

COUNTY GETS INVITATION

For Officials, Citizens To Attend Homecoming To Be Held at Capital

Frankfort — The citizens of Floyd County have been invited to Kentucky's statewide homecoming at Frankfort, June 4, 5 and 6, by special invitation of Governor Edward T. Breathitt and the Capital City's Mayor James Flynn.

"We want everyone to come," Flynn said this week. "This is the statewide homecoming site for 1965 Homecoming Year and there will be plenty of fun for everyone, including a parade, beauty contest, dancing and movie."

"In addition, we are celebrating Kentucky's 174th birthday during our homecoming and this is cause for everyone to come and join in the festivities."

Flynn and Breathitt also issued a joint invitation to Floyd County Judge Henry Stumbo to represent the county as an honored guest. Judge Stumbo has been asked to name a queen to represent the county. Her name, along with those of other county candidates from across the state, will be placed in a container from which Governor Breathitt will draw the name of Kentucky's 1965 Homecoming Queen.

Breathitt said he is looking forward to visiting with the county judges and their families, the county queens and all Kentuckians during the three-day homecoming.

In addition to special activities centering around the county judges and county queens, a varied program of events is scheduled for other homecoming visitors throughout that day in celebration of Kentucky Homecoming and of commemoration of Kentucky's 174th birthday. During the entire day Saturday, four tractor-drawn "fun-mobiles" will circle downtown Frankfort and the Capitol with free rides for all. In the evening the world's premiere of the movie, "Wonders of Kentucky," will be held at the Capitol Theatre. Following the first showing to an invited audience, the movie will be shown, continuously, free to the public.

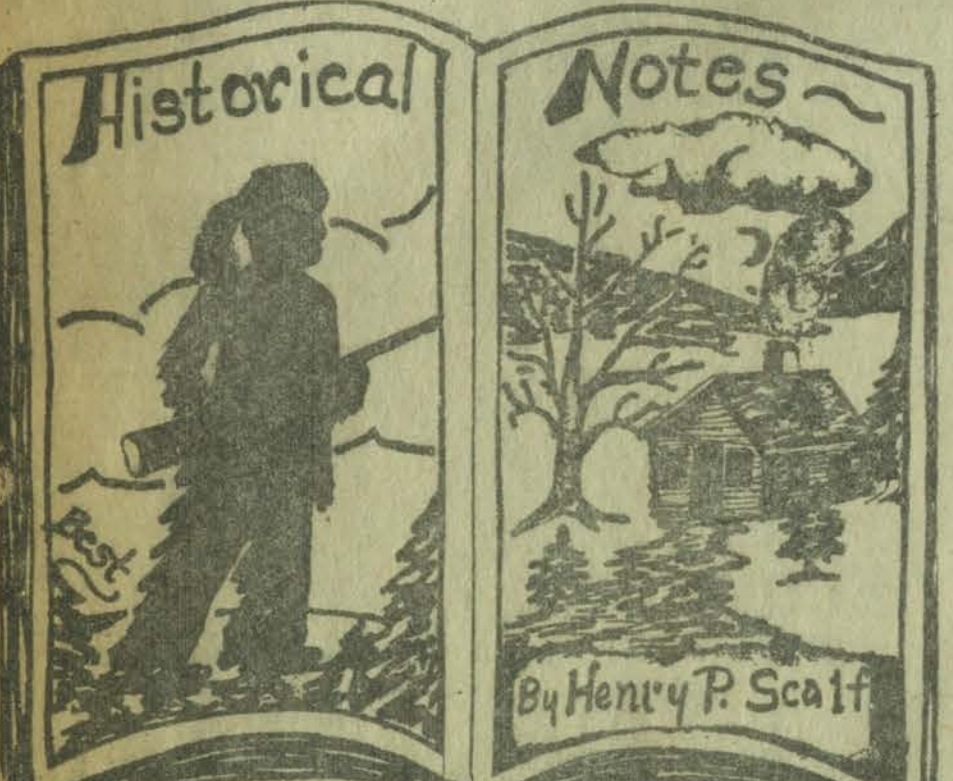

MIGRATE TO ARKANSAS

A letter from Mrs. Hazel N. Close, 1395 Thomas Road, Medford, Oregon, offers information on Eastern Kentucky families that migrated to Arkansas in the last century.

