In that instance the defendant was fined \$100.00 plus costs, the maximum penalty permitted by law, and not \$20.00 as reported by the statement in the Floyd County Times. #### Nathaniel "Can" Estep (1842-1922)

Nathaniel Estep was born March 22, 1842, in Scott County, Virginia, and married Mary Carter in his native county, Jan. 10, 1860. He served four years in the Confederate Army.

Mr. Estep was the first postmaster at Garrett, then known as Ballard, Ky. The postoffice was named for Mrs. Estep's brother, Ballard Carter, Prestonsburg. He was affiliated with the Masonic Lodge and helped organize James W. Alley Lodge, at Wayland.

## We Should Be With Them in the river. The corn in the jug makes us In Their Time Of Tragedy


Floyd county has had its share of tragedy, and we of all people should have a kinship in the sufferings and trials of others.




How shall we do it? Direct contributions of cash, clothing and food are fine. But to whom shall we send these? We need to know somebody who is on the scene.




Coal is the principal mineral resource in the area. The map

At the door was a padded brick, with colored silk-scraps cover, and briar-stitching around each scrap. And, my student told me, there was the typical musty odor over everything, for the room was shut up six out of seven days and had had time to accumulate this front-room odor.

And, in every such settlement, traditional ways were kept up, long after the older generation had passed away.
