## FLOYD MEN IN OHIO FOR FUNERAL KILLED

### CAR BEARING MOORES, DYE HIT BY TRAIN

Tragedy at Wilmington Follows Sword Death By Accidental Shot

Three former Floyd countians who had gone to Wilmington, O. to attend the funeral of a relative who had been accidentally shot and killed were themselves killed Tuesday when their auto was hit by a train at a crossing near Wilmington.

Occupants of the car were Johnny Moore, 25, Howell, Ind., Lowell Moore, 22, Sturgis, Mich., and Kenneth Dye, 33, Wilmington, Ohio.

Their relative, Johnny Sword, also a former Floyd man, was killed Monday morning when a gun was accidentally discharged as he was reportedly preparing to shoot a dog. Sword was an uncle of Kenneth Dye and a cousin of the Moores.

Lorain county authorities quoted witnesses as saying the auto occupied by the three men had stopped at the crossing, then for some unknown reason suddenly moved onto the tracks as the train bore down on it. It is not known which of the three men was the driver of the car.

Rev. Horne was born at Auxier, a son of James Y. and Ester Hopson Horne. His wife, Mrs. Minta Wireman Horne, preceded him in death in 1958.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Evelyn Music, Summerfield, Florida, and a brother, James L. Horne, of Auxier.

Funeral services will be conducted Sunday at 2 p.m. from the Auxier Free Will Baptist Church, the Revs. Dewey Fraley and James Sturgill officiating. Burial will be in the Ford Gap cemetery at Auxier under the direction of Carter & Callihan Funeral Home.

## UNION MINES REMAIN IDLE

### New Contract Demand Emphasized by Layoff; Three Companies Sign

Every union-organized coal mine in District 30 was idle Monday, presumably to emphasize the United Mine Workers' demand for a new contract.

The old wage agreement expired April 1. Monday's layoff had no connection, it was said, with the work-stoppage in effect at the same time at mines of the Terry Elkhorn Mining Company, in the Prestonsburg-Auxier area, and at the Peabody and coal processing plant at Auxier of the Mahan Coal Company.

The first breakthrough toward a new contract came last week when a new two-and-a-half-year agreement was signed by the Peabody Coal Company, the Ayrshire Collieries Corp. and Southwestern Illinois Coal Corporation.

W. A. (Tony) Boyle, United Mine Workers president, said he hoped the agreement would also be signed by the Bituminous Coal Operators Association and the Southern Coal Producers Association. He read a letter from BCOA President Edward G. Fox offering to meet at any time "in good faith effort" to effect a new agreement.

Peabody Chairman Merl C. Kelce, who signed the contract at a news conference at UMWA headquarters, said he considered it "fair to Peabody's employees and acceptable to the company."

Principal provisions of the new contract, effective April 1, 1966, to September 30, 1968, according to the UMWA announcement, are:

- 1. A wage increase of \$1.32 a day effective April 1, 1966, for continuous mining machine operators, inside electricians and mechanics. A \$1 a day across-the-board increase for all day-

## CLUB ENTERS GUILTY PLEA

### VFW Draws \$100 Fine, Closes Its Club Here; Raid Made on Abner

The VFW Club here entered a plea of guilty to a liquor charge here Monday for the second time in a matter of weeks and was fined \$100.

Mrs. Jean Halfhill, employee of the club, was not brought to trial after it was determined that the search warrant was faulty. In a lengthy discussion of the case it was argued that to prosecute the club for selling the search warrant should have shown the date and time of sale and the name of the club's agent.

Judge Stumbo commented that if the search warrant was faulty, the case should be dismissed, but the club entered its plea of guilty. He directed that County Attorney Barkley J. Sturgill issue an order closing the place.

## WORK-STUDY AID IS CITED

### Students at College Here Benefit in Year By Total of \$60,986

Prestonsburg Community College students received in the first full year of the work-study program a total of \$60,986.44.

The program, which is designed to permit students to earn a part of their college expenses, was initiated March 15, last year. The first pay period at the end of that month paid 18 students \$475.50.

The figures for the year included the pay period of Feb. 28, this year, when 81 students were benefitting from the program. Of the \$60,986 total, \$3,931.50 was paid to Morgan county students who were transported by bus to the college. This amount, a college official said, is more than sufficient to pay the cost of their attending the college here.

It is expected that by the end of the academic year in June \$15,000 will have been added to the total paid through February.

Next year, the college expects its work-study budget to rise to \$115,000 for the fiscal year.

"We feel," commented a college spokesman, "that this program through the University of Kentucky and through the Community Colleges office has been a great boon to hundreds of students in our community college area. It has enabled them to receive an education that they might otherwise have been denied."

### INFANT DIES

## 2,000 ILL OF 'FLU' IN COUNTY, ESTIMATE

Dr. Russell L. Hall, county health doctor, estimated this week that 2,000 or more residents of the county are now experiencing the aches, pain and fever of influenza and that as many, or more, will contract the disease within the next week.

