Crager has only seven lettermen on his squad. The team, he said, is weakest at end and the halfback spots. Joe Buchanan, who had been depended upon as a halfback, suffered a broken leg recently in an off-the-field accident when he tripped and fell. The team is strong at quarterback, with Phillip Haywood and Mark Miller available. Miller, a strong runner, had been groomed for possible halfback duty on occasion, but Haywood was injured in the recent scrimmage which the Cats won, 6-0, over Rowan County and may be available only for limited duty in the season-opener. The team is well-fixed at fullback, with big Mike Castle in that slot.

The line, composed of five seniors, a junior and one sophomore, is expected to give a good account of itself.

MEASLES ERADICATION BY END OF YEAR SEEN

The timetable for complete eradication of measles in Kentucky by the end of 1967 is appearing to be right on schedule.

State Health Commissioner Dr. Russell E. Teague says that "we have certainly covered one-half of our 120 counties, and vaccinated 50 percent of Kentucky's children that would have been susceptible to the disease."

"The total number of cases reported this year, is the lowest since 1950," Teague said.

The commissioner pointed out that the total number of cases reported from Jan. 1 through July 15, 1966 was 4,653. The total reported for the same period in 1967 numbered 1,299 or 3,354 less than one year ago.

"The last peak year for measles was in 1964 when 18,926 cases were reported in Kentucky," he said.

"The No. 1 childhood disease today is measles," Dr. Teague said. "And contrary to popular belief, it is not a 'harmless' disease—it can kill or leave lifelong after-effects."

Teague said that Kentucky's program is part of a national effort to eradicate measles through the vaccination of eight-to-10 million children.

Teague emphasized that it is important for all healthy children who have not had measles to be vaccinated.

"The beauty of this program," he said, "is that one shot is enough to give lifelong immun-

New Qualifications, Fees for Nurses Set

New qualifications and fees established for registered nurses were announced last week.

All must be licensed by the Kentucky Board of Nursing Education and Nurse Registration to practice as registered nurses.

Daily rates are:
Institutions: Eight hour schedule, \$25, with the nurse paying for meals.

Private homes: Consecutive 12-hour duty, \$37.50, with meals furnished.

Obstetrical cases: Eight-hour schedule, \$25; care of baby, \$2. Hourly rates:
First hour or fraction thereof, \$10.

After three hours, a full charge is made for any remaining portion of the day up to regular hours.

Multiple Nursing (nursing of two patients on an emergency basis until another private duty nurse is available): Eight-hour schedule or fraction thereof for two patients, \$37.50. This will be equally divided between the two patients.

SOIL CONSERVATION

By HAROLD R. WALLACE Work Unit Conservationist

Three cooperators with the Floyd County Soil Conservation District are constructing grassed waterways on their farms this year.

The landowners are Harmison Stone and Earl Stone at Blue River and Amos Dotson at the mouth of Rough and Tough.

Grassed waterways are built shallow and wide to remove excess surface water. They can be used on cropland, hayland or pastures with equal success. The exact dimensions of each waterway are determined by the size of drainage area.

A heavy vegetable cover is established after construction, usually by seeding Kentucky 31 tall fescue, to prevent erosion or gully-lying. Fertilizer is applied at the rate of 800 pounds 10-10-10 per acre at time of seeding. For best results waterways should be maintained by applying 300

pounds 10-10-10 per acre each year. Weeds and excess growth of fescue should be clipped and removed annually.
The last date for seeding waterways is Sept. 15. Anyone desiring to apply this practice should keep this seeding date in mind.
Technical assistance will be furnished anyone interested in applying this practice by U. S. Soil Conservation Service technicians.