Walter and Millie Stalcup Mankins were ancestors of mine. Their daughter Nancy married George W. Lewis, 22 or 24 March, 1813, in Floyd county, Kentucky. It was a double wedding ceremony. Lydia Lewis was the other bride and John Vanhose her groom.

Bracken Lewis (1801-1891) married, 1819, Matilda Preston, a daughter of Nathaniel Preston, of Prestonsburg. The Lewis family joined his brother and other relatives in Arkansas in 1835 or 1837. Peter Mankins, the stepfather, lived to be 111 years of age.

The Parkers, Dosier and Melvina, migrated to Arkansas from Kentucky in 1837. Sarah, the daughter, became the wife of John Lewis, one of the many sons of Bracken Lewis.

Three sons of Peter Mankins, Sr., were Walter (his wife was Mary), John (whose wife was also named Mary), and Peter, Jr., whose wife was Marcissa. The wife of Peter, Sr., was Rachel Bracken Lewis. They were married September 23, 1803, in Orange county, North Carolina.

If you know anything of the Kentucky families of Sear's (David) or Powell, I would be most interested to learn of them.

COLVIN FAMILY

A letter from Glen A. Colvin, Box 122, Tioga, Louisiana, contributes additional information on the Colvin family.

He writes: "My records on the Colvin family are quite clear and complete, dating from the fall of 1804 when Thomas Colvin (1769-1841) and Hannah Ashcraft Colvin (1775-1829) came 'up' from Kentucky into Highland county, Ohio, accompanied by Gideon Jackson. Thomas joined in 1805 by brothers John and James. They were accompanied by Henry Roush.

Family legend as yet unproved by me says the parents of these three Colvin boys were James and Frances Salisbury Colvin James, veteran of the French and Indian War and Revolutionary War, received a land grant in Fayette county, now Pennsylvania, and a later grant of 2,774 acres of Kentucky land for services in these wars.

Thomas acquired over 1,000 acres on White Oak Creek, Highland county, Ohio. Stranely, Joseph and Vincent Colvin, settled on the same creek, a few miles south in Brown county, Ohio. They were probably cousins, which is, of course, a matter of conjecture. It is thought the Colvins might have resided in Floyd and Mason counties in Kentucky.

As some Colvin relatives later appeared in Highland county, hailing from in and around Culpeper county, Virginia, it appears my line may be connected with the so-called Kentucky Colvins, founded by one John Col-

vin. Any dates whatever on these three Colvins, their relatives or ancestry, will be sincerely appreciated.

In a note at the bottom of the letter Mr. Colvin says that Mary Ashcraft was in Kentucky prior to 1809. Any readers having Colvin information are asked to correspond with the writer. He will gladly exchange information.

TACKETT FAMILY
Jim William Tackett, Box 472, Live Oak, California, president of the Tackett Family Association, writes in answer to an inquiry from this columnist on Fort Tackett, Virginia, later West Virginia.

"Yes, we do have considerable data on Fort Tackett, which was located in Kanawha county, West Virginia, or Virginia at that time. We have deferred any publication on it at the request of one of our members who is doing some work on it but I am enclosing a brief that you may publish or use as you wish.

"We (most of us) have believed that all branches of the family are descendants of Lewis and Tom Tackett, later changed to Tackett. Records found in the Carolinas make this almost certain. As genealogy is an uncertain science we can never claim these new-found records to be indisputable evidence.

"We have extensive statistical and biographical data on Lewis Tackett and some data on his children. These records are from Daughters of the American Revolution records, court records, old newspapers, histories, Census schedules.

"The Tacketts (the majority) of Eastern Kentucky do not descend from this Lewis Tackett but from cousins who went down into the Carolinas about the mid-1700's and up into Kentucky through Cumberland Gap. One of these early Tacketts, William, was the third person to receive land in the Watauga Association in what is now Eastern Tennessee. Tacketts have appeared in Eastern Kentucky records since about 1800-10 with increasing amounts starting in the 1820's as witnessed by land grant and warrant records.