Prevalence of flu has been so widespread that businesses have suffered, some working with makeshift personnel as many regular employees have been confined to their homes or hospitalized.

Severity of the disease indicates that it is the same type of influenza that produced the lethal epidemic of 1918-19, Dr. Hall said. He added that proper precautions and home care should be emphasized rather than rushing to a doctor or hospital. He made these suggestions to avoid flu:

### Student Council Says Festival Creates Need For Rooming Facilities

Larry Stanley, faculty adviser to the Council, estimates that housing for at least 100 students will be needed.

The students involved will be from Ashland Community College, Southeast Community College, Alice Lloyd College, Williamson Branch of Marshall University, and Logan Branch of Marshall University.

## NEEDS, HELPS CITED AT HOUSING MEETING

Sixty-five per cent of the homes in the Big Sandy area are sub-standard.

Of 44,290 homes in the area, 27,400 are sub-standard, without adequate water, adequate heating or without a bathroom.

Eighty per cent of the homes in the Big Sandy section are 16 years old or older, and 40% were built before 1940.

These statements were made by Fred Arrington, president of the Big Sandy Area Development Association, and Mrs. Frances Pitts, Floyd county home demonstration agent, in remarks opening the housing workshop held Monday at May Lodge, Jenny Wiley State Park.

The day was devoted to conferences which dealt specifically with ways to meet needs rather than with speeches telling of needs.

Congressman Carl D. Perkins was the principal speaker during the day-long program, which was followed by a brief night workshop at Prestonsburg Community College for those who could not attend the meeting at the lodge.

## HOUSING JOB LOSS FEARED

### Martin Council Action Asked within 30 Days, Is Report Heard Here

Failure of the City Council at Martin to appoint a Planning and Zoning Commission may cost that town a 20-unit housing complex for the benefit of the elderly in the low-income level, it was said here this week.

The housing installation, which would be located on hillside land overlooking the town and on a site already owned by the Urban Renewal Administration, would cost an estimated \$300,000.

Urban Renewal has notified the city that it will wait no longer than 30 days for the necessary action to be taken. Construction of the units, it was said, would also clear a \$16,000 debt held by Urban Renewal against the city.

If built, the complex would be the first of its kind in an Eastern Kentucky community. The 40-unit low-rent housing installation completed at Martin, a few months ago, was the largest to be built in the United States in a town of Martin's size.

The sewage treatment plant and sewer system, which has been a bone of contention at Martin, is expected to be put into operation shortly.

## WARD ORDERS PLANS FOR LANCER BRIDGE

### Miss Martin's Bond Forfeited, No Trials Set Till Next Week

The lone criminal trial scheduled for this week in circuit court failed to materialize Monday when the defendant, Catherine Martin, failed to make her appearance.

The \$2,000 bond of Miss Martin, who is charged with false-swearing in the trial of Troy Mullins and Marion Martin for the slaying of Ex-Magistrate John May, was forfeited by Special Judge Lowe, of Pikeville, and a bench warrant was issued.

The \$5,000 bond of Rush Fraley Shepherd was forfeited last week when he failed to appear at expiration of the 30 days given him to complete appeal from conviction on a charge of knowingly receiving stolen property.

The grand jury met two days last week, and was to conclude its work with two more days' work this week.

The petit jury will return Monday for a full schedule of work during remainder of the court term.

## CLEAN-UP SCHEDULED

### Thirty-Day Period Proclaimed for Work Throughout County

County Judge Henry Stumbo has by executive order declared the 30-day period from April 15 to May 15 as "Clean-Up Month" throughout the 499 square miles of Floyd county.

He asked the cooperation of the State Department of Highways, the Floyd County Health Department, Women's clubs, Chambers of Commerce, veterans' organizations, Kiwanis Clubs, private businesses and the general public in a common effort to rid the county of accumulations of debris, garbage and waste materials which detract from the natural beauty of the area and from its healthful atmosphere.

Judge Stumbo announced that the county will supply trucks and men to pick up refuse. He asked that all such matter be placed in substantial boxes, metal containers, sacks and other receptacles and to leave these at the edge of the street or at the roadside nearest the home or business from which it came. From such points county and state employees will haul the collected debris to the nearest public garbage dump.

The announced schedule of pick-up places and dates follows: April 18 and April 19—New U. S. 23 Highway, Auxier road, beginning at city limits, including city of Auxier, and to Johnson county line, Paint Creek road.

April 20-21—Old US 23, Abbott Mountain road to East Point, including Abbott Creek road, Cliff road, State Road Fork road, Magoffin county line; new Mountain Parkway to city limits of Prestonsburg.