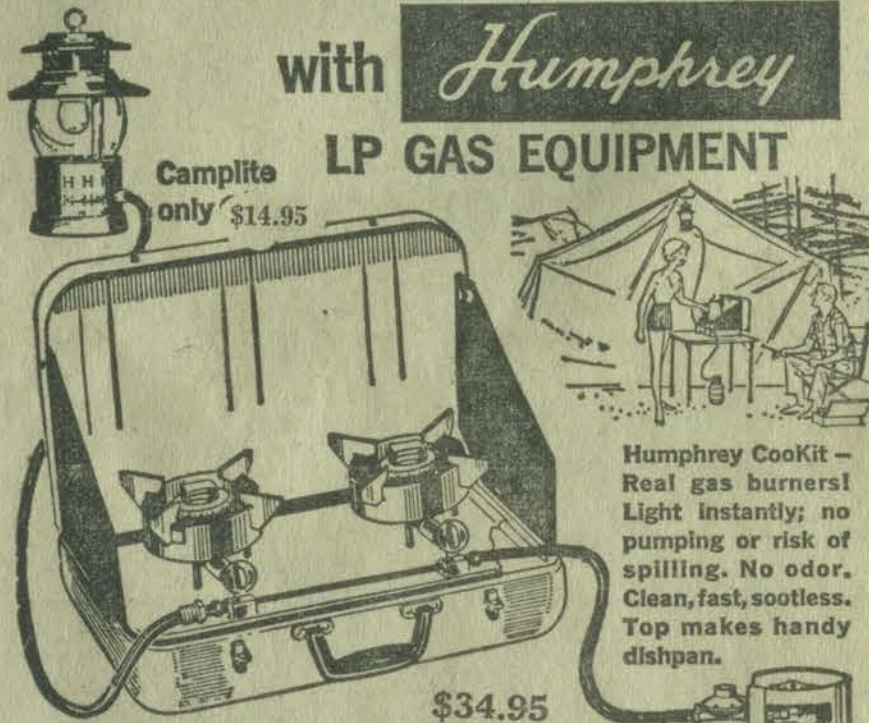

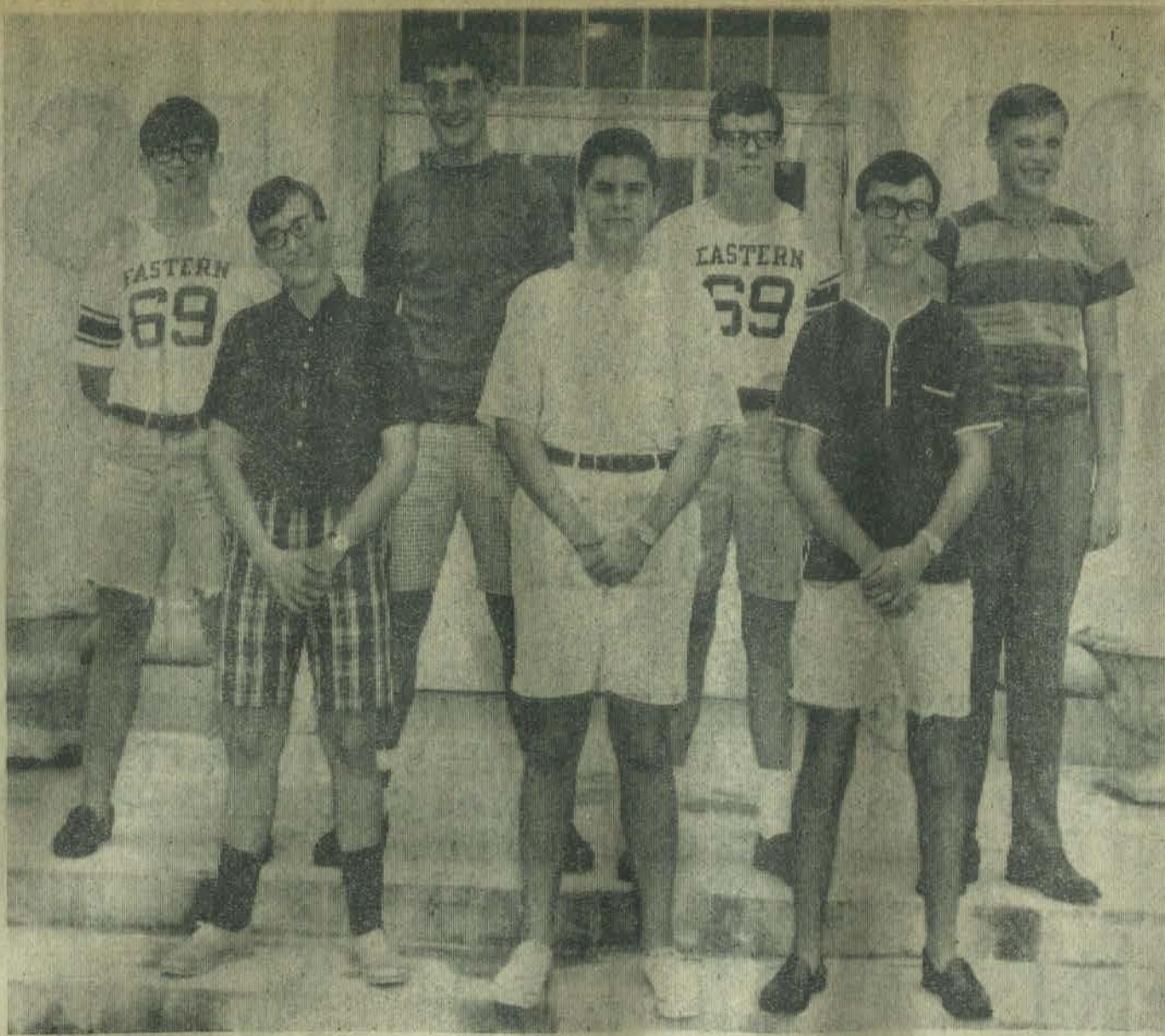

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BLUEGRASS FOR VIETNAM SENT MAGOFFIN SOLDIER

FRANKFORT — Governor Edward T. Breathitt says a 50-pound bag of Kentucky Bluegrass seed is being sent to a Salyersville soldier serving in South Vietnam.

Warrant Officer Russell Preston of the 9th Infantry Division wrote the governor, asking for grass seed and specifically requesting, "Not the ordinary, run-of-the-mill grass seed common to the 49 states, but the grass seed of the exceptional state—that is to say, suh, Kentucky Bluegrass seed."

In his letter, Preston said his unit is situated in the Mekong Delta with 80 acres of tents spread across "the barest of ground."

"Not one blade of grass, not one tree, brush or shrub breaks the barrenness. It is indeed a bleak prospect to face month after month," Preston wrote. Preston said that "if a small amount of Bluegrass seed could be sent," he would sow it around the division's headquarters and his own tent area. He indicated that a sign pro-

claiming "Governor Breathitt's Bluegrass" would be placed on the lawn for all to see. Breathitt said the seed is being supplied through the Kentucky Seedman's Association and estimated that the 50 pounds "should add considerable greenery to the area."

