FBI SAYS LEXINGTON 4th HIGH IN CRIME

The Kentucky crime rate continues to rise faster than the state's population growth last year, following a nationwide trend.

The FBI's annual crime report said yesterday that the total number of Kentucky criminal offenses reported to the FBI increased from 32,755 in 1964 to 33,431 last year.

That represents an increase of about 2%, while the state's population increased .6% during one year, the FBI said. The agency gave the 1964 Kentucky population as 3,159,000, and the 1965 population as 3,179,000.

Kentucky had a rate of 1.0516 crimes per 100,000 population, which ranked 33rd in the crime rates between states or nation. Any comparison in the cities, however, is probably not valid because some police departments report every crime while others don't.

For instance, Lexington, Ky., is listed as having the fourth highest crime rate per capita among the nation's metropolitan areas.

The only three areas placing higher on the list were Los Angeles-Long Beach, Calif., Miami, Fla., and Fresno, Calif., in that order.

The FBI reports there were 3,925 total offenses in the Lexington-Fayette county area last year, a rate of 2,549.3 per 100,000 population. These offenses were composed of 12 rapes, 12 murders, 186 aggravated assaults, 133 robberies, 1,591 burglaries, 1,451 cases of larceny and 540 auto thefts.

Lexington Police Chief E. C. Hale said the report punishes cities that tell the truth when they provide figures for the FBI statisticians.

"Everybody in the nation either knows or should know that Los Angeles has the finest law enforcement force in the country, yet there they are at the top of the list," Hale said. "The reason is that they, as we, provide accurate figures through IBM computers to the FBI."

Hale said the same is true of Miami, which is listed number two. He said some police forces don't bother to list auto thefts that are considered minor. "If there is a 15-cent pencil stolen in this area, it goes on the report," Hale said. "Our big problem is petty crimes involving articles stolen out of cars and windows."

The Lexington police chief pointed to the low murder and rape figures and said, "A person can walk anywhere in Lexington without being molested. We have even had a decrease in manslaughter cases resulting from automobile accidents due to better traffic handling."

The increasing problem of petty theft and accurate record-keeping are the main reasons why Lexington ranks so high in per capita crime among metropolitan areas in the nation, Hale said.

The Louisville metropolitan area including Jefferson county, Ky., and Clark and Floyd counties, Ind., had a crime rate of 2,175.5 per 100,000 population.

These figures are made up of 65 murders, 77 rapes, 783 robberies, 682 aggravated assaults, 6,303 burglaries, 6,350 larcenies and 2,907 auto thefts.

The Louisville rate is 21st among the metropolitan areas.

This year the Louisville Police Department changed its method of reporting crimes.

Nationally, with a sharp increase in juvenile lawlessness, the crime rate increased 5 per cent.

The FBI's crime report said serious crimes occurred at a rate of five a minute last year, with more than 2.78 million such crimes reported.

The increase was sharpest in the suburbs—8 per cent—and in the Western states—10 per cent. The 5 per cent gain in the crime rate reflected more than 14 crimes for every 1,000 inhabitants of the United States.

And while the rate increase fell off from the 11 per cent gain reported a year ago over 1963, the crime rate continued to outpace the population increase by almost six to one. Since 1960, the FBI said, serious crimes have increased 46 per cent while the population has grown 8 per cent.

The FBI figures carried a grave portent for the future of law enforcement. Arrests of juveniles under 18 for serious crimes have increased by 47 per cent in the past five years—nearly three times the 17 per cent increase in the population of that age group.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said the crime figures indicate an urgent need to re-evaluate police manpower requirements. There was no change last year, he said, in the police employee rate in the nation's cities—1.7 sworn police personnel for every 1,000 inhabitants.

"The manpower now available," Hoover observed, "is generally inadequate to cope with the mounting tasks being placed on the shoulders of the nation's law enforcement officers."

PERKINS WOULD INCREASE VOCATIONAL SCHOOL FUND

Amendments to the Vocational Education Act of 1966, which were proposed Tuesday by Representative Carl D. Perkins, would increase federal funds for vocational education schools in Kentucky from the present \$4,362,000 to \$6,273,000.