## ROAD DESIGN IS INCLUDED WITH ORDER

### Lancer-to-Bull Creek Route Involved; Ask Bids on 3 Projects

Commissioner of Highways Henry Ward last week issued authorization for design of a bridge across the Big Sandy river at Lancer and of the Lancer-Water Gap road to connect with the proposed new US 23 on Bull Creek.

Cost of the study, which will cover a distance of 2.92 miles, was estimated at \$60,000. Mr. Ward indicated that Henry Spalding, Hazard engineer, will develop the plans and survey for the project.

Present plans would have the Lancer-Bull Creek highway an extension of KY 3. If this is done, with the Martin-to-Floyd county sector of KY 3 already approved for construction, the highway would extend all the way from Catlettsburg to Water Gap.

Completion of the preliminary study is set for September. "This would put us in a position to proceed to determine if we can't get at least the bridge, or all of this project, in position where we can be moving on it concurrently with the construction of the Appalachian program and other projects in the Prestonsburg area," Ward commented.

Ward also announced last week that bids on the following projects will be opened May 5 on three Floyd county projects:

Bituminous surfacing of 4.55 miles of the Branham's Creek road from a point 1.5 miles southeast of KY 979 to the Branham's Creek school, and .766 mile of the Bonanza-Lick Fork road from a point 2.7 miles northeast of KY 1427 to the Floyd-Johnson line.

Bituminous concrete surfacing of 5.793 miles of the Prestonsburg-Bonanza road from a point four miles west of KY 1428 to KY 114.

## PICKETING CONTINUES AT TWO MINE FIRMS

Picketing at the mining operations in the Prestonsburg-Auxier area of the Terry Elkhorn Mining Company and at the processing plant and tipple of the Mahan Coal Company at Auxier continued this week, and the situation from day to day was marked by varying degrees of tension.

When hauling of coal was resumed Monday rocks were thrown, a few windows or windshields of trucks were broken, and one truckdriver was cut by flying glass.

A truck driver whose name was listed as Frank Wright was arrested after he had allegedly produced a gun.

The courthouse was jammed for a time, Tuesday morning, when the cases of Joe Castle and Estill Newsome were slated for hearing by County Judge Henry Stumbo. The two were charged with blocking a private roadway to company operations on March 31. Their cases were dismissed, however, when C. E. Hovatter, the complaining witness, failed to appear in court. A restraining order limiting peaceful picketing to groups of not more than five has been issued.

Mr. Hovatter is president of Terry Elkhorn.

The picketing is admittedly an attempt to unionize the two firms.

A UMWA spokesman at Pikeville said Tuesday that the organizing effort being made in this vicinity is not necessarily the first step toward unionization of all small mines in the area. He added that a majority of Terry Elkhorn's employees have signed papers indicating their desire to work as union members.

Mr. Hovatter said that, if this were true, it is strange that the union has not made demands as a bargaining agent. He added that most of the men employed by him had told him that if his operations were unionized they would quit. He said they took this position because they are now earning about \$250 a month more than the union scale.

