Since the publication of this article by Mr. Sturgill I have contacted representatives of the Housing and Home Finance Agency and I am advised by them that an additional \$2,500.00 for services rendered has been approved, making a total of \$6,000.00.

It has also come to my attention that some of the items which Mr. Sturgill listed as services rendered in the original statement for \$3,500.00 and for which he has received payment were performed, not by him, but by Mr. Franklin P. Hayes, an attorney of Louisville; that this is a matter of public record and may be confirmed by inspection of records in the Floyd County Court Clerks office. Furthermore, Mr. Hayes was paid for these same services by Charles A. Hinsch & Co., Fiscal Agents.

The Floyd County Courthouse Corporation is a non-stock and non-profit holding company. Its officers consist of Mr. B. F. Reed, Mr. H. D. Fitzpatrick, and the undersigned. We did not hire Mr. Sturgill to perform any services, legal or otherwise, in connection with the courthouse.

Trees are not only needed to furnish food for wild life, and lumber for building purposesin these days, they are needed more than ever to purify the air and cleanse it from the foul poisons being spewed into i every moment of the day by mod ern machines, by autos and factories. If all the trees were to disappear suddenly, human be ings could not long survive, be cause the air would become so foul with poisonous gases every breathing thing would be suffocated. Trees take in the carbon dioxide from the air, use the carbon for building carbohydrates., and put the oxygen back into the air, to purify it and make it fit for breathing

"I would put out ten trees for every automobile," says Dr. Leake, lecturer at the University Medical School, California, "and I would plant 100 trees for every truck, and 100,000 trees for every

All these modern machines are constantly spewing poisonous gases into the atmosphere, and without trees to help keep it pure, the air becomes foul and poisonous, and some believe these poisons may be one cause of lung cancer.

'A thousand trees on the hills is better than a thousand bucks in the bank," says Frank D. Steiner, a civil engineer of California. "And wealthy men could gain immortality by building a great forest shrine to perpetuate their name and memory."

#### THE COW BIRDS

There is always a cause for everything in nature, and if we seek diligently we can usually find it. Take the female cowbirds now. These are called "lazy parasites," because they build no nests of their own, but steal to the nests of birds like vireos, sparrows and warblers and lay their own eggs in these nests. The victimized birds rear the cowbirds and

let their own young starve. We have to look back into the history of the cowbird's biological development to find out why the bird builds no nest but lays her eggs in the nests of other industrious birds. Back in the days of pioneer America, there were multiplied millions of buffalos on the plains, and there were also multiplied millions of cowbirds. These birds kept constantly with the vast buffalo herds, living with them, protecting them against pests such as flies and lice; in turn for these "valet services" of the cowbirds. the buffalo flushed insects out of the grass for the cowbirds to eat. The cowbirds always had to be ready on a moment's notice to

fly away with the vast herds

when they suddenly went tearing across the plains at the speed