"All three variations of the name appear at different times in most of the branches so these variations hold little significance. The spelling, Tackett, seems to be peculiar to Tennessee with few outside that state. The 'it' spelling has not been found earlier than 1800-10, the earliest being found in South Carolina and Missouri Territory.

"Lewis and brother, Christopher, came to the St. Albans, West Virginia, area during the summer months of 1788 via the Great Kanawha River and stopped at the mouth of what is now called Coal River where they erected a fort which was destroyed by Indians, August 27, 1790. Lewis had extensive land holdings as recorded in 1789. He received 433 acres on Left Hand Fork of Mud River and two grants of 300 and 400 acres respectively on Big Hurricane Creek. An historical marker notes the approximate location of Fort Tackett at St. Albans."

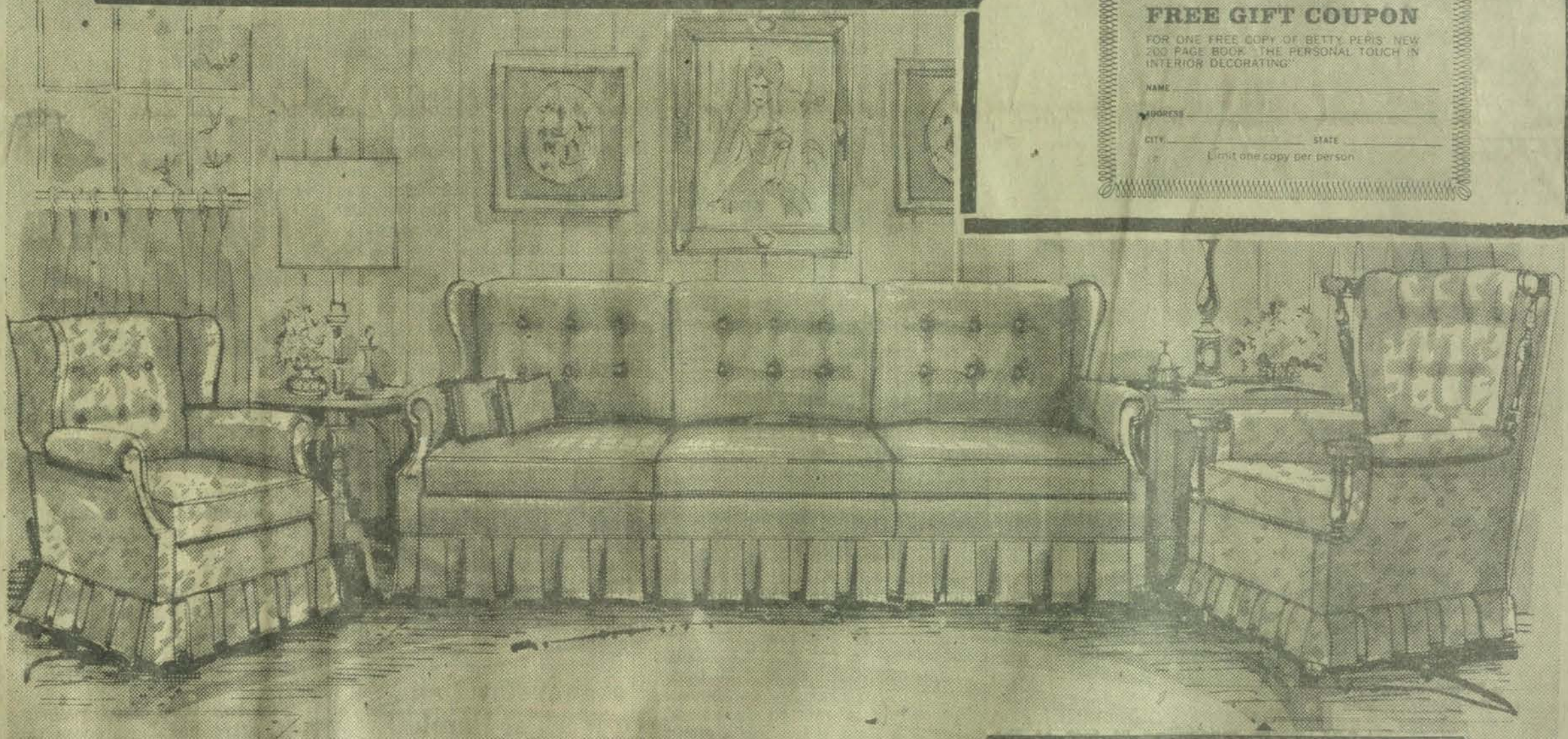

HOOVER WARNS AGAINST COMMUNISM AT HOME

AMERICA TODAY IS ENGAGED in a deadly struggle for the survival of the free world. While our nation is fending off the strangling grip of international communism on foreign soil, attempts are being made at home to undermine and distort its actions.

Tremendous pressure and criticism are being leveled against the President and the Congress to confuse and mislead the American public. Irresponsible charges of "invaders," "brutal aggression," and "sneak attacks" are used to discredit our government in hopes it will be forced to abandon its role as defender of freedom. Some of this protest comes from legitimate peace groups and others who are opposed to the course of action being followed in Viet Nam and the Dominican Republic. However,

much of the agitation is part of a diabolical scheme contrived by the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), an integral arm of the international communist conspiracy, the materialistic, godless ideology dedicated to ruling the world.

The CPUSA and other communist groups are seizing this opportunity to advance their cause by false statements and half truths. Particularly, the Party is seeking to influence the youth of our country through the communist-controlled W. E. B. DuBois Clubs and similar organizations.

THE RIGHT WORD

