They lay their oval shaped eggs in the crevices of bark, sometimes around the and margin of the leaves. They do not seem to do much feeding but d i n e sparsely on the leaves of wild cherry, oak and maple. They have keen ears, which are located on or near their knees. The eggs remain in the trees or on the leaves until spring, when they hatch

out into small nymphs, much like their parents, but lacking wings. They moult several times and soon develop into adult katydids, to become the "green jizzy witches" of the dark and leafy night woods.





### **Meat Inspectors Give Points on Labeling**

To help consumers gain a bet ter understanding of labeling requirements for meats and meat products, meat inspectors of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service offer the following tips for homemakers:

COUNTRY STYLE HAS SPEC-IAL MEANING - The term "Country Style" can only be used to describe ham which has been rubbed with a cure mixture containing salt and sugar and placed in a container for at least 60 days or more. The resulting meat is quite firm, and when cut the surface will have a dry appearance.


FEDERAL INSPECTION MARK - The federal inspection mark must be printed on cartons and similar containers to assure uniformity and legibility. Applying the mark by hand is permitted only for identification and import inspection where printing is impractical.


"ALL BEEF" TAMALES -The term "All Beef" cannot be used for tamales unless the product actually contains all beef in the center portion. Tamales which contain both beef and cereal products must be labeled Alice Lloyd College with some other accurate designation

VEAL LEG FOR CUTLETS-The label "Veal Leg for Cutlets" can only be used to describe a product that is derived from the veal round.
