victim At Son's Home; Funeral Held Sunday





E. R. Price, Wheelwright Mine Manager

E. R. Price, late manager of the Wheelwright mine property of Inland Steel Company, began his career in the mines of Consolidation Coal Company in Pennsylvania in 1906, was promoted through the engineering department until 1917 when he was sent to Van Lear as manager. He became manager of the Wheelwright properties in 1928 for Elk Horn Coal Company and was retained by Inland when that firm acquired the former in 1930. The town of Wheelwright was founded in 1916 by Elk Horn. It was under Price's leadership that Wheelwright was made a model mining town.

Price was a civic leader of the area, served as trustee of Berea College, regent of Morehead State College, trustee of Pine Mountain Settlement School and was active in the Boy Scout movement. He retired in 1954 to Frederick, Md., where he died.

Price is shown in this photograph receiving a portrait of himself, presented by Bert T. Combs for the Prestonsburg Kiwanis Club. Harry Zimmerman, who succeeded Price as Inland manager is shown in the background near Combs.