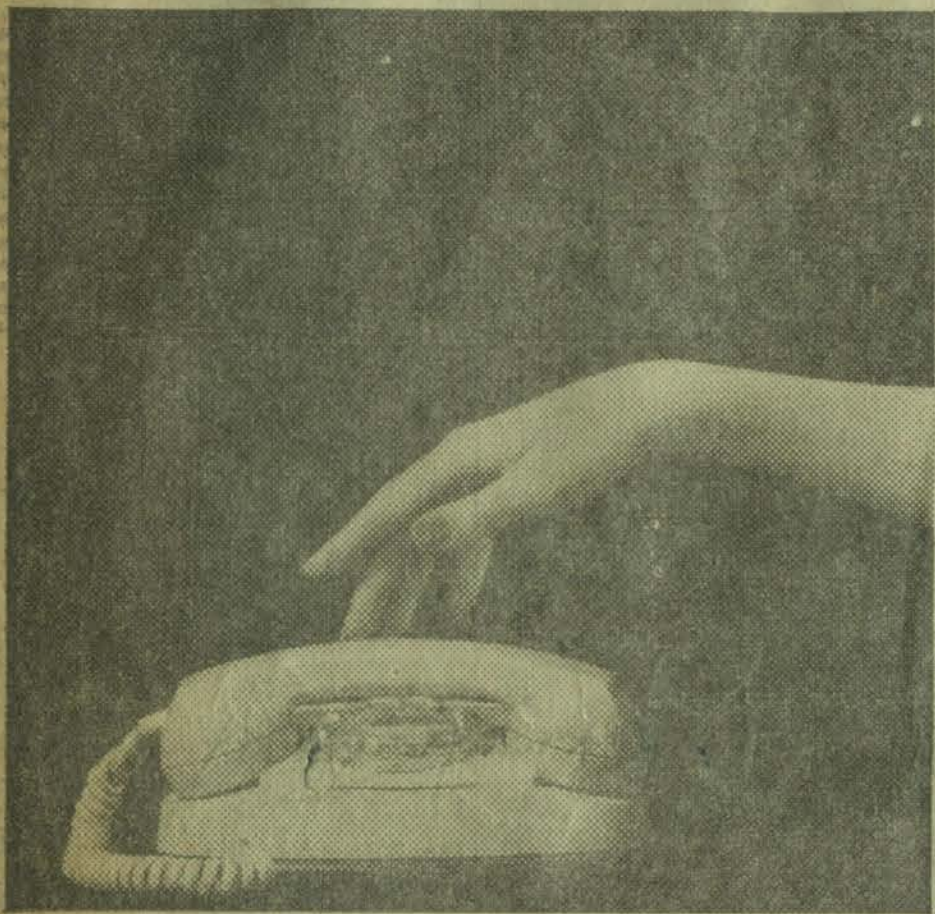

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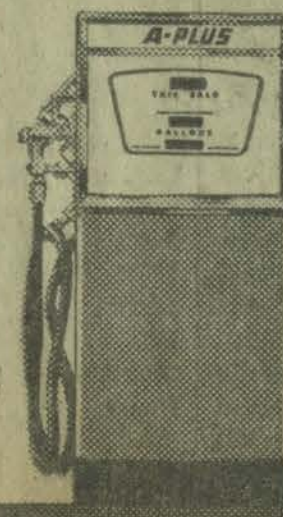

The proposed rate revision applies to all Workmen's Compensation insurance written in Kentucky except that on underground coal mines. The proposed changes call for an average increase of 5.6 percent in the overall level of rates presently in effect, Woodall said.

rate and monthly employees on April 1, 1967. UMWA said this made top-rated pay underground \$30 a day now and \$31 a year from now.

2. Eight paid holidays at straight time with triple pay for holidays worked, including Veteran's Day.

3. Vacation pay based on 10 times the mine worker's daily wage, instead of the present flat \$225.

4. Company-wide seniority for laid-off workers within the same UMWA district.

5. An increase in second and third shift differential pay from four and six cents an hour to eight and 10 cents an hour.

6. A guarantee of four hours pay to day-rate men once they enter the mine, whether the mine works the full four hours or not.

7. Mine safety committees will be paid "when they are investigating mine disasters or explosions." Employees will be paid for time spent on jury duty.

8. "Helpers" on mining machines, when not operating them, shall perform their other duties within the working place as directed, and shall be paid the rate for cutting and shearing machine operators. Hand loaders can be employed on a tonnage-rate basis.

9. UMWA will have jurisdiction over all hauling to such facilities as washing and preparation plants and jurisdiction over all repair, maintenance and construction work.

Vacation period this year will be June 25-July 9 or July 9-23. In 1967 and 1968, companies may schedule 14 consecutive days of vacation at any time "satisfactory to their employees." UMWA said this would allow mines to operate continuously, granting vacations to a few men at a time. The union said the contract also provides that no company shall require compulsory retirement based solely on age.

program for actual construction, (there is a low interest rate of 3 1/2% for a re-development area); a program of grants up to 50% of cost; open space and beautification programs.

Carl Kilburn, Industrial Arts Department, Berea College, told of the low-cost home built with federal monies by the Industrial Arts Department. Those interested in this house may write to Industrial Arts Department, Berea College, Berea, Kentucky.

Mrs. Gladys Lickert, extension specialist, U. K. Agricultural Experiment Station, Lexington, told of a house plan developed by the U. K. Extension Service. The house would cost about \$5,000 without land. The floor plan can be obtained at 25c per sheet by writing to the Agricultural Engineering Department, UK, Lexington. Ask for Plan 7128. This is a three-bedroom plan which emphasizes daytime living space and yet has provided for adequate storage for the family.

An important feature of the program was the talk by Jim Wyker, cooperative consultant, U. S. Cooperative League, Berea. Mr. Wyker had studied the housing situation in Nova Scotia, which was in such miserable condition that the people were turning to communism. The situation was bettered through a cooperative plan which enabled residents to obtain houses "cheaper by the dozen". Five per cent loans can be obtained by groups of families over a 30-year period. There would be a carpenter who would help the families build the houses under the cooperative plan. Mr. Wyker mentioned that he felt that this was the only type of new home certain families could afford. Groups of families interested should send to the Federal Housing Administration for Folder 221D3.

Congressman Perkins gave a review of the anti-poverty program. He pointed out that in the 23 counties of this congressional district there are now 11 with urban renewal projects. Fifteen other counties are developing public housing programs, and eight college housing loans have been given in the area.

Congressman Perkins emphasized the point that if this area does not take advantage of the grant legislation, big eastern cities will, "and we would be no better off than before." He also said he would like to see each community in Eastern Kentucky with low-rent public housing. He is particularly interested in seeing public housing for the elderly, and feels that this would be a great contribution to the area.

Three members of the Prestonsburg Community College faculty will leave Prestonsburg at the end of the present term, it was announced last week.