In our highly complex world, it is almost unbelievable how seemingly small things can make such a big difference. A speck of dust or a spider's web can render an expensive electronic device useless. Just as phenomenal is the tiny particle of sand which irritates an oyster but results in a pearl.

This is also true in the world of words. While rambling through my unabridged dictionary, I discovered one of many examples of the big difference one letter makes.

An iconoclast is the breaker or destroyer of icons, images used in religion. Literally it refers to actual statues or other such devices to give expression to religious concepts but figuratively it can apply to the reputation or "image" of people.

Changing one letter, iconoclast becomes iconoplast, a maker of images. A little change makes the direct opposite meaning.

Some people delight in destroying the image of another but often it is done so subtly that the damage may not be readily realized. By implication, insinuation and innuendo the image can be shattered. On the other side, positive, honest and sincere statements can make the image.

It's nice to compliment. Just be sure the compliment doesn't end with "but..."

Leaflets 3—Let It Be

As Spring turns to Summer, the warm sunshine stimulates plants to grow and man to venture out into gardens, fields and forest where he may enjoy the bounty of nature's foliage. Among the many plants that he may enjoy, however, there are some that are best avoided—particularly the aptly named poison ivy.

This widespread plant, with its distinctive group of three leaflets, may grow as a low trailing shrub or as a climbing vine. It may be found in the fields, along fence rows, in the woods and even on sides of buildings. When we brush against this plant the amount of the irritant transferred to the skin can produce severe itching, inflammation and blistering. The first symptoms may develop in a few hours or several days.

One who has touched poison ivy should, as soon as possible, wash the exposed skin freely with water and laundry soap—not the synthetic detergent type—lathering abundantly. Then rinse with plenty of water. If the inflammation and itching are troublesome, consult a physician. Proper treatment can relieve itching and head off infections that can result from scratching.

