

A manufacturer's representative on a visit to Prestonsburg recently received, we are told, "the surprise of his life.'

He came here with after-images of headlines telling of poverty, isolation, and the like dancing in his eyes.

A busy community with its streets newly surfaced, almost its length and breadth; a new college which premises to set a record for growth; two modern highways entering the town; a modernized and expanded water system; a new sewer system and sewage disposal plant; two urban renewal projects almost at completion; a new courthouse; a major recreation and vacation facility in Jenny Wiley State Park, Dewey Lake and May Lodge; a developing city park to add to these ad-

The visitor was impressed not only by what he saw but also by what he learned. He knew that what had happened and was still happening here did not "just happen." He realized what we here at home too often fail to realize—that Prestonsburg had benefitted from strong leadership.

When Bert Combs as governor conceived and made into reality the Mountain Parkway and extended an arm of that highway into Prestonsburg, and then built the Prestonsburg Community College, this community could have—and at one time would have-accepted the turn of events as routine and contented itself to await developments without effort of its own, willing to be satisfied with whatever good might befall.

But a city administration of professional and business men who were not oversensitive to criticism dared to get going, to take advantage of all the help available from state and federal governments and to commit their own people to their share of the financial and moral responsibility. Men in private business gave of their time and abilities to planning and working for these improve-

And the people themselves have not balked. No longer does the "armed camp" situation prevail in Prestonsburg. Citizens of diverse interests and views have done an excellent job of submerging themselves in something that is greater. The Community Development Council, civic clubs, the Jaycees, and now a Chamber of Commerce, have brought them together.

Time was when "cooperation" was not in the local lexicon, and the literal definition of "competitor" sometimes was, "mortal enemy." In contradistinction to this spirit was the advertisement which a Prestonsburg merchant recently published in this newspaper, listing not only his own wares but concluding by pointing out to the public that if his store did not have the item or items required Prestonsburg has other modern stores filled with quality merchandise.

All is not perfect—it's far from perfect. Mistakes have been made, and still others are to come. But the community has been, and is, moving forward.

The manufacturer's representative had, we are ready to believe, "the surprise of his life." We believe that because we ourselves have had our surprises as Prestonsburg and its people have got down to the business of working together after years of knocking themselves out through the senseless exertion of throwing what amounted to no more than wet blankets.

Military Personnel To Find Retirement Transition Easier

Retiring military personnel may find the transition to civilian life easier in the future because of an active program now under way in Kentucky and every other state which has a major military installation. The nationwide program is designed to help retiring military personnel find civilian jobs for which they are qualified.

According to Glenn S. Anderson, manager of the Kentucky Employment Service office here, the program is a "cooperative effort between the Kentucky State Employment Service and the Department of Defense to aid adjustment of military retirees from service to civilian jobs. This objective is being done through employment orientation, counseling, testing and placement as-

"The program," Anderson said, "will give retirees a realistic attitude about salaries and job duties, and the possible need for training. It is also designed to help overcome resistance on the part of some employers because of the age of most military retirees. The average retiree is in his middle forties."

Military retirees generally fall into two categories:

1. Those who are well qualified for civilian occupations and have developed their own post-retirement plans;

2. Those who possess primarily military occupational skills and need intensive assistance in preparation for civilian employment. Anderson said that his office aims to prepare local military retirees to make the maximum use of their skills and capabilities, and so to enable them to contribute to the Kentucky or the national economy.







The result of the lake and its recreational pulling-power has had a profound economic impact on Marshall county, according to a report just released by the State Department of Parks.

Prepared by Phillip W. Jeffress, Fulton, a graduate student at the University of Kentucky, working toward the master's degree in economics, the study aims to outline the general over-all growth of Marshall county and to pinpoint what part is due to tourism as an industry.

Jeffress was employed by the Parks Department this summer to make the study. He has been working on it since late May.

He concludes that much of the county's economic growth can be traced directly to

"The average per-capita income of Marchall county residents rose from 44 in the state in 1954 to third in 1962," the report said, with an increase in total personal income of 200%.

During the same period employment in tourist-patronized business rose over 900%.

This figure is compared by the report to an increase of 360% in employment in all industries in Marshall county for the same period and 18% in all industries for the state as a whole.

In addition, the study shows population in the county has remained relatively steady, rising only from 16,602 in 1940 to 16,736 at the 1960 census.

Most of the county's nontourist industrial gain is traced by the report to the growing chemical complex around Calvert City. "The construction of State

parks in Marshall county has created almost 400 new jobs. in the parks alone," the report said. Last year the combined payroll to employees of the parks there was just under a half-million dollars." No less than 65 new motels have been built in Marshall

county since 1945 when there were none, the report asserted. "The construction of restaurants, theaters, service stations, gift shops and other such establishments have come as a direct result of the tourist

business. "Sales in gasoline, food, beverages, and recreation have doubled and tripled," the report added, "and these are only minor examples of the kind of growth for which tourism is responsible."

The report points out that wholesale and retail sales show a marked increase during the summer months when the parks are most heavily visited.

"Retail grocery sales last year for July, when tourist business was the heaviest. were 67.1% above the low month of January.

"Grocery sales in non-tourist counties usually fall off in the summer months," the report added.

Marked increases in real property assessments (46% since 1951, compared with a 28% rise for all Kentucky counties), tax receipts (enough to enable the county to pay cash for its new courthouse at Benton, the county seat), and commercial bank deposits (from \$4.8 million in 1950 to \$20.6 million in 1964), were also listed in the report as evidence of the economic im-