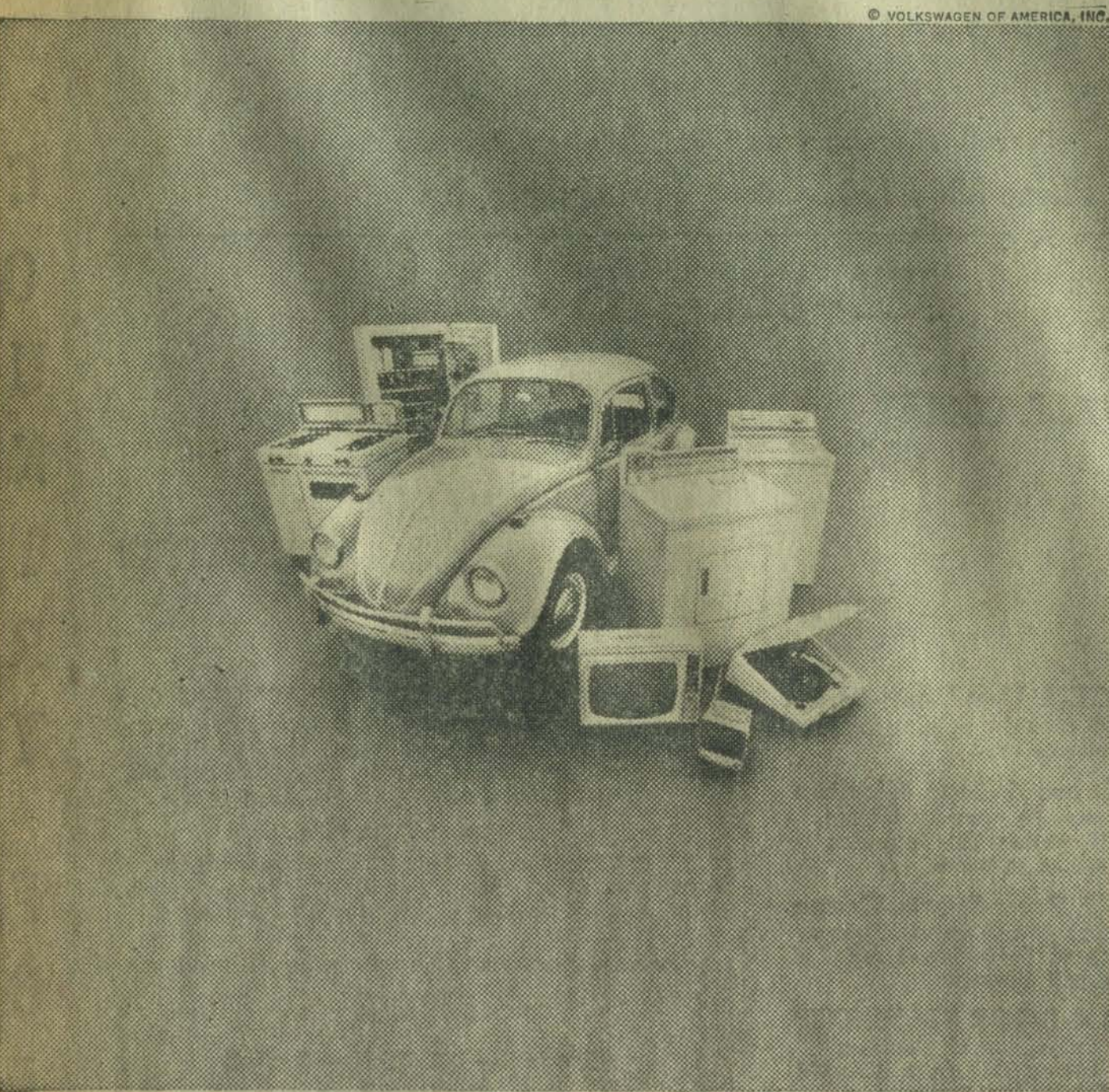