Walter Stepp, of the English department, will go east, this summer, and Robert Blackledge, instructor in chemistry, will attend an institute at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, under a fellowship grant for a year. He is expected to return to the college later. The third staff-member scheduled to leave is Rondall Lawson, bursar-recorder, who will do work toward his doctorate at Indiana University.

**PERKINS ASKS FINANCING FOR AREA CONSERVATION**

The federal co-chairman of the Appalachian Regional Commission was urged Wednesday by Congressman Carl Perkins to provide \$747,000 to fund water resource and soil conservation development projects for Eastern Kentucky's Appalachian counties out of the current fiscal year's appropriations.

Perkins said that the programs and projects to be funded will assist in the construction of sediment retention dams in the upper reaches of our smaller streams, the construction of ponds, diversion terraces, ditches, dikes and other devices to divert excess water runoff and in general to improve land use and encourage economic development.

Those provisions of the program which were designed to provide restored lands for pasture, forestry purposes, camping, picnicking, sports and recreation were stressed by Perkins as being of critical importance to Eastern Kentucky development.

The portion of the Appalachian Regional Development Act containing authority for initiating the projects was first a legislative proposal of Perkins' Appalachian Highlands Bill during the 87th Congress. The major purpose of the Perkins' Appalachian Highlands legislation and Sec. 203 of the Appalachian Redevelopment Act was to obtain:

1. Cropland improvement, including erosion control, pasture development and drainage;
2. Development of farm water supplies;
3. Private woodland improvements including tree planting, removal of noxious and undesirable species, and grazing protection;
4. Revegetation of strip mine spoils and similar sediment source areas;
5. Development of private recreation facilities, including water impoundments, wildlife, hunting, fishing, outdoor recreation, boating, etc.;
6. Stream bank improvement for erosion protection and fish and wildlife;
7. Reorganization and enlargement of operating units for livestock farming and woodland enterprises;
8. Further development of specialized crops;
9. Accelerate benefits in the region of other existing programs, such as the Small Watershed Program, the Rural Areas Development Program, Rural Electrification, and others, which would serve to build the resources of the region and provide badly needed economic expansion.

Perkins urged the federal co-chairman to approve projects and plans which would enable all

