# RICHMOND'S BEAR MARKET SALE



The great-great grandfather of Fred Cottrell operated a general store in Prestonsburg more than one hundred years ago. He owned a bear which was kept chained to a tree next to the store. It was his custom in those days to invite home for lunch all customers who happened to be in the store at the noon hour. The invitation was usually accepted and store and bear were left unattended.

On one such occasion he and his friends returned to the store to find the bear had broken his chain and was inside the building. They found him inside the overturned sugar barrel, enjoying the sweet. As a result of this incident he staged the first sale in Prestonsburg—a sale of sugar from the barrel, at bargain prices. And now, a century later, Mr. Cottrell goes back to this bear tale to turn over barrels and barrels of bargains for Richmond's friends and customers.

## Women's Job Corps Screening Set At Health Center Here Next Wednesday, Thursday

Young Kentucky women who have had difficulty in school, in homemaking, or in getting and holding a job have a new chance to help themselves as a result of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964.

Women from the ages of 16-21 now having trouble because of the lack of education and job skill to move ahead are urged to be here at the Floyd County Health Center, on Wednesday, July 21, or Thursday, July 22, when screening for the Job Corps will take place.

Additional information may be had immediately from the Public Assistance Office here, or from the Child Welfare worker who serves this area.

The new Job Corps for women seeks girls who need help. They may need training to find or hold a job; they may need help in learning how to be better homemakers, or in training to become office workers, waitresses, nurses aides, sales clerks or for other kinds of jobs.

Girls accepted for the Job Corps will be sent to Regional Training Centers for a period up to two years. While they are being trained, they receive room, clothing, board and \$30 a month.

One week after issuing notices to those who have not made the required connection, a second canvass will be made. Wherever violations are found, names and addresses will be procured and a number of these will be drawn by lot and summoned into court.

The following week, a third and final canvass will be made, and wherever visible and concrete evidence of compliance is not found, all responsible offenders will be hauled into court.

Dr. Hall said that a few have complained that they cannot comply, because tees have not been positioned in the main sewer lines near their homes or businesses so as to permit connection of the smaller lines from their premises. "These," he commented, "should have been brought to the attention of the city officials who have been entrusted with this phase of the operation."

Discussing this unpleasant phase of the health department's work as it deals with individuals, Dr. Hall commented: "If it (the health department) did not honor its obligations and duties, then the people should close it or any other health department so falling them, and save their money."

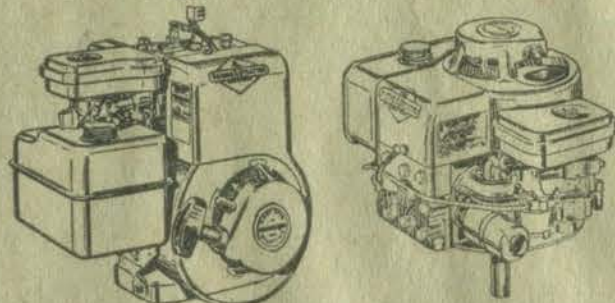
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## NATURE TRAILS

### ADULT CRIMES AND JUVENILE CRUELTY TO ANIMALS

A prominent Senator who made an extensive study of the life history of adult criminals pointed out recently the close connection between adult crimes and juvenile cruelty to animals. He says:

"All the notorious criminals of the world from Nero on down to the modern Dillingers and Pomeroys were cruel to animals in their childhood, and the lesser ones who now fill our penal institutions have shown a callous indifference to suffering."

The boy who ties cans with rocks in them to a dog's tail to watch it flee in panic, or hangs cats up by the tail to see them claw each other, is sowing the seeds of a cruelty that may sprout into a life of crime in later years. Adults are partly to blame for the cruelty of teenagers to helpless animals. At a public garbage dump, several adult persons have been taking unwanted dogs there to be rid of them—dogs half naked with mange, dogs old and blind and crippled, and dogs with litters of unwanted puppies—all these have been carried there and tossed out. Recently some boys took their rifles, went to the dump, gathered up some of these helpless dogs, tied them up by the heels and used them for targets. If the adults hadn't taken these unwanted dogs there in the first place, the boys wouldn't have cooked up their scheme of using them for target practice.

Applicants should plan on about one and a half hours at the testing centers, unless they wish to take the Spanish or French language achievement test, which requires an additional hour.