Poisoning by this toxic plant can be prevented by learning to recognize it, by wearing protective clothing and by destroying and removing it. For more detailed information on poison ivy and other related plants, precautions against poisoning and instructions on eradication of these plants, one should send 15 cents to the Superintendent of Documents, U. 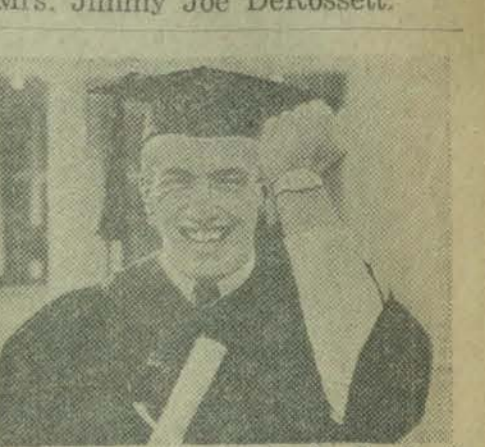

The project has put to work 44 unemployed fathers under the federal assistance and work-experience program for Eastern Kentucky. 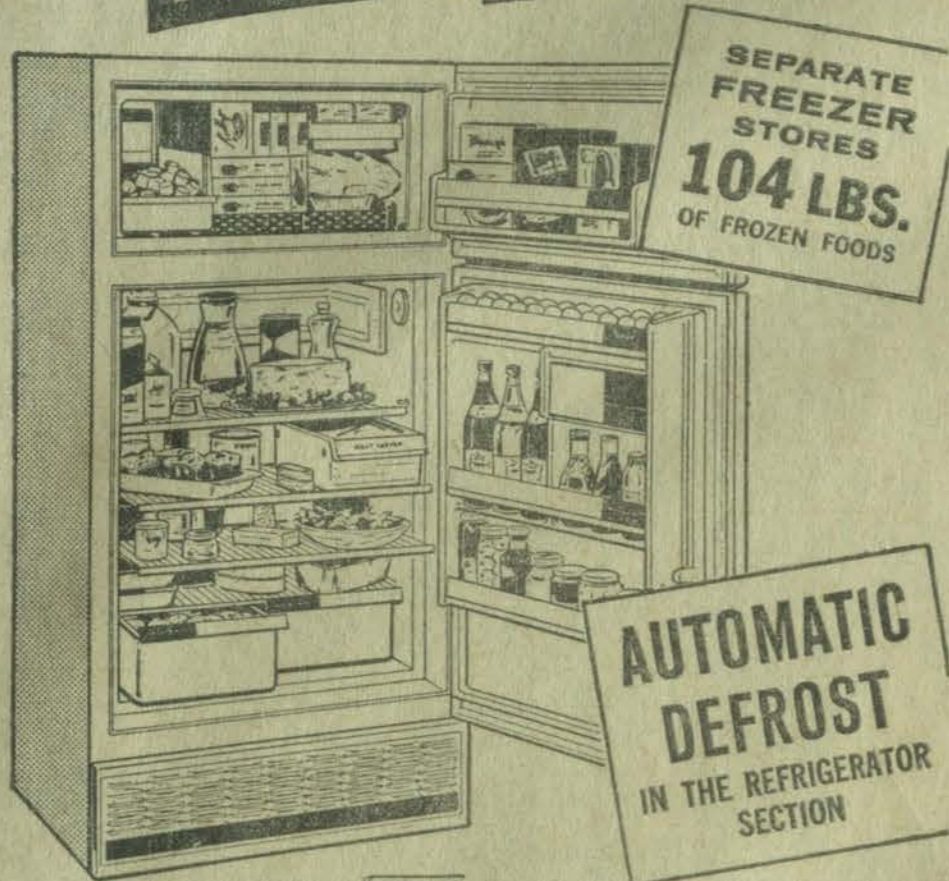

