EDUCATIONAL TV NETWORK NEAR CONSTRUCTION STAGE

Frankfort, Ky.—Kentucky Authority for Educational Television now has permission to start construction of its 12-station ETV network.

Governor Edward T. Breathitt announced that the Federal Communications Commission has issued the remaining 11 permits after having issued the first permit several weeks ago.

The 11 permits were the largest number ever made by the FCC at any one time, the Governor said. When the system is completed in 1968, Breathitt said, Kentucky will have the largest and most complete ETV system of any state.

FCC approval is the last major barrier toward getting the system under construction. Breathitt noted that the United States Office of Education previously had granted Kentucky \$2,140,000 in matching funds for the ETV system which will eventually cost \$8.5 million. About \$6½ million will be provided by the state.

The Kentucky ETV network, which is licensed by the State Board of Education and operated by the Kentucky Authority for Educational Television, will offer

curriculum aid to classroom teachers, in-service training for teachers, and vocational training for adults among other programs in addition to direct classroom instruction in elementary and secondary education.

It is expected that construction will begin shortly after January 1. The facilities will include transmitters at Covington, Somerset, Ashland, Madisonville, Lexington-Richmond, Hazard, Pikeville, Owenton, Morehead, Murray, Elizabethtown and Bowling Green.

Lower-powered transmitters will be located at Owensboro and Hopkinsville, and others will be constructed, if needed, after the network is operating, ETV Authority officials said.

The network will be programmed primarily from the network center in Lexington. Production studios also will be at the state's other four universities.

Metal Snow Treads Not Permitted Everywhere

With winter weather crowding in, the snow-tire season is at hand.

Many manufacturers now are offering winter-tread tires with metal spikes. While there is no law in Kentucky against use of such tires, certain states, or jurisdictions, do prohibit their use because of possible road damage.

For this reason, the prudent purchaser would do well to determine carefully where the tires are to be used before equipping his car with metal treads. If he plans to use them in areas outside Kentucky, he should determine in advance whether their use is permitted.

Above all, drive safely. Remember, the life you save is well worth living.

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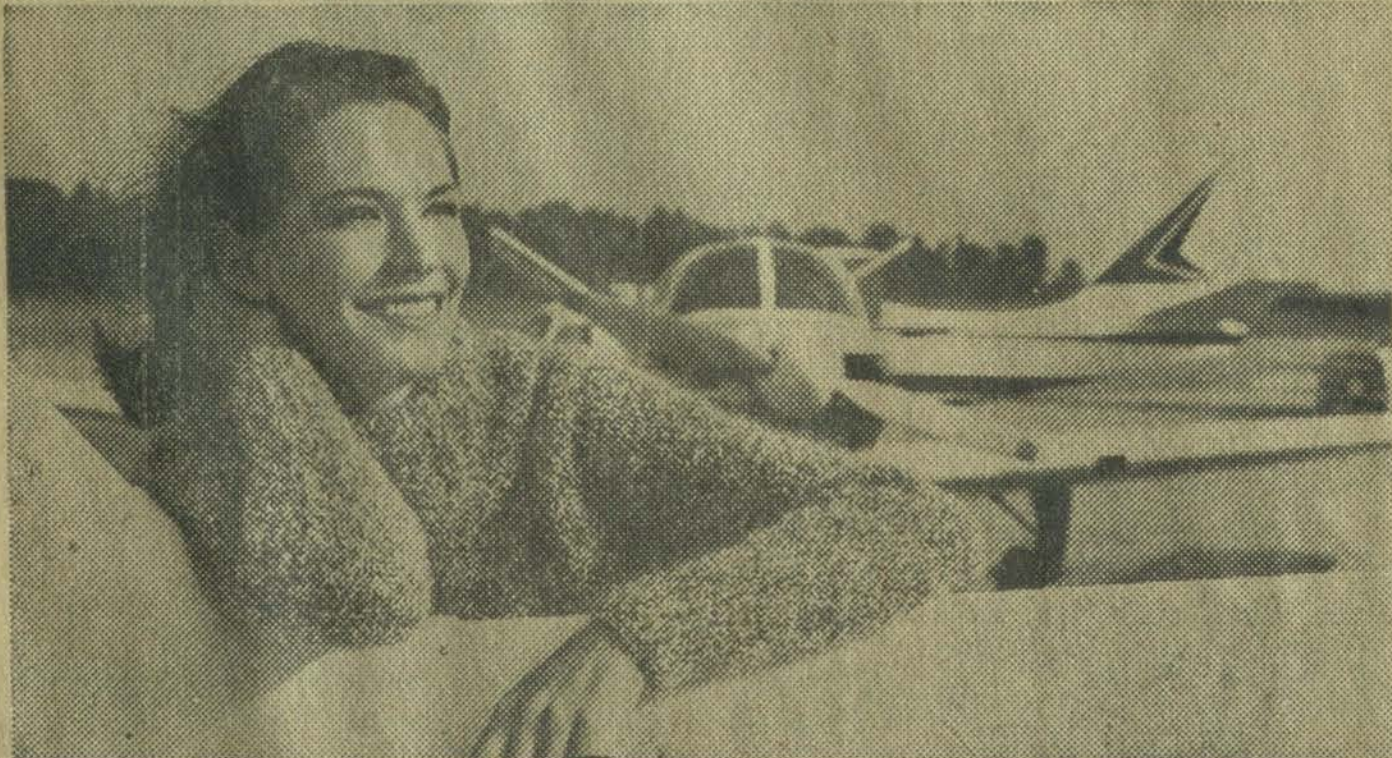

STATE TAKES NEW LOOK AT ITS HIGHWAY PROGRAM

Highway Commissioner Mitchell W. Tinder said Saturday that the state is reevaluating its highway program in light of the \$14.1 million cutback in federal funds, and he held out the possibility that there would be "some deferment" in certain projects.

