

Completion date on the pool has been moved ahead to July 1. The L-shaped pool and its sundeck are designed to accommodate 500 persons. The main part of the pool will be 93 feet long by 47 feet, three inches in width. The "foot" of the L will be a 35 x35-foot diving area. A separate wading pool will measure 10 by 20 feet. (An earlier report, published in The Times and other newspapers, erred in the pool dimensions.)

Although the Stratton Branch bathing area of the lake will be closed to bathers upon compleion of the pool, its beach will be accessible. Site of the proposed installation overlooks the beach, and the present bath-house will be incorporated into the general pool plan.

As To Who Is Trying To Break the Union at the United Fuel Gas Co.

You may have read the article in last week's Floyd County Times where the Company representative says he states the facts. I will answer the Company representative's statement, in the order he made them.

1. He states: "The Company has made a settlement offer, which is the best ever made the Union.'

Answer: We, the Union, say, this is true. But he failed to say that we are asking for contract language that will protect our jobs. The Company has pointed out contracting out is a issue. Example: Last year, the Company contracted out three jobs that were in the bargaining unit. Two of these jobs were in Charleston, W. Va., the other in Prestonsburg, Ky. We met with the Company through grievance procedure. Then a federal arbitrator had to decide. The Union won the two cases at Charleston. The Company agreed to put the other one back in the bargaining unit.

2. He states: "Two Local Unions accepted the Company offer and signed contracts."

Answer: He failed to say that the two locals voted along with us to strike. There was a ninety percent majority vote to strike. You, the public, be the judges. Would you be a man of your vote, or would you be a coward and return to work? "A weak sister Local."

3. He states: Many members of the two Unions on strike are at work under the terms of the contract.


Answer: We the Union ask. Who signed the contract for them? Do they have a charter from O.C.A.W. International Union? We say, No. They are "yellow dogging."


4. He states: Altogether, over 400 hourly employees of the Company are at work.

The superintendent must recognize, Ball said, that his role in the actual bargaining activity has to be self-effacing. He tries to speak only when asked a question; he gives objective answers; he corrects errors of fact that come into the discussion; he furnishes information to both groups, never giving one group some thing he doesn't give the other: he stays out of the limelight when agreement is reached. Bell, an enthusiastic supporter of the PN agreement in his own school system, said superintendents "will have to face the fact that teachers no longer petition, no longer request: teachers today will demand, and they will have a legal and a moral right to make their requests known in a forthright manner.'

Another workshop speaker, Dr Arnold Wolpert, director of the National Education Association (NEA) division of urban services, urged the Kentucky teachers and administrators to begin working toward PN agreements in their local school systems. He said nearly a third of the nation's teachers now have PN provisions available to them. The workshop was the culmina-

tion of a grass-roots educational campaign on PN by the KEA Commission on Professional Negotiation. The Commission's next step will be to determine what elements it feels should be incorporated in a Kentucky law to guarantee PN rights throughout the states and to present the proposal to the KEA Delegate Assembly for its consideration.


The KEA Delegate Assembly mandated earlier that KEA seek such a law, which would also spell out a procedure for solving impasse.

On the matter of impasse, Dr. J. M. Dodson, KEA executive secretary, told the workshop group:

"Some have maintained that the establishment of an impasse committee would take away from a board of education its right to make certain decisions. Ol course, this is not true. Boards of education cannot, involuntarily, transfer their authority to another group."

"It would be foolish indeed, Dodson asserted, "for anyone to advocate that elected representatives of the people give their authority to someone or to some group who is not in a direct way responsible to the will of the majority of the people. This (impasse) committee has to be advisory only." Dodson also predicted that the professional negotiation process,



"The National Safety Council's Committee on Winter Driving Hazards made exhaustive tests of changes in traction, or pulling power, with weight added to the trunk," Jones said. "They found only a very slight increase in traction with 100 pounds of weight added to the trunk of a conventional passenger car.

"The engineers making the ly all cars today, much of the trunk space is behind the rear axle. Therefore, any load added to the trunk compartment will decrease the load on the front wheels, thereby reducing steering control. Under slippery conditions this is a very hazardous situation," the traffic safety authority declared, and concluded, "Therefore, while it is true that added weight will increase traction slightly, it isn't worth the risk of reducing steering control.'

He also pointed out why the National Safety Council committee recommends that tires should not be deflated in an effort to obtain better traction on ice or snow. The experts found that the added hazard of "mushy" handling offsets any slight increase in traction gained by bleeding air from tires. "And you have all heard the statement from drivers that 'I can stop on a dime,' Director Jones said. Actually you would need over a thousand dimes laid end to end to react and stop at only 25 mph with perfect brakes, good tires and dry pavement. Considering that braking distances on ice may take ten times this distance, the wise driver sharply reduces his speed on slippery pavements and maintains a far greater than usual interval between his car and other traffic." Motorists are now in the worst weather period of the winter and they are asked by Jones to check their cars to make sure they are in top winterized condition and also to review the basic rules of safe winter driving. "This is the time our biggest winter storms often hit us," Director Jones said. "And each year at this time we have needless automobile crashes on snow and ice-packed streets and highways because someone failed to keep his car in peak condition or ignored one of the basic survival rules of safe winter driving." The state safety authority added that a study of wintertime accidents has brought home again and again the fact that in virtually every instance there has been a viola-

The new law now designed to attract more bidders, increases bidding competition and gets better quality and more favorable prices. Under it the number of ap-

proved persons and firms seeking state business has increased from 4,459 in February, 1964, to 4,961, in December, 1966.

During the last two fiscal years, total savings of \$802,226 have been made in the purchase of office furniture by change in buying procedures, consideration of several brands and developing of detailed specifications by a committee representing the larger using agencies. In 1963, for instance, the State was paying an average of \$176.86 for office desks. In 1965, the desks were purchased for an average of \$109.48. This resulted in a savings of \$67.38 per desk. The average savings for desks in 1966 increased to \$70.71 as a result of a five percent decrease in the bid price despite rising steel costs. Total savings in desks for two years was \$265.760. Similar savings were made in the purchase of office files and office chairs. The savings in files for the two-year period was \$250,-

For most taxpayers, this will be the return filed for calendar year 1966. Be sure to file your tax return on time however. The credit is lost if the return is late. Q .- Do you have to support a person all year to be able to claim his or her dependency exemption? My mother moved in with us several months ago and I have been providing her full support ever since.

A .- The support is not concerned with how long you have supported a person but whether you provided more than half the support required by the person for the calendar year. If you 60 Arnold Avenue provided this support for your mother and the other tests are met, then you may claim her as Q.-My wife is taking a part-A .- No you may not. A wife is not considered her husband's dependent. When a husband or wife files a separate return the other must file separately too. 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
