> A letter was sent to Combs from the Consumer and Marketing Service requesting that he surrender his authorization card and all posters, form, and other official materials which identified his store as a participant in the food stamp program. The letter was signed by Russell H. Jams, director of the Consumer and Marketing Serivce's Consumer Food Programs office at Atlanta.

The USDA complaint charged that East End Market sold ineligible items for food stamp coupons and accepted loose food stamp coupons.

In September, 1965, Combs received a warning letter from the Consumer and Marketing Service regarding a program violation. Since this was his first and only violation, he was not disqualified at that time.

Food stamp officials point out that disqualification does not preclude further action to collect claims under food stamp program regulations or possible prosecution under any criminal or other applicable statute.

After the six-month disqualification period, the operation of East End Market may apply for reinstatement. If approved, he will be issued a new authorization card and number, Consumer and Marketing Service officials said.