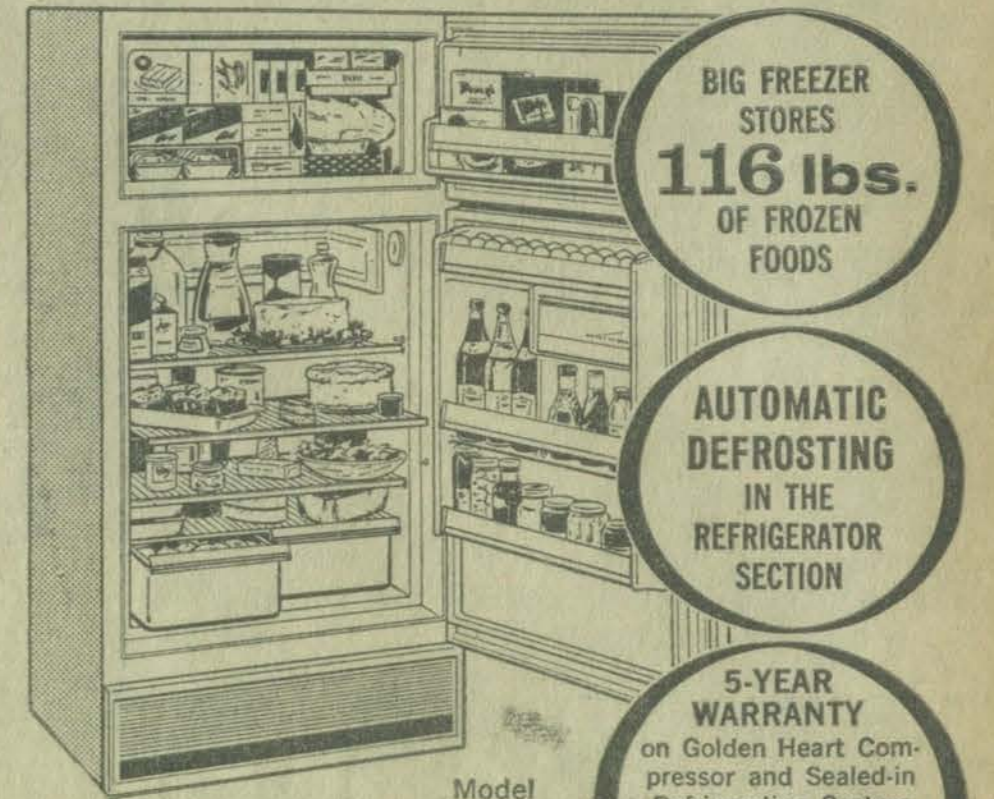

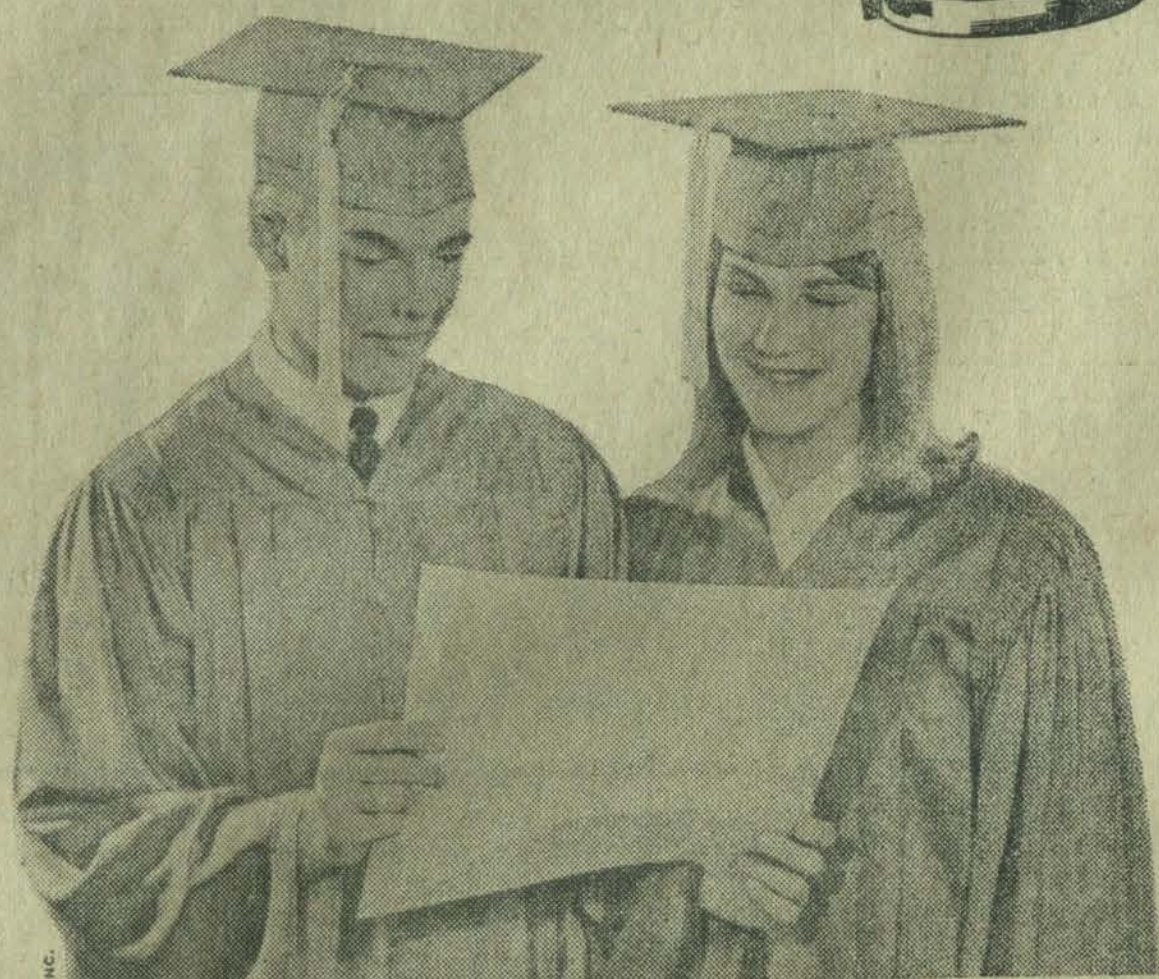

Lovern Takes Steps
To Prevent Accidents
On State's Highways

Frankfort, Ky.—With the Kentucky road death toll for 1965 climbing steadily closer to the all-time record rate of 1964, State Safety Commissioner Glenn Lovern has taken additional steps to increase traffic accident prevention activities in the Kentucky Department of Public Safety.

"Ours is a continuing and never-ending battle against traffic accidents," Lovern said. "But we feel that the alarming rate of increase within the past 30 months calls for special action."

"Special safety steps have already been taken through the increased use of radar and roadblocks by the Kentucky State Police and through the development of the comprehensive 13-phase State Action Program for Highway Safety," the Commissioner added.

"We feel that the improved point system adopted last year by Governor Edward Breathitt will have lasting and very early effects on the accident rate."

Lovern announced a five-point co-operative program with the national Insurance Institute for Highway Safety.

He listed these five areas where direct assistance from the Insurance Institute is being made available:

1. The preparation and printing of a special reference manual for Kentucky traffic judges, to be financed by the institute.
 2. The conducting of a series of regional traffic court conferences.
 3. The retraining of all enforcement officers of the Kentucky State Police, with instruction by the Northwestern University Traffic Institute.
 4. The development of needed public education efforts aimed toward improving the quality of driving in the Commonwealth.
 5. Continuing technical staff assistance for the implementation of other portions of Kentucky's Safety Action Program.
