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Motor Transportation Head Sees Little Hope of Control Of Overweight Coal Trucks

The State Department of Motor Transportation will respond to the latest Perry county complaints by checking for overweight coal trucks there. Commissioner Ben Combs said Tuesday at Frankfort.

But Combs saw little hope for any real solution to the longstanding problem. He said:

"There will be someone sent in to check. . . I have done that before this. . . Normally, the truckers will stop operations when they see our boys there. They'll just try to outwit each other. . . It's common knowledge they're tearing up the roads—they're always here—it appears like they're always going to."

Perry fiscal court voted Friday to ask the DMT to send in scales, weighmen and officers. The action followed a 40-name petition from the Lost Creek area, protesting destruction of blacktopped KY. 1146 by heavily-loaded trucks.

Normally, one DMT inspector is assigned to cover both Perry and Knott counties. There are no permanent DMT scales in Perry and portable scales must be used, creating a dangerous situation on narrow mountain highways.

Combs said "two or three" more men will be sent into Perry and they will probably issue some citations. Then, he added:

"How much we can do will be up to the local courts."

Last year, DMT officers issued 108 citations to truckers in Perry county and got eight convictions, Combs said. Forty defendants were acquitted, 35 charges were filed away and

25 charges were dropped after defendants met qualifications, such as buying a proper tag. "I talked with (Perry County Judge Babe) Noplis a couple of times last year, pleading for cooperation. . . He never did offer any," Combs said.

The pattern in East Kentucky is this, Combs said:

The coal-mine owners claim their margin of profit is so slim they've got to move coal in big loads.

The truck owner often is a small, independent operator financially pressed by a mortgage (which may be controlled indirectly by the mine-owners) and he has to work his trucks constantly at the mine-owners' terms to meet his payments.

The county officials are under pressure from the mine-owners, the truckers and associated businesses to keep the trucks running.

Combs said he has talked to several county judges about the overloaded coal trucks. "All they say is, 'I just can't put these people out of business.'"

As an enforcement agency, the Department of Motor Transportation can't operate effectively "contrary to the wishes of the local judiciary," Combs said.
