He is now in the United States on a fund-raising tour for his hospital, which has a \$224,000-a-year budget. His staff of about 100 persons includes 14 doctors, some of whom are refugees, and top pay is \$500 a month.

Once It Develops, Rabies 100% Fatal, Health Dept. Warns

Rabies, or hydrophobia, is an acute infectious disease which is 100 percent fatal for both man and beast. It is caused by a virus which attacks the brain

Man and warm-blooded animals are susceptible to it as it is spread to man and healthy animals through a break in the skin, most frequently by the bite of a dog, but it may occur from the bite or scratch of a cat, or from exposing the broken skin to the saliva of any rabid animal - for example, a squirrel, fox, raccoon, opossum or bat.

Rabies may be present in the saliya from eight to ten days be-fore the symptoms of the disease appear. So it is well to be suspicious of any animal bite, even Half-Runner though the animal may appear to be healthy.

It takes, on an average, two to six weeks after a bite for rabies to develop but it may de velop in less than 10 days or not for several months. Since the virus reaches the brain via the nerves, the closer the wound is to the brain, the more quickly

the symptoms of rabies appear Even after the virus has entered the body, rabies can usually be prevented with the Pasteur treatment, a series of injections with anti-rabies vaccine. In all cases of animal bites, wash the wound thoroughly with running water and soap to remove the animal's saliva. Then go to a physician at once to have the Castleberry's wound more thoroughly cleaned out and other needed treatment

> This should be followed by the Pasteur treatment if the biting animal is found to be rabid, or if it cannot be caught and observed, or if the bite is on the head, neck or hands.

No effort should be spared to catch the offending animal. Call the Health Department or the Police Department at once for help in catching it. The animal should not be killed. Killing may make it impossible to determine if the animal is rabid and whether the Pasteur treatment is necessary. If, after fourteen days, the animal is still alive, one can be sure it did not have rabies and the Pasteur treatment may be unnecessary.

A dog afflicted with rabies may merely appear sick or may be unnaturally restless or excited. It may hide and refuse food. As the disease progresses, it becomes vicious, snarls and growls, and bites any person in its way. Any change in the bark or the behavior of an ordinarily friendly dog may be a warning of rables. Some of the measures which are helpful in controlling rabies

are as follows: 1. Rid the community of all stray dogs and require the anowners. During an outbreak it may be necessary to restrict all dogs to leashes or paddocks. Some communities require muzzling or leashing routinely

2. Dog-owners are urged to have their dogs or cats vaccinated: this gives them a temporary protection against rabies. 3. Dogs that are known to have been bitten by a rabid animal should be given the Pasteur treatment and confined for six months or else destroyed. The best plan is to call your local Health Department.

4. Extreme care should be used in handling a sick dog. The safest procedure is to isolate the animal and have it examined by a veterinarian.

5. All cases of rabies, or suspected cases, should be reported,

## We Think the Death Penalty Should Be Abolished

THE FLOYD COUNTY TIMES agrees with Governor Breathitt that the death penalty should be abolished in Kentucky.

But we go one step farther than the Governor in insisting that the law should be revised so that the death penalty could be supplanted by a life term—that is to say, a term which means what it says, the entire life of the convict, without any possibility of parole or pardon.

We think such a change in the law would more fully serve the cause of justice than the present criminal statutory provisions in at least two ways:

First of all, it would protect society from wanton, bestial killers, and punish them over the years; next, and equally important to justice, it would eliminate a law which too often takes the life of the man without money, friends and influence, while failing in the cases of those who have the means and influence with which to protect them-

We question the purpose of the death penalty, as now imposed and executed. Is it for revenge-"an eye for an eye"—or is it to serve as an example and thus as a deterrent to crime?

If the criminal's life is claimed to exact revenge, then the society that kills him is a killer, as bestial

If the execution at the hands of the state is to show to other criminals, present or potential, the awful consequences that may come upon them if they, too, commit murder, does the present method suffice?

Why, for instance, take the criminal to a place far distant from the scene of his crime, there take him into a small chamber and in the presence of only a few witnesses take his life—then leave the facts of the execution to a few, matter-of-fact paragraphs in the newspapers?

If the death penalty is to be exacted, not out of cold revenge but to serve as a warning by example, why not have the execution done at home, in the open where all may see death by law in action? And why restrict the mode of execution to the Chair? The guillotine would, we imagine, be

no less merciful. Some opponents of the Governor's stand for an end to capital punishment object that the criminal element already is being "coddled too much." We agree. But we also contend that the law and those enjoined with its enforcement do not have to break a man's neck to keep from coddling him.

Long years of prison confinement and work, a lifetime in which to ponder his sins, if any conscience is left, will punish the criminal as effectively and protect society as adequately as the awful few seconds that now satisfy the law's demands by taking the life of the one who took life.

#### GAMBOLING . . .

(An editorial in The Kentucky Labor News)

What a state of confusion is Kentucky

Pin ball machines are illegal. They are GAMBLING! "They encourage the weak-willed to dissipate their lunch money or their pensions." "They fill no sociological, psychological, aesthetic or moral need. Horse race gambling is legal. It evidently fills such needs.