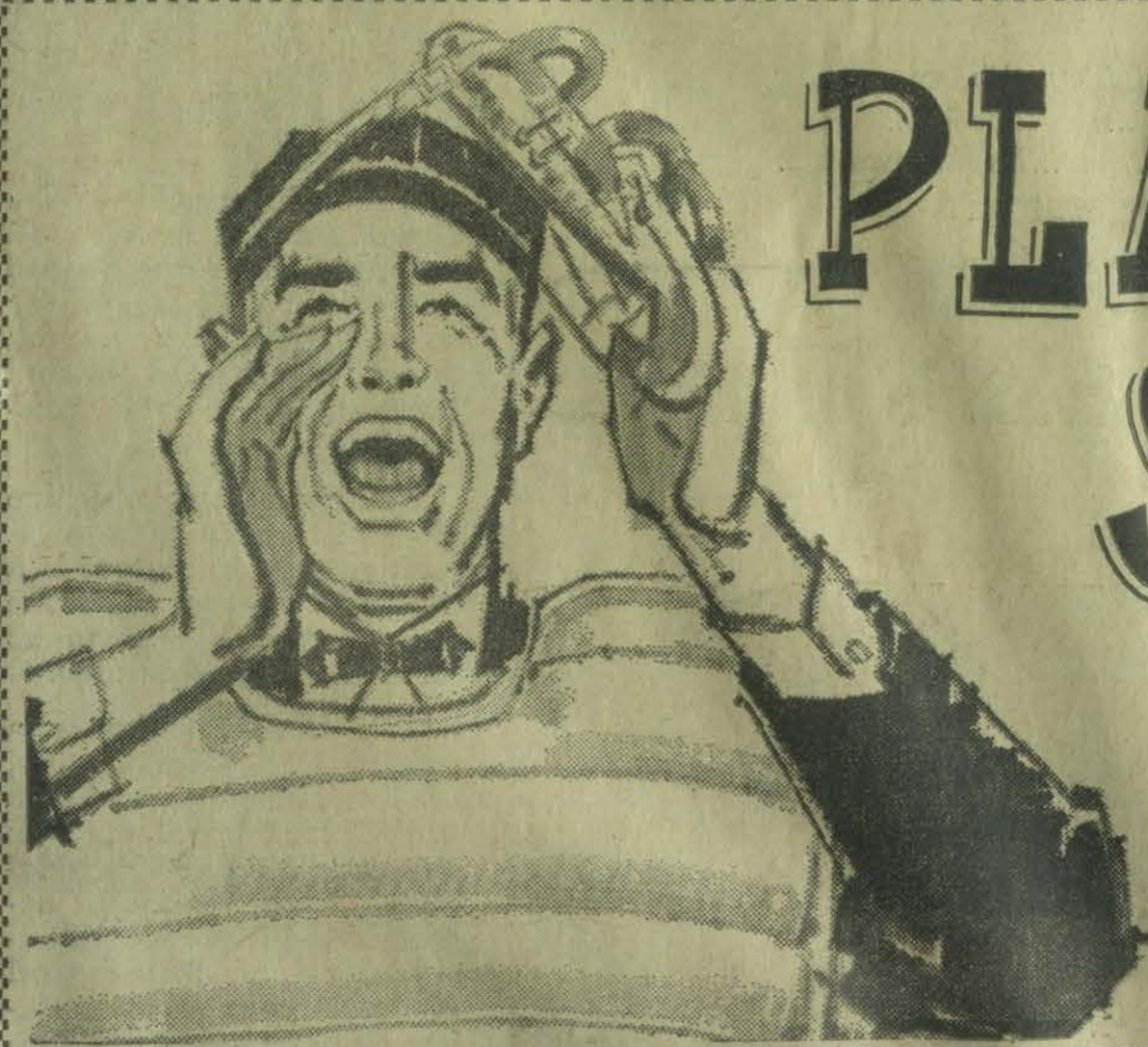

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**KENTUCKY HELD ELIGIBLE  
FOR RECREATION GRANTS**

Frankfort, Ky. — Kentucky has been declared eligible for matching federal grants to acquire and develop state and local outdoor recreation areas.

State Finance Commissioner Felix Joyner in announcing the grants, said that to qualify, a state is required to develop a statewide outdoor recreation plan and planning program and submit it to the Interior Department's Bureau of Outdoor Recreation. Kentucky's plan was found adequate for initial qualification for the 25-year program.

Joyner said Kentucky's share of the fund for fiscal years 1965 and 1966 is \$1,337,232. Kentucky's initial period of eligibility lasts until May 10, 1967, according to Joyner, who administers this cooperative federal-state program in Kentucky.

He said Kentucky's plan calls for initial emphasis on state park planning, acquisition and development. It also emphasizes a state program for protecting free-flowing rivers and scenic streams, and recommendations for scenic highways.

State outdoor recreation plans evaluate supply, demand and need for areas and facilities for significant outdoor recreation activities, according to U. S. Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall. The plans include an action program for meeting priority needs.

In accordance with President Johnson's natural beauty program, the plans are expected to provide for protection and enhancement of the quality of a state's outdoor environment generally, Udall said.

In use of fund grants, states are expected to give priority attention to serving needs of metropolitan and other urban areas.

Initial eligibility for the grant program is for a limited period based, in part, on the state's program and schedule for improving its plan. The plan is to be updated, revised, refined in detail and otherwise strengthened on a continuing basis.

Bureau Director Edward C. Crafts said Kentucky may now apply for grants for 50 percent of the cost of state and local government land acquisition and development projects designed to meet priority public outdoor recreation needs identified in the state plan.

The fund supports 50 percent matching grants for statewide outdoor recreation planning as well as for state and local acquisition and development projects. Preparation of the initial version of Kentucky's plan was assisted financially with a \$29,150 planning grant from the fund.

**Former Floyd Marine Writes  
Of Close Call in Viet Nam**

Marine Lance Corporal Bobby D. Blankenship, of Mt. Sterling, Ohio, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Blankenship, formerly of Wayland, wrote his mother recently that only the will of God saved him and his squad from death at the hands of the Viet Cong in operation Sparrow Hawk in the Quang Ngai Valley, the night of March 26.

He and others of his squad were on patrol when they were hit from each direction by heavy artillery and sniper fire. The Marines were unable to shoot back without hitting their own troops. They were pinned down for some time with artillery rounds passing overhead by a matter of inches. "It was the worst I was ever scared in my life," Blankenship wrote.

A few hundred yards away, another company of marines was attacked, with six of them being killed and 19 wounded, but the Viet Cong paid with 85 killed. Blankenship has been in Viet Nam since last November.

## STRIP-MINE HEARING SET AT FRANKFORT NEXT WEEK

Frankfort, Ky. — Changes in strip mine regulations to make them comply with the new law passed by the 1966 Legislature have been proposed by the State Strip Mine and Reclamation Commission.

The proposed changes were announced after they were reviewed by a newly-formed technical advisory committee composed of Eastern and Western Kentucky coal operators.

A public hearing will be held at 10 a.m. Tuesday, April 19 to consider the proposals.

Key changes include:

1. Requiring an adequate water supply, prevention of undesirable seepage, spillways and access in Western Kentucky operations where a water impoundment is constructed.

2. Requiring restoration work to be done currently and completed within 45 to 90 days, depending on the type of operation.

3. Encouraging new practices that will speed up vegetative cover on disturbed land.

4. Establish new standards on grading.

Two proposed new regulations encourage the pre-planning of grading and establish standards for the use of explosives.

