Two Rum True Bills For Second Offense; 2 Women Reindicted

The grand jury in its final report to Circuit Judge Hollie Conley upon adjournment Friday recommended that law enforcement officers request state Alcoholic Beverage Control personnel to make an effort to buy intoxicating beverages from bootleggers and thus establish a basis for search of bootlegging premises as a curb of the whiskey traffic in the county.

The recommendation followed instructions given earlier by Judge Conley in which he pointed out that bootlegging again is in-

The jury returned in its four days of work only 29 indictments, which is believed to be the lowest voted by a grand jury here in the last 35 years.

The report, signed by Graham Burchett, foreman, said the jury had examined the records of the Circuit Court Clerk and that this examination showed that all officials have complied with the law in regard to the reporting of fines and forfeitures.

in the report:

1. That the window sills in the jail be cleaned; 2. that there should be more ventilation in the jail; 3. that the open stairway at the front entrance of the courtroom should be enclosed; 4. that a directory of all offices should be placed in the hallway at the front entrance to the courthouse.

He had received unsatisfactory bids. the best being about \$700 for the "cutting rights." After a selective marking by a forester, the tract brought \$2,400 at auction.

A recent letter to Gene Butcher, state director of forestry, is typical of the reaction to the work done by service foresters. Complimenting a forester for his marking of timber in Butler county, the landowner told

Butcher: "The report prepared (by the forester) . . . is excellent along with the forms to be used for sale advertising and cutting contracts. It is a pleasure to see this type of work prepared and the fine

manner it was assembled. "I am sure that the continuation of such quality work will enhance the income from timberland and insure a forward place for Kentucky in the proper management, use and marketing of our forest products."

Technically-trained for esters have been providing assistance to private woodland owners since 1937. At the time, a congressional act created the Cooperative Farm Forestry Program, designed mostly to assist farmers. In 1950, the CFM Program was born, continuing the old setup but stressing service to all woodland own-

From the beginning of the expanded program, the woodland owner has been expected to cooperate with the forester by accompanying him in the work, expressing an interest in good forestry, and showing his intent to follow proper recommendations. In return, the landowner could

expect free service for woodland examinations, tree planting assistance, and guidance in all phases of forest management. He gets timber marked for a nominal charge — 40 cents per 1,000 board feet. Proceeds are used to provide for marking paint and other expenses. Throughout the years, Butcher

says, a major problem has been manpower limitations resulting from well-defined budgets. Requests from woodland owners have piled up in one local area. while in another the work might be almost at a standstill. Transferring manpower, making temporary assignments, and other methods of rendering service in the peak load areas were constant problems.

Now, many of these headaches have been eased by service foresters working directly out of the district offices. They are able to travel together in many instances, thus giving more service to a particular area. Travel time is held to a minimum because the foresters spend one or more nights, as may be necessary, in the area where the work is in progress.