- "The determination of traffic safety needs upon which the Institute's decisions were based," Lovern said, "was made at a series of meetings of Institute officials and representatives of the Governor's Co-ordinating Committee for Traffic Safety during which the state Action Program for Highway Safety was also developed."

Soil Conservation Notes
By GERALD HART

Complete information on the soils and land features in a 153,600 acre section of Northeast Kentucky has just been released. It is available to the public in a new federal document announced by Homer Taff, head of the Soil Conservation Service operations at Lexington.
Titled "A Soil Survey Report for Elliott County," the illustrated publication gives practical guidance in management for farmers, foresters, community planners, engineers, and developers.
Consisting of 55 pages in text and 36 air photo maps, the report climaxes many years of study. Soil Conservation Service scientists examined, tested and classified the entire surface of Elliott county to collect facts. The survey was made in cooperation with the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station. The Bureau of Public Roads assisted in making engineering interpretations of the soils.
In addition to the air photo maps that show in detail the kinds of soils of the county, there is a general soil map that shows a much broader pattern of the soils and landscapes.

1st Adhesive Stamp In West In 1842
New York, N. Y.—The City Dispatch Post of New York in 1842 issued the first adhesive postage stamps used anywhere in the Western Hemisphere. The earliest local mail-delivery service was D. O. Blood & Co. of Philadelphia, which used handstamped impressions at first; its first formal adhesives did not appear till 1843.