The law becomes effective June 16, as will the proposed regulations if adopted by the commission.

Serving on the new advisory committee at the request of the commission are James Sigmon, Pineville; Edward Dooley, Middleboro; William B. Sturgill, Hazard; Harlan Walls, Whitesburg; and Ertel Witt, Pikeville, all from Eastern Kentucky.

## SOME PARKS TO CHARGE

### Flannagan Reservoir Admission Scheduled; State Governs Dewey

Admission fees will be instituted this year at certain reservoirs operated by the Army Corps of Engineers.

One reservoir affected in this area is John W. Flannagan in southwestern Virginia.

In the cases of state park development on federal lands, such as at Dewey Reservoir, the question of admission fees must be decided by the states, with approval by the Corps of Engineers, the Huntington district office of the Corps of Engineers said.

The fees, ranging from 50c to \$7, are being charged as a result of the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act of 1965. Under this act, fees must be charged at federally-operated flood control reservoirs at which large sums of money have been spent on recreation development.

The fees will be in effect this year between Memorial Day (May 30) and Labor Day (first Monday in September).

Three types of car permits will be issued under the new plan. They are: 1. A \$7 annual permit for a car and all occupants, good for admission to all federal recreation areas in the U. S. (including national park areas); 2. A \$3 temporary permit for a car and occupants, good for 30 days at a designated area, and 3. A \$1 permit for car and occupants, good for one day at a designated area.

Two types of permits can be obtained by individuals. They are (1) a \$1.50 permit, good for 30 days at a designated area, and (2) a 50c one-day permit. These two permits will admit the individual, whether he is traveling alone or as part of a group.

The fees collected will go into the federal conservation fund to buy new land for recreation areas and to help states develop their own public use facilities.

All five types of permits will be sold by uniformed rangers in the recreation areas at John W. Flannagan Reservoir.

Permits also will be sold at the two project offices, and the Corps of Engineers' district office in the new Federal Building at Huntington.

## POVERTY OF APPLICANTS

Grand Rapids, Mich.—There's a poverty of applicants for an antipoverty project here aimed at giving jobs to the jobless. The project, backed by \$221,650 in federal funds, would have made part-time city employees of school dropouts.

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## Community And Ag Colleges Of UK Cooperate In Course For Training of Foresters

A two-year terminal course of study is now being operated cooperatively by two branches of the University of Kentucky—the Community College system and the Department of Forestry, College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

The first year of training is spent carrying regular freshman level work at one of the community colleges. The second year is spent at the Forestry and Wood Technician School at Quicksand. Students are enrolled in the Community College system for the two years of their training upon successful completion of which an associate degree in science in forestry will be awarded by the Community College in which the student is enrolled.

(Don Graves, formerly of Prestonsburg, is superintendent of the Forestry and Wood Technician School at Quicksand.)

Subjects studied during the first year will include courses in mathematics, English and the sciences such as botany and physics. During the second year students will study such subjects as tree identification, silviculture, forest protection, forest measurement, logging, sawmill operation, lumber seasoning, lumber grading, wood preservation, wood identification, industrial woodworking, and assembly and finishing.

Studies in forestry and primary wood utilization (sawmilling, etc.) are conducted in the Robinson Forest, a 15,000-acre forest operated by the University of Kentucky. Here one will find the latest most modern types of equipment used for training such as, a diesel powered sawmill, an all electric powered sawmill, mechanized log skidders, bulldozers, carry-lifts, log loaders

