SAFETY BILL

Opponents of Measure Say It Hits Smaller Coal Mine Operations

The House approved a measure Tuesday that would extend the federal Coal Mine Safety Act to small mines employing 14 or fewer workers. The vote was 335

The bill, sponsored by Rep. John H. Dent, D-Pa., would affect approximately 8,000 mines in Kentucky, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Virginia and Ohio that have been exempt from federal coal mining safety laws.

The measure now goes to the

Bureau of Mines inspectors now can inspect small mines and make safety recommendations, but they do not have authority to shut down operations if they consider the mine dangerous. them this authority.

The measure would enlarge the federal Coal Mine Safety Board from three to five members. Two selected from the small mine opwould be chosen as representatives of large mines. The fifth member would be a mining en-

The bill also would authorize \$500,000 in matching federal funds to carry out a mine safety education program in cooperation with the states.

Opponents charged the bill was written by the United Mine Workers and was designed to drive small mine operators out of business because most of their workers do not belong to a union.

Rep. Alphonzo Bell, R-Calif., said there was no assurance the measure would increase safety. He said it would add to the "economic burden of marginally profitable mine operators" because the May 25 primary almost made lead but his vote margin was of the cost of new safety equip-





Vote-Selling and Vote-Buying Could Be Stopped

WANTED—Men willing to charge a windmill! The recent election was in the matter of bribery Floyd county's worst-mainly because it was the most recent. All have been shameful examples of "dollar democracy" and perversion of men's rights.

The number of vote-sellers increases apace with the growth of population, and slush funds increase commensurately. Men to whom the compromise of another's individual rights as an American citizen is a revolting thing are forced, purely (such a word!) as a matter of self-defense, to spend money for the buying of votes. It stands to reason that no candidate wishes to spend money for votes. But all, or almost all, become involved in disgracing themselves and the people of their county because, over the years, the perverted notion of government has developed that these offices, basic units of this government of ours, are for sale to the highest bid-

The law has failed to cope with the situation, and there is no indication that it ever will unless courageous action is taken by citizens who have no score to settle and who are dedicated only to law and order in elections.

So it is that we call for men who are willing to do the work nobody yet has seriously undertaken; to charge the windmill, so to speak, since they will be referred to as quixotic dreamers, impractical idealists and a variety of other descriptive terms.

The hope for this and other counties plagued by election bribery lies, we believe, in a ticket composed of men and (or) women who are willing to seek office under a firm and solemn pledge not to spend money, in any way, for the purchase of votes or for the purchase of influence, not even for the employing of persons to hand out cards or campaign literature—in brief, to restrict their expenses altogether to legitimate advertising, and that to be done well in advance of election day.

And, spending no money themselves for votes, these quixotic dreamers would be pledged to work in every legitimate way to uncover evidence of votebuying, information which they would transmit, without fear or favor, to the next grand jury in the hope of procuring indictments and subsequent prosecution.

Such a ticket of candidates would not win the first election, might not win even a second or a third, but they would eventually win. Moreover, they would by their example and by legal action destroy that misbegotten notion that vote-buying is safe, sensible and the thing to do.

To Prevent Accidents On State's Highways

Frankfort, Ky.—With the Kentucky road death toll for 1965 climbing steadily closer to the all-time record rate of 1964, State Safety Commissioner Glenn Lovern has taken additional steps to increase traffic accident prevention activities in the Kentuc-

ky Department of Public Safety.

"Ours is a continuing and never-ending battle against traffic accidents," Lovern said. "But we feel that the alarming rate of increase within the past 30 months calls for special action."

"Special safety steps have already been taken through the increased use of radar and road-blocks by the Kentucky State Police and through the development of the comprehensive 43-phase State Action Program for Highway Safety," the Commissioner added.

"We feel that the improved point system adopted last year by Governor Edward Breathitt will have lasting and very early effects on the accident rate."

Lovern announced a five-point co-operative program with the national Insurance Institute for Highway Safety.

He listed these five areas

He listed these five areas where direct assistance from the Insurance Institute is being made available:

1. The preparation and printing

of a special reference manual for Kentucky traffic judges, to be financed by the institute.

2. The conducting of a series of regional traffic court conferences.

regional traffic court conferences.

3. The retraining of all enforcement officers of the Kentucky State Police, with instruction by the Northwestern University Traffic Institute.

4. The development of needed public education efforts aimed toward improving the quality of driving in the Commonwealth.

5. Continuing technical staff assistance for the implementation of other portions of Kentucky's Safety Action Program.

"The determination of traffic safety needs upon which the Institute's decisions were based," Lovern said, "was made at a series of meetings of Institute officials and representatives of the Governor's Co-ordinating Committee for Traffic Safety during which the state Action Program for Highway Safety was also developed."