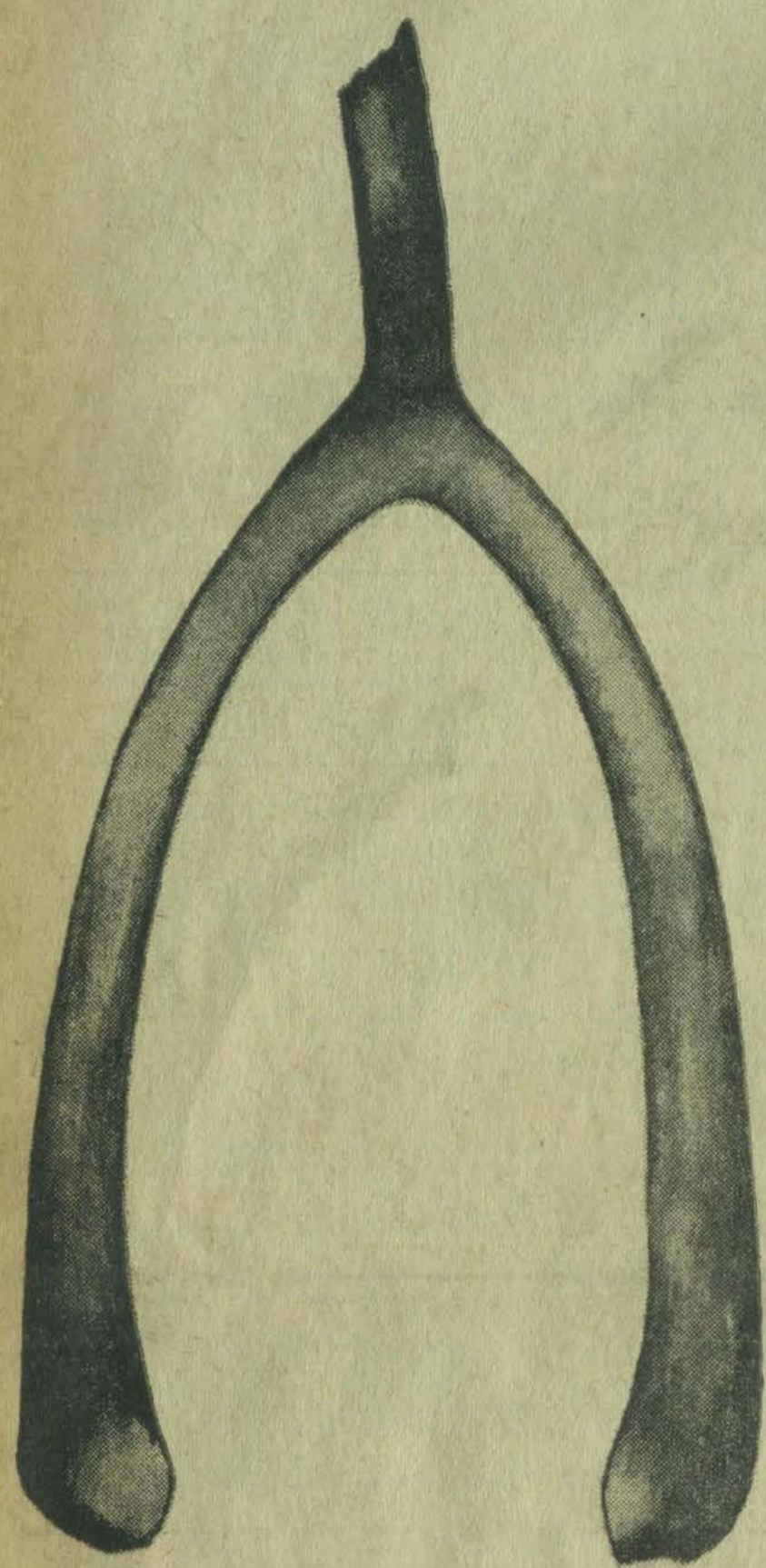