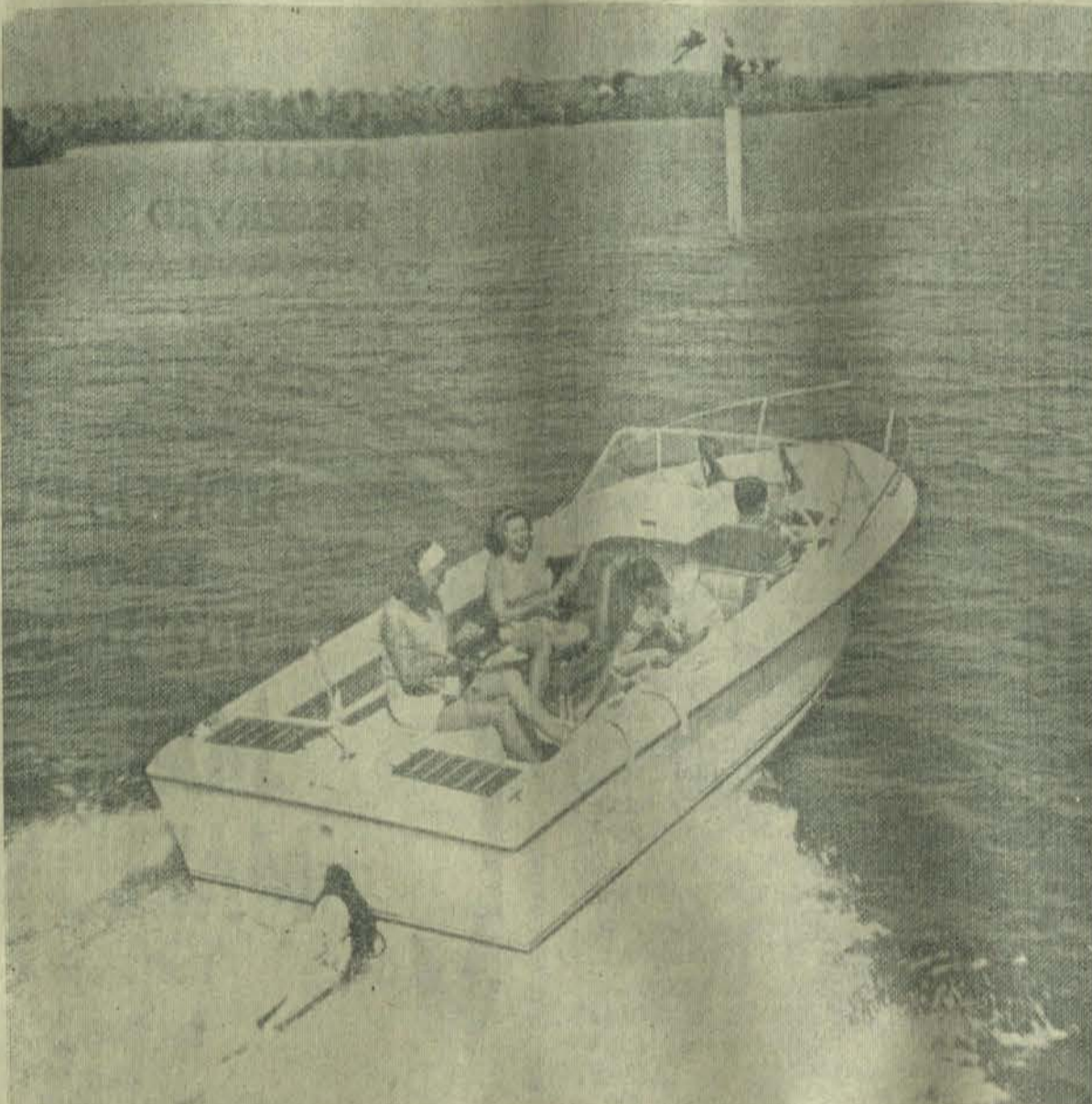

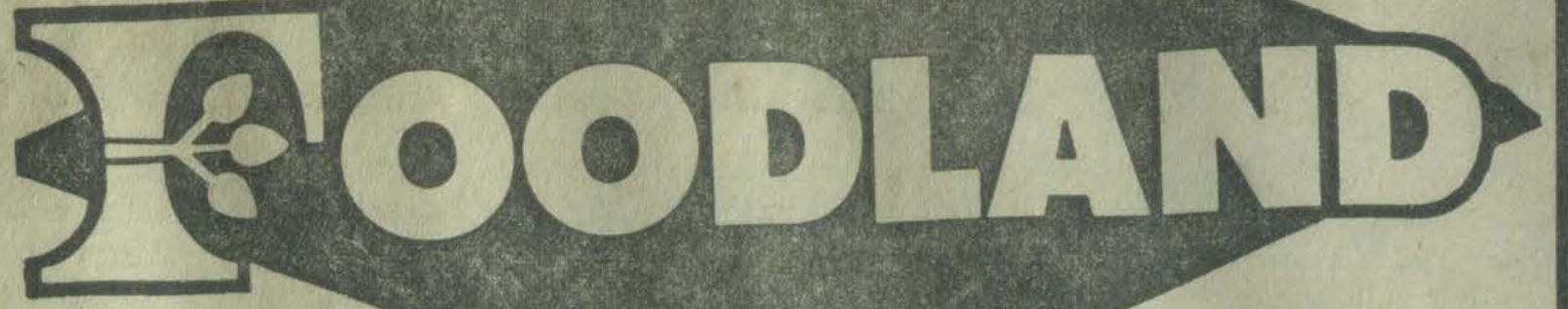