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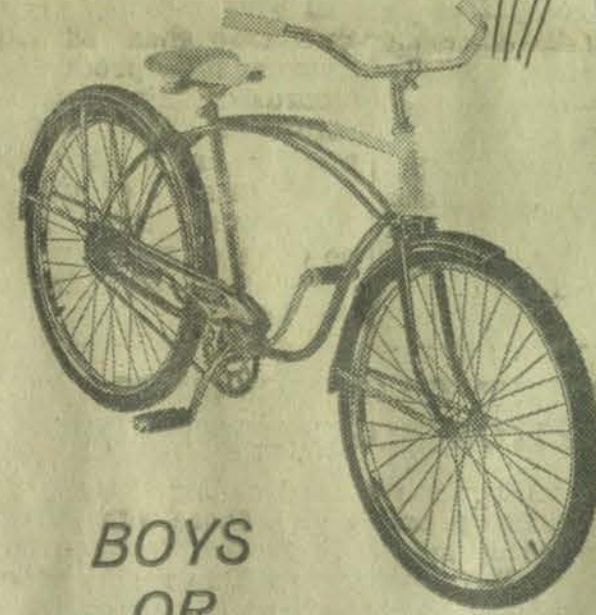
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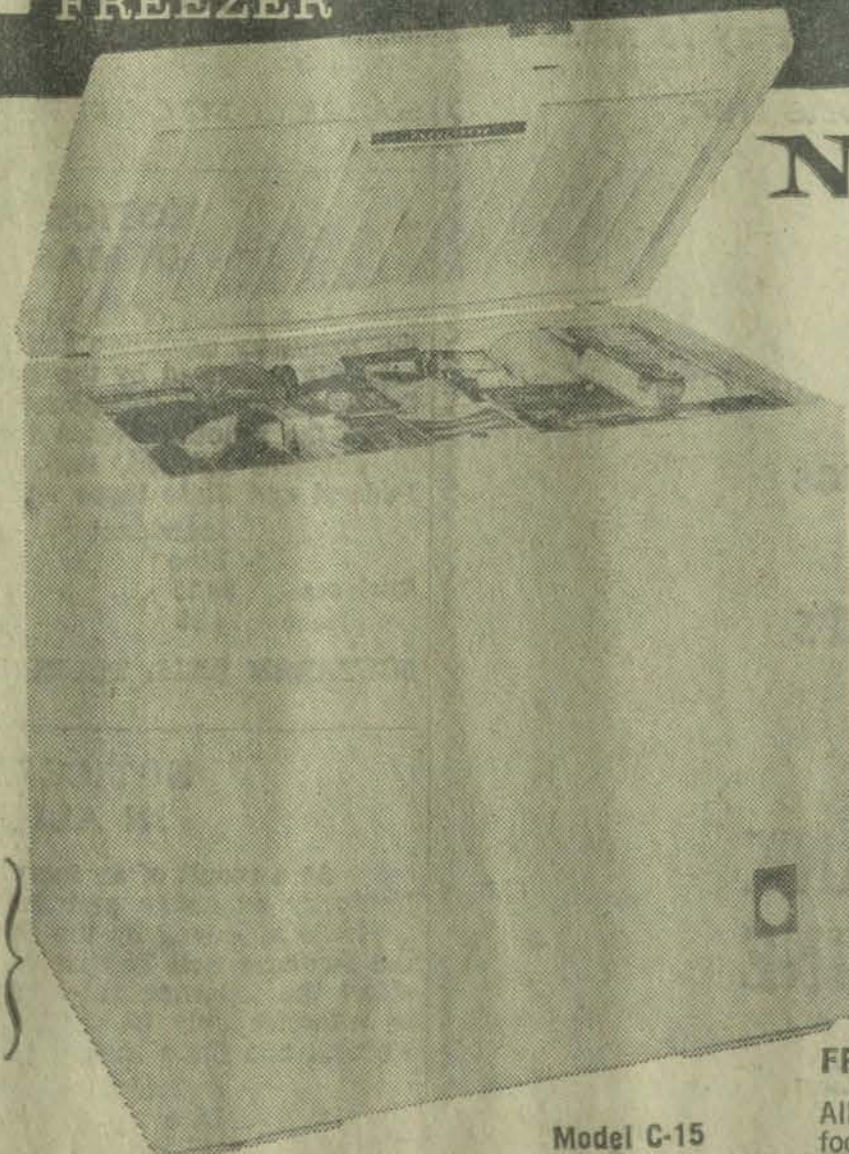

Stokes, director of Health Mobilization, Kentucky State Department of Health. # STRICT STRIP-MINE RULES HELD POSSIBLE

 (In The Courier-Journal)  
 Middlesboro, Ky.—State reclamation officials said yesterday stricter controls are apparently needed over strip mining in Eastern Kentucky mountains.  
 One held forth the possibility that the Department of Natural Resources will issue a regulation within the next 30 days to:  
 Prohibit strip mining in extremely steep terrain.  
 Or to curb the wide width of the benches that operators cut into the sides of mountains to mine coal.  
 Deputy Commissioner Robert Montgomery voiced dissatisfaction with the extent of acid mine-water drainage in the mountains. The predicted regulations would primarily affect the operators of some strip mines in Perry, Pike, Breathitt, Harlan, Bell, Floyd, Knott and Letcher counties.  
 The fact that the department is considering issuing such a regulation was revealed yesterday by Elmore Grim, director of strip