And, apparently, race horse fans NEVER use rent, food and clothing money for a turn at the track! DOG RACES ARE ILLEGAL. Kentucky law allows dog

races to be ENJOINED as a public nuisance! Dogs may ruin your shrubs, or foul your yard, but they cannot race. Not in Kentucky. They would be a nuisance if they raced

It is illegal to bet on boxing matches in Kentucky. It is illegal to sell lottery tickets. One cannot pitch coins at a crack in the sidewalk if it is "for keeps." One must not gamble "in any room, building, float, vessel or premises" in Kentucky except on HORSES in races licensed by the State Racing Commission. (There is some question about gambling in a lighterthan-air balloon or in a helicopter, but our courts would probably consider such high handedness as illegal, being OVER "premises" outlawed below!)

Except for horse racing, there is only one type of other legalized gambling allowed here. That is insurance. You "bet" that your house will burn and the insurance company "bets" that it will not. You "bet" that you will have an auto accident, and the insurance company "bets" that you will not. The "odds" are changed from time to time, according to risk experience. The KENTUCKY LABOR NEWS is the voice of the AFL-

CIO in Kentucky. We have no policy for or against horse racing, pin ball machines, or cock fighting. Except to flip a coin occasionally in the selection of an arbiter in a labor-management dispute, or to "gamble" as a pedestrian in crossing Broadway during rush hours, problems relating to wagers have been secondary to the problems of wages . .







# Our Historic Heritage

A Pictorial Review of East Kentucky

(No. 329 in a Series)



Henry C. Hale, son of George and Kate Hale, of Goodloe, Ky., is perhaps typical of those patriotic sons of the country who served so well in World War I. Educated in the local schools and at Eastern Kentucky Normal College, headed by Prof. Walter M. Byington, he taught school a few years before his country called.

Hale, born in 1897, married Thelma McShirley. Brothers and sisters were the late Jim Hale, of Blue River, Ellis Hale, Waverly, O., Mrs. Lula Montgomery, West Prestonsburg, Mrs. Maude Bailey, Warsaw, Ind., Mrs. Myrtle Helton, Mrs. Darcus Stephens and B. B. (Bud) Hale.

Following service in World War I, Hale was employed by a railway company and died in 1960 at Veterans Administration hospital, Kecoughton, Va. He lies buried at Montgomery, W. Va.

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was a big female green darner, ANAX JUNIUS. It is certain there was no sign of parental care here. Nor was any needed. She just laid her eggs in the water and went on about her The eggs will simply hatch out in the brook and produce ferocious-looking nymphs. These nymphs need no parental care as they can fend for themselves. They look like small masked monsters, with their long lower lip covering the face like the mask of a bandit. When not used as a mask, the long lip is used as a formidable weapon for darting out to snare the hapless vic-

Another remarkable feature of these dragonfly nymphs is their power to shoot through the water by jet propulsion. They often spend two years or more in fresh water, during which period they moult a dozen times or more. They dine on any small water creatures they can capture, such as mosquito wrigglers. In turn they are often devoured by fish, ducks, herons and other water wading birds.

After its life in the water is over, this ungainly nymph suddenly seems to decide to change the habitat and the restricted mode of living. It leaves the water, crawls out on some plant or weed stem, splits its skin and comes out a gorgeous, streamlined insect with two pairs of gauzy wings, a slender body like a darning needle-"devils darning needles" they are called and a large head with such remarkable, compound eyes. It is amazing to know that each of the big eyes has more than 30,-000 lens, or small eyes, enabling the dragonfly to spot its prey from all sides-up, down, forward and back. These adult dragonflies have something else besides beauty, symmetry and speed; they have a voracious appetite that is never satisfied. When insect eating is good, with plenty of insects to catch, the big dragonfly often eats so many that his jaws get all clogged up and he has to stop for a breath ing spell. quito hawks," as they soon clean up the flies and mosquitoes around the water. Their speed has been clocked at 60 miles per hour. Their legs are too small and weak for walking but they form a dinner basket trap for holding the insect while it is being devoured.

After these dragonflies have cleaned out all the insects around the water, they will go out everywhere in search of food; they will even capture and devour

When the dragonflies alight, they hold their wings spread out. Their relatives, the damselflies, of the same order, ODONATA, fold their wings together when they alight. Down south, the dragonflies are called "snake feeders," a name given them because they are often seen hovering near the head of a huge water snake. But their purpose in doing so is to catch the flies that swarm around the head of the snake.

The adult dragonfly is one of our most beautiful and useful, as well as interesting, insects. Dragonflies enliven a pond on a summer's day as they flash and dart in pursuit of insects, often with a speed the human eye can-

The big green darners do not seem to be too fearful of humans. I have often had them to light on my shirt sleeve, as if in a show of friendliness.

An old superstition down south goes to say these devil's darners will sew up the ears of a truant schoolboy if they catch him hiding out from school.



Mouth-to-mouth rescue breathing should be started immediately, wherever the patient isin the water as he is brought in or on the bank where he lies after an accident, overdose of drugs, or choking, or after he is quickly brought out of gas-filled areas. "Anyone can learn-you, your friends, and every member of your family, the children, too, added Dr. Hall.

After placing the victim on his back, clear his mouth and throat of anything which might block breathing, tilt his head back, move his jaw forward, and pinch the nostrils closed. Then take a deep breath, blow hard enough and long enough into the victim's mouth to see his chest rise

before stopping. peated 12 to 20 times a minute and continued until the victim is breathing for himself. If the victim is a small child, blow into the mouth less forcefully. "Learn this lifesaving method and you will always be prepared in case of an emergency," said the

health officer. For groups interested in rescue breathing, there are two films available from the Floyd County Health Department - "Rescue Breathing" and "Breath of Life" and a pamphlet describing step-by-step procedures for rescue breathing. Classes to learn this lifesaving technique can be arranged by contacting the county health department. 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