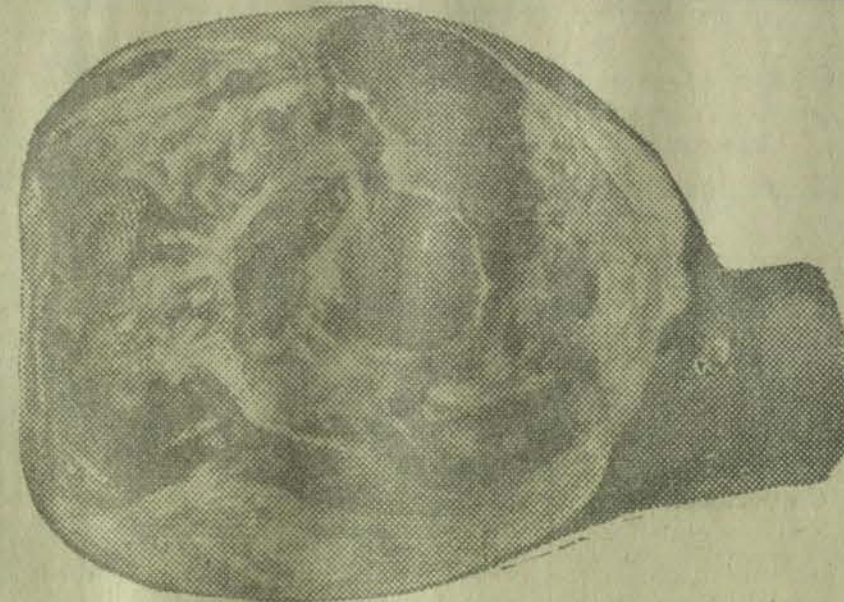

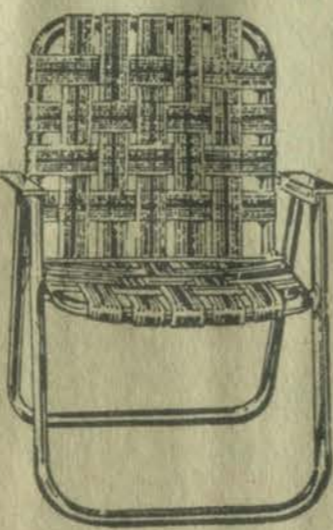

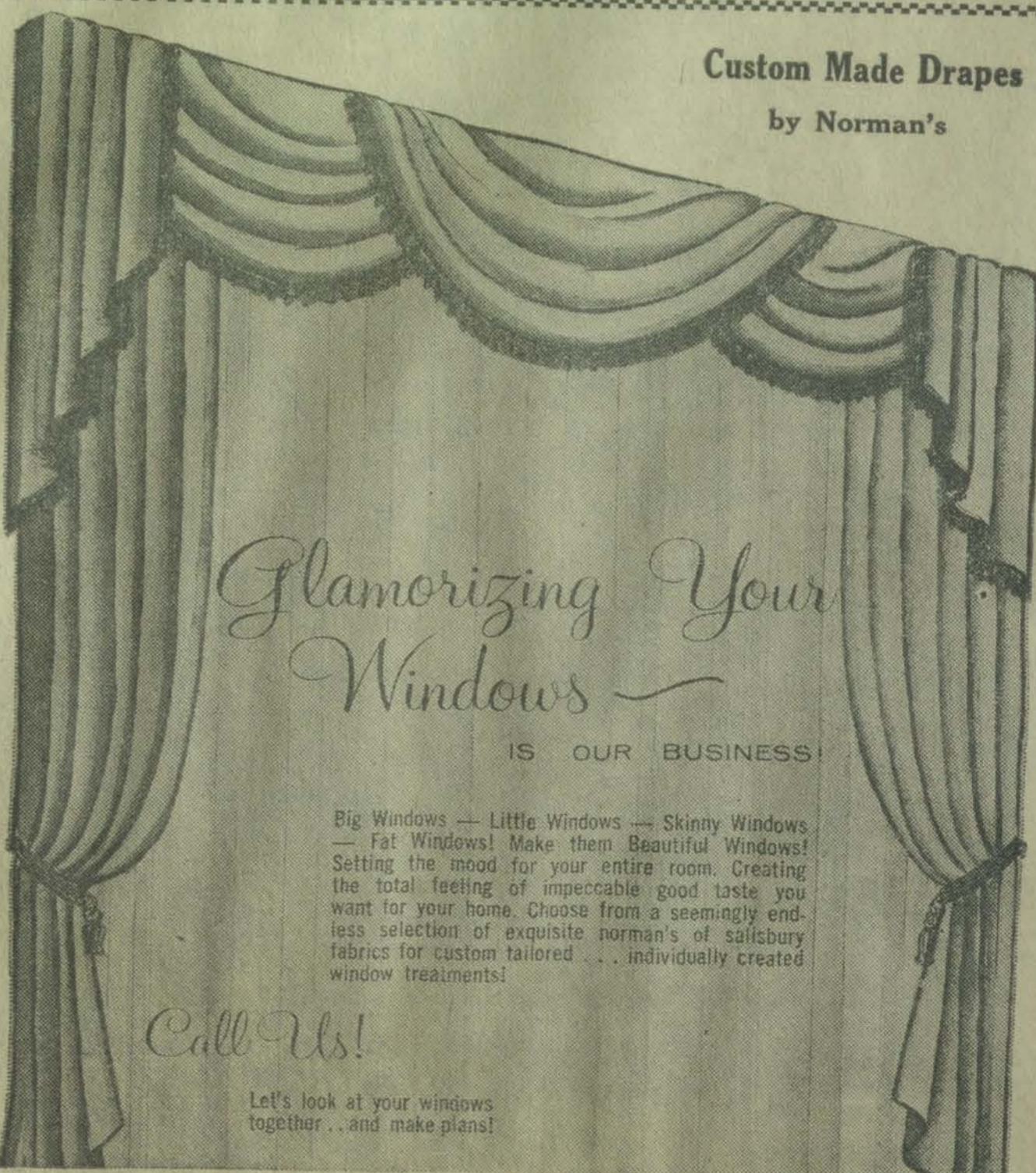