Tinder said that the Highway Department should know within a week which projects will face deferment.

Tinder made his remarks after the dedication ceremonies at the opening of the new four-lane improvement of LaGrange road.

The \$14.1 million cutback in Kentucky's share of federal highway grants was disclosed November 28. It is part of President Johnson's over-all \$1.1 billion reduction in federal highway construction funds. The reduction is intended to fight inflation.

Henry Ward, former highway commissioner and now Democratic candidate for governor, said that the reduction in federal highway funds for Kentucky would not be detrimental if it lasts only a year.

If it lasts longer than that, Ward said, the state's road program would be hurt.

Ward expected that the cutback will fall heaviest on the interstate system, for which the federal government puts up 90 percent of the money.

Kentucky has 137 miles of uncompleted interstate highways.

Ward said that while he was commissioner, he had taken steps as a hedge against a federal cutback in the interstate road program.

He said that he had emphasized gaining the rights of way and the completion of survey planning for the 733 miles of interstate highway that Kentucky has been allotted.

Once this is done, the state is guaranteed against the elimination of any sections if federal aid dries up, Ward said.

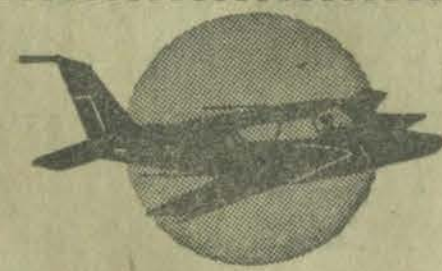

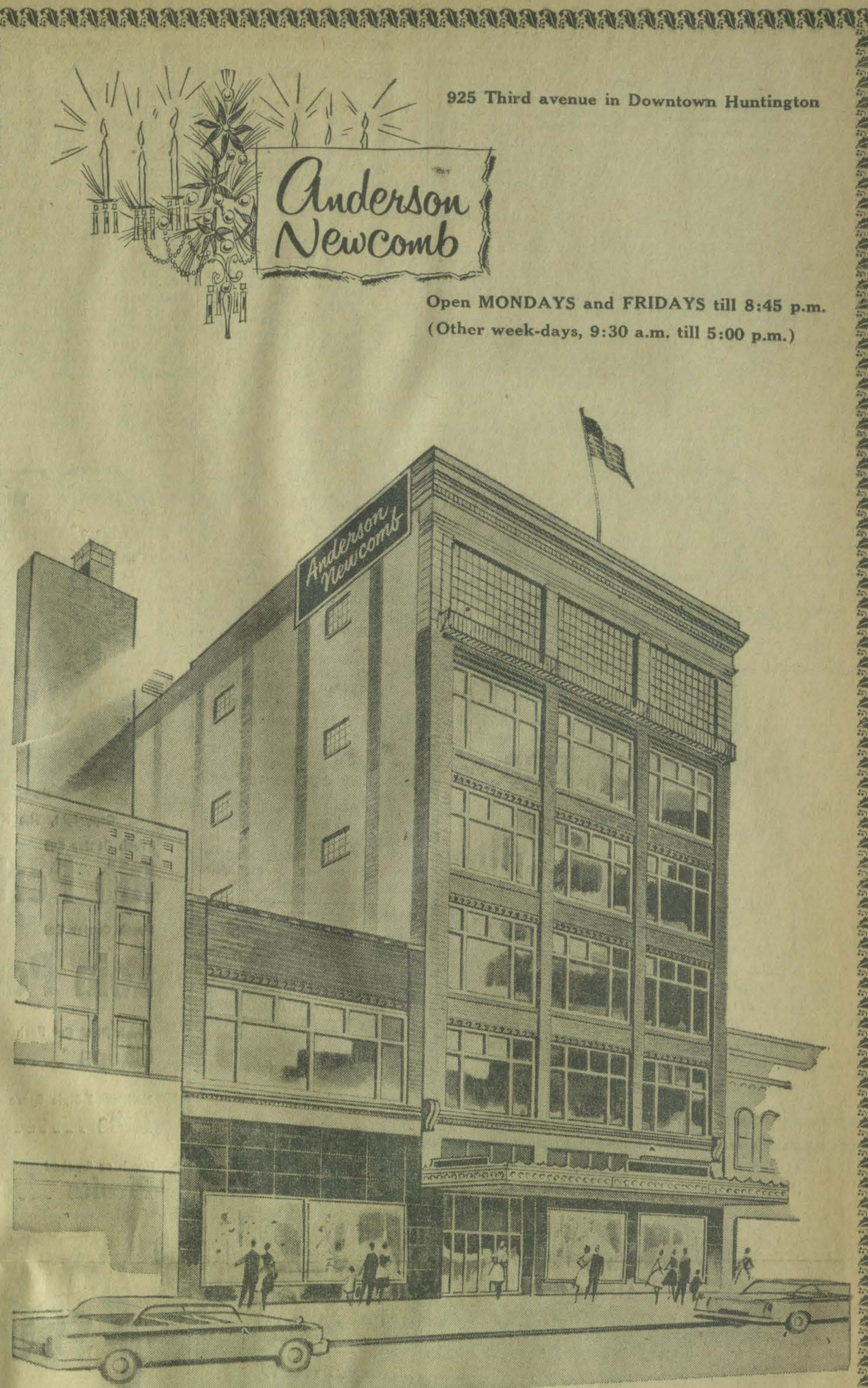