Another major change proposed in the law by Perkins would authorize a broad new program to construct and operate residential type vocational schools. Perkins said that such schools would be designed to provide comprehensive training in a large variety of skilled and technical occupations utilizing the latest techniques and equipment. Students would be enrolled on a residential basis for fulltime study without tuition. Perkins said that he envisioned the residential vocational school program which would be authorized by the legislation as experimental and demonstrative.

In addition to the other funds provided by the act, the approximate \$1.5 million allocable to Kentucky under the residential school provisions would be used to construct and operate such a facility on a pilot basis. "The federal funds would act as seed money encouraging states and local governments to provide for such facilities on a broader basis and more effectively guided by the experience and demonstration of the federal pilot projects."

Other amendments proposed by Perkins today would:

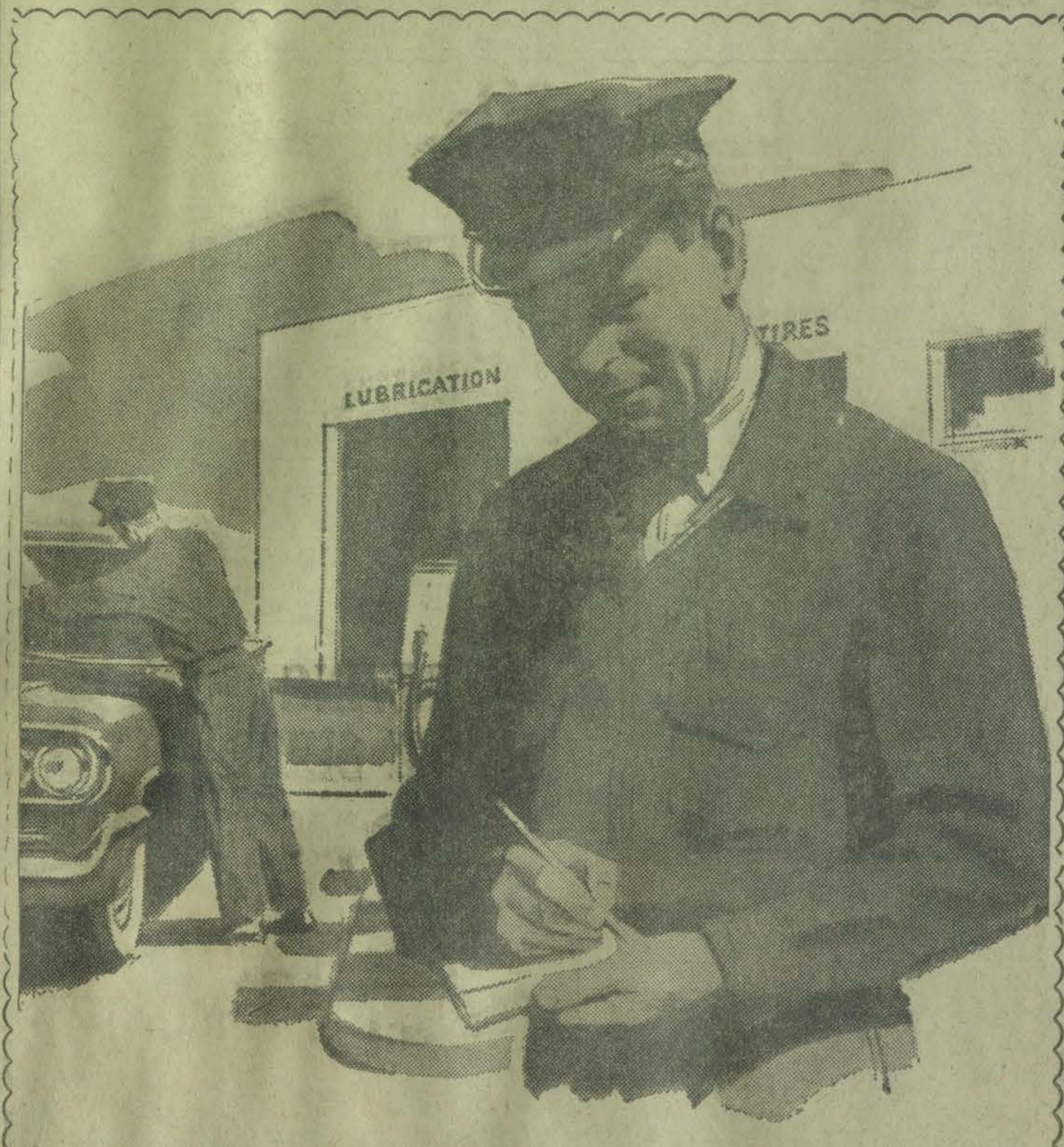

**Department of Labor Procures Injunction Against Johuson Firm**

Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz has procured a court order in U. S. District Court for the Eastern District of Kentucky at Pikeville, permanently enjoining and restraining Charles Vincel Sturgill, individually, and doing business as Sturgill Tire and Equipment Company, Paintsville, from violating the minimum wage, overtime and record-keeping provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act.

