In their quest for branch plants, the Kentuckians will contact 350 firms in the Los Angeles area and 150 in and near San Francisco.

Some of our state's most recently-acquired industrial operations are branches of companies and corporations based in California, most populous of the nation's states.

Three of five new plants are located on the 930-acre tract of the Northern Kentucky Industrial Foundation in Kenton and Boone counties. They are Levi Strauss, the Great Lakes Carbon Corporation, and Anchor Products. Inc. Harvey Aluminum, Inc., built its branch near Lewisport in Hancock county, and the U.S. Borax and Chemical Corporation of Los Angeles announced purchase of a site at Henderson for another branch-plant operation. All this gives rise to the thought that while most, if not all the yellow treasure of the "forty-niners" has been mined, California still offers a wealth of opportunity to such states as Kentucky, which has so much to offer as a location for branch plants.

The Kentucky group is scheduled to leave Standiford Field at Louisville for Los Angeles at 7:10 p.m., November 12. Its members will remain there until, November 16, then they will take off for San Francisco.







> Regulations pertinent to deer hunting follow.

> Hunter must have on his person a valid hunting license and a deer hunting permit. cost of which is \$10.50 for either resident or non-resident. The metal clip from the deer permit must be affixed to the hind leg of the killed deer just above the hock immediately after it is killed and must remain on the deer during transportation.


Hunting will be permitted in daylight hours only, and a hunter under 18 years of age must be accompanied by an adult.

Rifles of .243-caliber or larger may be used, but fully automatic rifles are barred. Full jacketed military ammunition or tracer ammunition may not be used and muzzle-loading rifles of .38caliber or larger may be used. The Army M-1 carbine is barred due to low muzzle velocity. Shotguns, 20 guage to 10 gauge, may be used with slug ammunition only. Buckshot are illegal in deer hunting. No dogs may be used in deer hunting and deer may not be taken by use of boats, or other vehicles or by use of domestic animals, nor may they be taken while swimming in a stream or body of water.

Hunters are required to wear orange or yellow clothing.
