The recommendation for a complete new appraisal of property was made, the report pointed (out, "in fairness to the taxpayers . . . who have properly listed their taxes." It also suggested that the cost of a new parcel-byparcel assessment be pro-rated on a benefit basis. "The school ceives three-fourths of the revenue; therefore, it should bear the major part of the cost. In addition, the state should also be required to share the cost."

Ten "semi-critical" counties have also been designated, and a physician may borrow up to \$1,000 to set up practice there For each year of practice in these counties, \$250 will be forgiven. Semi-critical counties are: Leslie, Owsley, Jackson, Butler Breathitt, Lincoln, Meade, Owen. Clay and Estill.