The order was approved by Federal District Judge Bernard T. Moynahan, Jr., following the filing of a complaint based upon an investigation conducted by personnel from the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Division.

According to the complaint filed by the Secretary of Labor, the defendant and his employees are subject to the Fair Labor Standards Act by reason of the fact that they are engaged in selling, servicing and repairing tires, machinery and equipment used in the production of goods for commerce and for transporting goods in commerce.

The Kentucky Employment Service provides counseling for unemployed and underemployed young men who fail to meet the educational or intelligence standards of the Armed Forces.

**FORESTERS TO MAKE STUDY OF CATERPILLAR DAMAGE**

Frankfort—The Kentucky Division of Forestry and the U. S. Forest Service will survey the extent of damage by the Eastern tent caterpillar in the state this summer.

The survey results from a request by a committee appointed by Governor Edward T. Breathitt to study the problem.

The survey will determine where the insects exist and inflict the heaviest damage and what natural controls are present. The caterpillars periodically defoliate un-sprayed or-

chard and shade trees. Several garden clubs have expressed concern.

J. O. Matlick, Kentucky natural resources commissioner, says the problem has not become too severe in Kentucky. An all-out campaign against the insect will begin next spring, after results of the survey are in, Matlick says.

Matlick, chairman of the committee, has invited garden clubs "to join us in educating the citizens and landowners so they can aid us in this campaign."

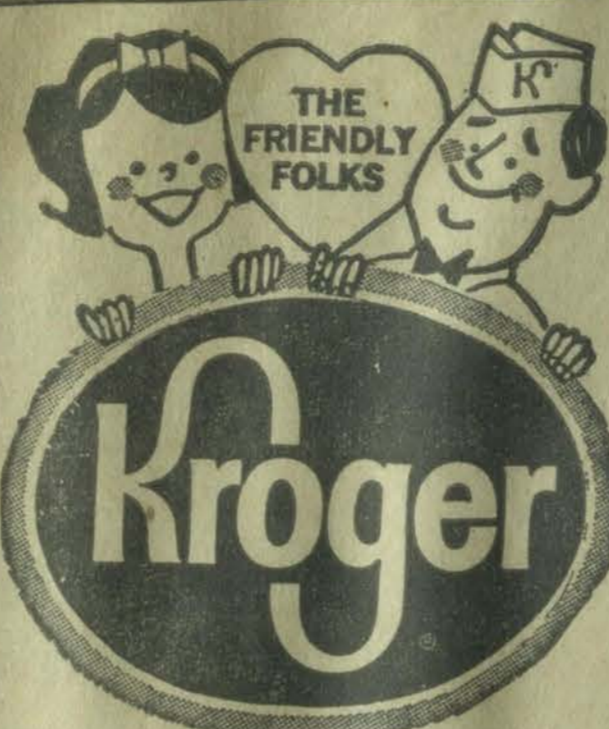