mining and reclamation.  
 He spoke at the end of a two-day field trip through Eastern Kentucky by mining officials, and state, federal and private conservation and reclamation experts from ten states.  
 "We've got to control stripping on precipitous slopes," Grim said.  
 The regulation, if issued, will come after the department reviews studies that Central States Experiment Station is making at Berea.  
 The station, a division of the U. S. Forestry Service, is studying whether slides can be prevented at mountain strip mines, or whether strip mining should be prohibited in such areas.  
 Grim indicated the department expects to have enough data available from the studies to make a decision within 30 days.  
 "Several spokesmen from other states have told us during the tour they believe that when you get over a 60-percent slope, you shouldn't allow strip mining," he said.  
 The regulation wouldn't have the effect of outlawing strip mining in Eastern Kentucky. It would prevent stripping on exceptionally steep inclines.  
 Strip mining on steep slopes in the mountains quite often results in mammoth slides that send earth, rock and other debris cascading down the hillsides onto the terrain below. Incidents of this type have raised a clamor in some sections of Eastern Kentucky the past few weeks for legislation to outlaw strip mining.

 real religion in the man or woman who pats a friendless dog, or rests a tired horse, or feeds a hungry cat, or befriends a stray animal, than there is in the miser who builds a church to pray in.  
 One might ask, would a person with a Christlike spirit haul a sick or a blind old dog to a garbage dump and toss it out to die in misery? Christ spent forty days in the wilderness and St. Mark says, "He was with the wild beasts," and although He became very hungry not a single animal did he kill for food!  
 There is a spark of mother love in the fiercest of animals, a spark that can be touched off and it will turn a killer into a kind-hearted mother. This is illustrated by a touching incident told recently by a man who was watching a large and very fierce female tiger stalking a small kid goat, about a month old, which had strayed away from its mother. The man stood spellbound as the great female tiger slunk across the open plain towards the helpless little goat; it was too small to realize its danger and didn't know what fear was.  
 Instead of showing fear as the tiger came on with every muscle taut, its mouth dripping saliva, the little goat began to bleat, and it ran forward to meet its would-be killer. Without hesitation and without any fear, the kid ran straight to the huge tigress, bleating for its mother, and thinking the big beast was its own mother. The tigress suddenly arose and stood erect, her eyes fixed upon the little goat. Instead of leaping to make the kill, she stood quietly while the little goat ran up, stuck out its soft, pink tongue and licked the killer's mouth. For a split second, the big tigress stood and let the goat lick it; something seemed to stir in her savage heart. The unfeeling little goat touched off her deep instinct of mother love, and for a moment the two stood nose to nose; then the tigress suddenly swung around and slunk away while the little goat bleated after her.

**THE DANGEROUS PESTICIDES**  
 Last year, about 700 million pounds of poisonous chemicals were sprayed on every 12 acres of land. Many power companies used helicopters to spread the poisonous sprays over rights-of-way sixty feet wide and hundreds of miles long, killing everything inside this strip. Many farmers used airplanes to spread poisonous insecticides over their farms. The highways and railways used their own spray machines and killed all the weeds, shrubs and bushes along the right-of-way, leaving a blighted, blackened eyesore on the countryside. Despite the use of these deadly sprays, there are this year more insect pests than ever known! The pests are destroying our valuable tulip poplars, attacking the sycamores, sassafras, Chinese and American elms, locusts and many others. The sprays have failed to control the insect pests; rather, they have made them worse! This is because such widespread spraying upsets the balance of nature and destroys the birds, which nature has designed to control and to keep in check the hordes of insect pests. Spraying the bushes, shrubs and weeds along railways and power lines kills the young birds in their nests, renders the eggs of others infertile and kills the predators that devour insects; it also poisons the insects, which the birds eat and soon die!

per lunch, and the average reim-  
bursement is approximately five  
cents," Bevins said.

Factors which determine the  
amount of reimbursement re-  
ceived for each lunch reflect the  
comparative need of the individ-  
ual program, and include the size  
of the school enrollment, percent  
of participation of students in the  
lunch program, percent of free  
lunches, lunch cost to the stu-  
dents, and the economic welfare  
of the individual school district.  
Bevins said each lunch served  
in the special assistance program  
earns a flat 15-cent reimburse-  
ment.

In addition to the extra amount  
of reimbursement, Lewis said,  
"the rural schools have received a  
more generous supply of the com-  
modity foods."

A typical lunch served in the  
program includes a meat, green  
vegetable, fruit and cookies,  
bread, butter and milk.

In conventional lunch pro-  
grams, each school operates a  
kitchen and dining room and em-  
ploys school lunch personnel. But  
for the most part, in the special  
programs the classrooms serve  
as lunchrooms, and teachers heat  
the pre-cooked foods on hot plates  
or pot-bellied stoves.

Dishwashing is held to a min-  
imum because children eat from  
low-cost paper plates, and they  
may carry their silverware home  
for a daily washing. Operating  
procedures vary to meet the re-  
quirements of individual schools.
